From the Rector

Dear Friends,

Christ is Risen! The Lord is Risen indeed! Alleluia!

Those words of Easter praise still resound in these weeks after Easter — a period of fifty days lasting from Easter until Pentecost. In the church, it is a time of celebration above all celebrations; we thank God for the day when despair turned to hope; the day when death was crushed and new life came from the depths of hopelessness.

If we were to try and summarise all of this in a single emotion, a single response, what would it be? What word would you choose to express your feelings this Easter? Actually, let me ask the same question in two different ways: first, what do you think your response to Easter should be; secondly, and more importantly, how do you actually feel at this Eastertide?

I've framed that question in that way deliberately because I think we lose much of the meaning of Easter if we allow ourselves just to be carried along by the sort of feelings that other people might expect us to have, rather than to look inwards and approach Easter from where we actually find ourselves. Certainly, the Easter egg and card manufacturers, the supermarkets, even the Church give the impression that this season is about a single feeling: Joy.

It helps that Easter is celebrated in Spring and with such beautiful weather this year it's indeed a joyful occasion for many people. But the same might not necessarily be true of you; you might be feeling far from joyful this Easter, and if that's the case I want to tell you that that's OK, too. You're not getting Easter wrong; if anything, by taking time to pause and reflect this Easter – in a time of recovery from pandemic; in a time of war in Europe — I think you're getting closer to the heart of Easter than you might think.

I say this because it is useful to turn to the Easter Gospels with fresh ears and understand how those witnesses to the Resurrection of Jesus on that first Easter morning felt; not how we imagine they should have felt, but how they actually felt. In the Gospels it is the women who discover the empty tomb. Are they filled with joy? Far from it. St Luke tells us they were terrified and perplexed! They found the empty tomb, the place of resurrection, that place of new life, of hope, and far from embracing it and rejoicng in it, they found themselves running away from it. That Resurrection Joy was too much for them and others to bear. They eventually found the strength to come to terms with what they had witnessed and they told others; otherwise we wouldn't have a gospel to share. But their immediate reaction was far from joyful.

Terror, fear, uncertainty. Maybe those sorts of emotions chime with where our world finds itself this Easter; a time of joy, but not necessarily joy as we understand it. If we're not careful we can be guilty as Christians of giving the impression that our faith requires us to live in a constant state of joyful optimism, oblivious to the ups and downs of life. We confuse Easter hope with blind optimism and Resurrection joy with surface joy; putting a brave face on it. The Risen Christ doesn't call us to be people who are naive, in denial of the realities of this world — but as Christians we are to face them with hope because of the Resurrection. If we are to stand at the empty tomb and bear witness to the risen Jesus as his friends did, we must be prepared

to look long and hard into the darkness and despair of that tomb before we see the reality of that new life.

In the middle of the pain and suffering of this world may you find that deep peace at this joyful Eastertide, wherever you are on your journey of faith, wherever you find yourself as together we stare into that empty tomb and remind ourselves that only in the depth of that darkness can we find new life in our Risen Lord Jesus. Alleluia!

Life in Abundance

A message from Brian Castle, Honorary Assistant Bishop for Bath and Wells

It all happened so quickly. I went to A&E with severe back-pain which affected my mobility. The NHS was outstanding. Within a dizzying few hours, I heard I would need an immediate MRI scan and possibly rods to support my spine. I dreaded the thought of going into the scanner, let alone the surgery. As I was being wheeled along the corridor, Lauren, my Godson's 10-year-old daughter, came into my mind.

Lauren is a talented girl passionate about football. Just over a year ago, it was discovered that she had a growth at the base of the spine which would need radical treatment to prevent spinal curvature. She would also require rods in her back which could be regularly extended by surgery as she grew into adulthood. In addition, this ten-year-old would be spending lonely hours in a soul-less scanner. Lauren is lovingly supported by her wonderful family and magnificently treated by NHS professionals, but while it can be shared, the load is ultimately hers to carry. Parents bear the agony of powerlessness. In the middle of this painful dilemma, young Lauren is instinctively grabbing the God-given gift of abundant life which is for all and which lies at the heart of the Gospel. As we get older, less passionate and more cynical we can lose faith in this gift.

As I was being taken to the radiology department, I realised that I was being strengthened and inspired by this young girl, six decades my junior, facing far greater challenges than me. My own fears were being transformed by Jesus Christ's gift of life mediated through Lauren's courage. Life may turn out differently from what we expect, but that does not restrict its abundance.

The young are an inspiration. It is the role of the older generation to ensure they can grow into the special people God has created them to be so that they can release the gifts they have for us all. Thanks, Lauren. Despite all she faces, Lauren continues to play football **+Brian**

Do you know what's on your children's phones?

We have been made aware of a sexually explicit video involving child sexual offences being distributed among school pupils. The purpose of this segment is to make you aware that the child you have responsibility for may have this or other indecent images on their electronic devices which they may have been sent.

