## From the Rector



Watching the Coronation of The King and Queen last month, I was struck by that moment at the heart of the service when the King was shielded from view by screens and anointed with Holy Oil by the Archbishop. In the middle of a day of colour, splendid music, celebration and pageantry, it was this intimate and private act that summed up what the whole occasion was about – asking God for strength to go out and serve others.

Hello! I'm Fran, and I'm your new curate. I've been training at Ripon College, Cuddesdon, in Oxfordshire, and my church before then was in Portishead, where I was Children and Families Worker for 5 years. I'm delighted to be returning to the North Somerset area – and particularly

pleased to be in the Chew Valley, having spent years driving to Wells through the valley and wishing I lived here!

So, what are the things you should know about me before I start? I love animals of all shapes and sizes, and my one criterion to Ian for housing was that I could have pets. I've had cats for the last 20 years as they fitted better into a life where full time hours were made up of several jobs, but I'm hoping that now I will be home based for a lot of the time I will be able to have a dog — and may even reach the dizzy heights of a horse. At college I was the person who was called on for pet-sitting duties — though I did refuse the rats of one friend.

Away from church you'll find me on the hills walking. Walks are slower and shorter at the moment, having developed Long Covid in 2022 which has been the source of a lot of frustration. If you see me sitting down at random points you'll know why! I'm also a singer, and I'm looking forward to finding a new choir. I also enjoy pottering in my garden, people watching in coffee shops, and cross-stitching. I'm very much looking forward to getting to know everyone over the next three years.

## **A Commitment to Serve**

'Your Majesty, as children of the kingdom of God we welcome you in the name of the King of kings'. In reply to these opening words at his Coronation, King Charles III responded 'In his name and after his example I come not to be served but to serve.' This short exchange summed up what the service was about and what it intended to convey.

The King's commitment to service is not in any doubt. To give just a few examples, he has engaged with our most challenged communities far more than any politician, he called on us to care for the environment years before it became popular to do so and, of course, founded The Prince's Trust, which supports our most challenged younger people in so many ways.

He becomes king of a new era, the Carolean era. Our times see us face some big challenges. Our question is how to address them. I was immensely struck by all the agencies and charities present in the Abbey for the King's Coronation. Their participation spoke of the ways in which we're going to need to act differently in the years ahead to address the issues that confront us. Because it's all too evident that the power of government, be that local or national, to respond to the problems we see is less now than it was when the late Queen began her reign. Our challenge in this era is of how we're going to come together, in service, to address the different challenges that lie before us, be that the climate, how we tackle poverty, how we respond to a troubled international situation. All of us will have a part to play.

Where to find the resource to act in the way that's going to be needed? As I stood beside the King at the Coronation what inspired me was to see the way he drew so much strength, purpose and resolve and assurance from his Christian faith for the service he's called to give. And in that we can follow him too.

## Winford Community Shop News June 2023

Some of you may have seen our SHOP direction signs in Chew Rd & Barrow Lane directing passing trade to the shop. We would like to have one in Felton Lane so if you live there and have a suitable wall or fence, please contact us.

Some readers have contacted us asking for an overview of what we do. WCS was set up in late 2018 when around 100 villagers/shareholders raised £30,000 to take over the former village shop which was considered no longer financially viable. WCS is currently governed by a 9 strong committee, with one fulltime member of staff and 2 part-timers who mostly run the Post Office. Together with around 30 volunteers who sign up on a website for around 30 shifts a week ranging from 30 minutes to 3 hours to use the shop till and other jobs allowing volunteers to do as much or as little as they wish.

The shop supplies all food staples, daily bread, milk and newspapers plus confectionary, tobacco, a wide range of cards and stationery, off-licence, take away hot drinks & dry cleaning. Much of which is locally sourced and with good green credentials- semi-skimmed milk is available in refillable glass bottles together with Ecover refillable cleaning products. Through the Post Office a full range of Postal & Banking/Lottery/Amazon Hub & Prepayment Meter top-ups are available.

The shop therefore offers all essential services under one roof plus a meeting place for villagers and particularly our more elderly and vulnerable users. We also support numerous small businesses shipping items via the Post Office all over the UK & world.

So please call in, you can be sure of a warm welcome.

# Felton Flower Show Society - Flower Demonstration and Arranging Evening

## Wednesday 28 June 7.30 pm at Felton Village Hall with Janet Warden

If you have never tried making a professional arrangement do come along and find out how easy it is to succeed. We need new people to keep these events going and you can be sure of a warm welcome why not give it a try. The cost is £3.50 incl refreshments.

Janet gives details below of what to bring.

#### "An English Country Garden" - Wednesday 28 June

I will demonstrate two different styles of flower arrangements that may give you some ideas, especially if you are thinking of entering the flower show in July. However, even if you have never done any flower arranging before, you will be very welcome to come along and "have a go". It is a relaxed evening and you can either do one of the suggestions below or something of your own. We shall be pleased to see you whatever you decide to do.

#### Design (a) A Parallel Design

Container: A low rectangular container with floral foam to fit which needs to be approx. 2" above the rim. (I will have trays and foam to purchase on the evening)

Plant material: Just a few tall stems of cornus or other straight twigs and or leaves i.e. iris, phormium or similar. If possible, a selection of garden flowers or a supermarket bunch with a variety of shapes would be fine and a bunch of short stemmed foliage e.g. pittosporum, ivy, cupressus.

#### Design (b) Jam Jar Flowers

Container: You will need approx. 5 small jam jars (the type sauces come in, or small milk bottles, whatever you have) Wool, coloured string, felt or moss, if you want to cover the jars, optional.

Plant material: Summer flowers of your choice. They won't need to have long stems but a variety of shapes and maybe a few grasses.

You will need to bring scissors or secateurs, newspaper or a cover for the table.

I will have Oasis, plastic dishes, tape etc. For you to purchase.

Please remember that your plant material needs to be put in water for several hours before you come.

#### Winford Parish Council Meeting - Monday 17 April 2023

Before the formal start of the meeting, the Chair took the opportunity to express the gratitude of the Parish to the out-going Councillors who weren't standing for re-election: Simon Banks, Glenis Shiner, Phil Febrey and District Councillor Hugh Gregor. He thanked them, on behalf of the community, for all their hard work and contributions over the years.

Matters arising: It was noted that further/revised information had been received regarding the future of the Parish Magazine. There were no plans to combine it with the one for Chew Stoke and the costings were

as follows: advertising contributions (as of 13.3.23) - £2,770, donation from Winford Parish Council - £500, contribution from Winford Parochial Church Council (PCC) - £780 and contribution from Felton PCC - £500.

**Police report:** A report had been received in March. The main areas of concern in all areas were catalytic converter thefts, shed break ins/thefts from gardens and County Lines (drugs/taking advantage of vulnerable people). It was noted that cars parked by the entrance to the cattle grid gate on West Lane had recently been towed.

**Highways and footpaths:** A number of sunken drain covers on West Lane/Felton Lane would be reported. In response to a request that the need for a pedestrian crossing on Winford High Street be reviewed, it was agreed to concentrate for the time being on the problem of vehicles parking on the pavement in front of the pub. North Somerset Council (NSC) was aware of the issue and looking at ways forward. The pre-school would be asked to inform parents that they had permission to use the rear carpark of the Prince of Waterloo instead and the school would be asked to remind parents to use this, and not the pavement.

A number of stiles had been replaced with new kissing gates. A large patch of Japanese knotweed growing in a field near a public footpath would be reported to NSC.

**Enforcements:** NSC would be informed of a possible breach of planning in Felton, comprising a possibly unauthorised stable block, residence in a caravan and use of a field for airport parking.

**Felton Common:** It was agreed to write to the airport asking them to provide assistance to the volunteer litter pickers by regularly undertaking litter picking of the areas where airport traffic waited. It was also agreed to purchase ten heavy-duty litter pickers for gifting to local volunteers. Following a complaint from a resident, it was agreed to look at placing an appropriately sized boulder at the entrance to the track leading from Felton Lane past Rock Cottage, in order to deter large vehicles from attempting to drive it.

**Airport:** The meeting heard a report of a constructive meeting of the airport's Passengers with Reduced Mobility Forum, where the accessibility of the proposed new multi-storey carpark and passenger transport interchange had been considered. The red lining on the A38 and the access to Felton Allotments was with NSC's contractors, but it was not known when the work would be programmed. It was not clear who would take responsibility for funding the new signage directing people to the free waiting zone.

The Parish Council discussed a request to apply for a reduction in council tax in the Parish, under the Valuation Office's "changes in the local area" criterion, to reflect the impact of the expansion of the airport. The Clerk explained that this required evidence of house values having been negatively affected, and was not based on nuisance to local residents. Anecdotal evidence was insufficient, and it was agreed not to pursue this further unless substantiated evidence could be provided.