It is an offence to make, possess or distribute such images and these are very serious criminal offences with serious consequences that can result in life-long repercussions, even if it is an indecent image that the child has taken themselves.

None of us wants to see young people being criminalised so I am appealing to you to check the mobile phone / tablet / computer of the child you have responsibility for and ensure that any such images that are on the device are permanently deleted. In an age of cloud storage and device syncing such content is not something that anyone wants to reappear at a later date as the offence would still be committed at that point in time.

I am aware that many apps that are being used by school pupils have age restrictions so the child you have responsibility for may not be of an age to use them and I would advise that these are also deleted for their protection. I would also urge you to frequently and robustly inspect these devices as part of your caring responsibilities. Thank you!

Activities for Ukranian Refugees

I am one of the volunteer coordinators in Chew Magna who is helping the 49 sponsors throughout the Chew Valley who have volunteered to host Ukrainian refugees in their homes. Specifically, I am investigating "social activities" for all ages that we could introduce refugees to -- activities like coffee gatherings, mother and child groups, exercise programs, events and others. We want to help these refugees with the long process of rebuilding their lives through social interaction and engagement within their new community.

Winford Parish Council Meeting - Monday 21 March 2022

Minutes of previous meeting: District Councillor Hugh Gregor said that he would be informing North Somerset Council's (NSC) Enforcement Officer that residents of Dundry Parish had also complained about the lights at the Cattle Market, and that there were bat colonies nearby.

Open Forum: Three members of the public attended. The Parish Council was asked if any funding would be available for the residents of Felton to hold a street party in celebration of the Platinum Jubilee. The Chair explained that funding would only be available for non-commercial parties, and that there would be various obligations on the organisers, such as applying for a street closure. Winford village was organising a party that Felton residents would be invited to attend. A resident raised the problem of cars using a passing place on Currells Lane for airport parking, and asked whether an official passing place sign could be placed there. It was agreed to ask NSC if this would be possible.

Highways and footpaths: Potholes on Lower Strode had been reported. It was agreed to remind NSC that the surface of the carriageway between Lower Strode Farm and Manor Farm required attention. The Parish Council had been invoiced for their contribution towards footpath works in the Parish; this included eight new pedestrian gates and two sections of steps. Further improvement works were planned, depending on the contractor's workplan. The Rocks Lane restricted byway was badly littered and generally messy, and it

was agreed to contact Bristol Water again, asking that they cut back the vegetation around the water tank and repair the fencing. Dumped green waste at the junction of Rocks Lane with Dial Lane would be reported to NSC.

Planning matters: Consultation on the draft North Somerset Preferred Options Local Plan 2038 was due to end on 29 April 2022. Proposals directly affecting the Parish were: minor amendments to Winford and Felton settlement boundaries (to incorporate residential curtilages and address some small anomalies), and a proposal that Felton and Winford be inset from the greenbelt (rather than "washed over" as presently). NSC had provided a list of live enforcement actions in the Parish, although this was somewhat out of date.

It was agreed to inform the Enforcements Officer that the case involving an untidy property in Hillview Gardens could be closed, because the owners had tidied it up. An update would be requested regarding the long-standing complaint about a rural workers' dwelling that appeared to have been let on the open market. It was agreed to report a possible case of unauthorised airport parking on Chew Road.

Felton Common: It was noted that vehicles had been driving over the Common again. The placing of stones alongside the track running from Church Trees to Church View had been delayed due to adverse ground conditions, but was expected to be completed shortly.

Play areas: The basket swing needed to be removed because people were taking the warning tape off and using it. A quote still needed to be obtained for repairing it.

Compost site/allotments: It was not possible to determine the future viability of the compost site until NSC supplied a figure for future reimbursement. It was agreed to write to the Chief Executive of NSC again, asking for a definite date by which the figure would be provided. In the meantime, the Working Party had agreed that, from 1 April, compost would no longer be provided free of charge (future cost to be determined).

Two loads of green waste had been removed, and it was agreed to pay for another to ensure that, should the site need to be closed, it would be relatively empty when this was done.

Airport: Following a national review by the Airport Environment Federation, questions had been raised about the independence of airport consultative committees and their effectiveness at ensuring that a range of views was heard. The Parish Council's representative aimed to ensure that these issues were addressed by Bristol Airport's Consultative Committee, to identify ways to facilitate meaningful discussions. The Chair of the Parish Councils' Airport Association had requested a seat on the Committee.

Finance: A Budget for 2022/23 was discussed and agreed. Due to the uncertainties regarding the green waste scheme, no provision had been made for income or expenditure. This would be re-visited once NSC had provided clarification of the future financing of such schemes. It was agreed unanimously that the 2021/22 pay increase for officers published by NALC should be backdated and implemented.

Any other business: It was agreed to contribute £300 towards the costs of a Platinum Jubilee Street Party being organised for Winford and Felton residents. A source of good quality, bone china commemorative mugs had been identified, and it was agreed to purchase these for distribution to local children, at a cost of £1,763.76 including VAT.