**Compost site & allotments:** Following complaints of anti-social behaviour, the police would be asked to keep an eye on the entrance to the compost site where several cars were congregating at night. Openreach was asking for a very large deposit, with possible further costs, for moving/removing the telephone pole at the compost site. Since this was in the way of the proposed diverted footpath, it was agreed to look at the feasibility of creating an entrance further along the hedge line. A revised plan would then be submitted to NSC

**Finance:** A revised budget for 2023/24 was considered and agreed. Particular attention was drawn to the situation regarding the council's reserves which had increased slightly in 2022/23. In addition to the general working reserve, earmarked sums were approved.

**Any other business:** It was noted that notices regarding the airport's intention to compulsory purchase land for A38 improvements had now been posted. After many years' of service, the Parish Tree Warden had relinquished her role, and a volunteer to replace her was needed.

#### Report of Annual Winford Parish Council Meeting - Wednesday 10 May 2023

**Election of Chairman and Deputy Chairman of the Council for the next year:** It was unanimously agreed to re-elect Paul Hatherell as Chair of the Parish Council, and to elect Karen Bye as Vice Chair. Gill Patch and Margaret Webster were co-opted to fill vacancies remaining after the recent election, and it was agreed in

her absence to co-opt Holly Salmon at the June meeting. This left three vacancies for Felton ward still to be filled.

Minutes of previous meeting – matters arising: The airport had been asked about providing a litter picking service, and had responded that one had been undertaken recently. It was noted, however, that the litter had built up again after only a couple of days. Photos of the problem would be sent to the airport.

**Open Forum:** Three members of the public attended. An attendee raised her concern at what she termed "planning creep", in particular the extension of the cattle market development into green fields and the unauthorised construction of a residential property at a farm on Dundry Lane. A representative of the farm had also attended to explain why their recent planning application did not include the residential development and told the meeting that the application would be withdrawn and resubmitted to include both the proposed agricultural and residential elements. A resident explained that a small group was looking at protecting the amenity of a field in Winford where an application for housing development had recently been withdrawn. The idea would be to purchase it and turn it into a community orchard. This was at a very early stage and the landowner had not yet been approached. It was agreed to discuss this at the next Parish Council meeting.

**Highways and footpaths:** A North Somerset Council (NSC) Highways Structures Manager attended to explain the options for replacing the cattle grid at the end of West Lane. It would be very expensive to replace it with a new one designed to withstand the current highways loadings; an alternative would be to create an appropriate foundation and infill it so that a cattle grid could be installed if needed in the future. The Parish Council recognised that, despite the heritage value, it was currently difficult to justify the expense of a new grid and that future-proofed infilling seemed to offer a good solution. It was agreed that, before a decision was made, NSC would provide detailed plans of what was proposed and a firm assurance that a cattle grid would be provided if needed in future. The Clerk would write to NSC about the adjacent horse and cart gate and the possibility of this being blocked off in a way that would deter parking and allow for future reinstatement.

A damaged road sign by Walnut Tree Farm would be reported to NSC. In Felton, Woodspring Ramblers had installed two new stiles and repaired one. It was agreed to write to the NSC footpaths officer thanking him and asking him to pass on the Parish Council's thanks to the Ramblers.

**Felton Common:** The Working Party was investigating the cost of purchasing additional stones to place alongside the track from Church Trees. A complaint had been received about vehicles parking on an access track. It was agreed to reply that parking was a perennial problem that the Parish Council was not equipped to manage. One alternative would be to stop parking in that area altogether, but since this was likely to be highly unpopular with both residents and other legitimate users of the Common, this option was not being considered. It was noted that 20 acres of land adjacent to the Common had been purchased, and it was agreed that close monitoring would be needed to ensure that the new owner did not try to access it by driving across the Common.

**Compost site/allotments:** A further load of 70.76 tonnes of green waste had been removed from the compost site. The alternative route for the footpath at the compost site had now been cleared by the contractor, and NSC had been asked to progress the formal diversion. It was noted that the cost of the allotment plots (£22-£33 per annum) was very reasonable, and there were vacancies on both sites. Future maintenance of the wildlife conservation area at the Felton site was a concern, following the retirement of one of the most active plot holders.

**Airport:** It was agreed to continue to seek confirmation of the Parish Council's understanding that the airport would fund the new signage to the 1 Hour Free Waiting Zone.

**Any other business:** The Clerk would chase a response from NSC regarding the responsibilities of a tree warden, and seek a volunteer for the role via social media and the village magazine.

The date of the July Parish Council meeting was changed from 17 July to 10 July to allow for the Clerk's annual leave.
