From the Rector



I hope you have managed to find time for rest and refreshment over the summer months. We haven't really had the best weather for relaxing in the garden or for taking long walks outdoors. Nonetheless we are told that taking time to reset and recharge is important—even if some of us find it easier than others.

The Bible says a lot about the importance of rest and refreshment. In fact, taking time off was built into God's creation plan for the world!

The Book of Genesis tells us that at the very beginning of time, after God had created the entire universe—from the stars to the tiniest creatures—the first thing he did was to stop and rest (Genesis 2: 2–3). God instructs us to do the same—one of the Ten Commandments tells us to keep the 'Sabbath'.

In the Christian tradition, the Sabbath is observed every Sunday—the day when we should pause, step away from the busyness of the word and turn our attention to worshipping the one who gives us life. We do so because Sunday is also the day of New Life. Sunday was the day that Jesus rose from the dead and gave the ultimate gift of refreshment to everyone who believes in him—new life through knowing him and loving him.

Of all the Commandments and instructions which God gives us, perhaps this is one of the hardest to keep. The pressures of life take over so easily and we find the thought of pausing impossible. But God wants us to do exactly that: 'Be still and know that I am God' (Psalm 46:10).

Whether you feel well-rested at the moment, or whether you are feeling completely burned out, maybe that can be our simple prayer in the middle of all the bustle of life: 'Lord, help me be still and know you'. Amen.

Learn from the Master

When you hear the word 'disciple', what comes into your mind? A learner? A follower? A super Christian? Someone kitted out in Biblical dress complete with robe, sandals, tea towel head covering and beard?

The New Testament's word for disciple doesn't quite match any of these descriptions. It's much closer to the word we'd use in English for 'apprentice'.

Back in history, and still today, to be an apprentice meant spending time in the presence of a master in order to learn a craft – maybe carpentry, or blacksmithing, baking or butchery. You'd start out doing the simple stuff – sweeping floors or sharpening tools. Then gradually you'd acquire more and more skills until you learnt to work confidently with materials producing beautiful things, products of utility and worth. Apprentices often learnt their craft while living alongside their masters, becoming members of their trade through time spent together at work and rest and play.

Jesus was often called 'the carpenter's son' – apprenticed to his worldly father Joseph, growing in skill at the plane and the lathe. He was also the apprentice of his heavenly father. The Gospels speak of Jesus withdrawing to spend time with God in order to know God's mind, hear God's voice, grow in God's ways.

Apprenticeship was and is a story of growth, development, discovery and change. It's the journey that Jesus invites us to take with him too – of baby steps and toddler stumbles, of emerging skill and increasing understanding.

Churches near you are offering opportunities to apprentice yourself to Jesus this autumn - from practical action that gets you involved in Jesus's service to the world, to learning and discussion that comes with courses such as Alpha, Exploring Christianity or Pilgrim.

Why not sign yourself up and learn from the Master?

New website shares Abbey history

With almost 1,500 memorials, **Bath Abbey** probably has more commemorative wall tablets and gravestones than any other church in England. Spanning the 16th to the 20th centuries, the life stories they tell are a fascinating part of the Abbey's rich history.

The new memorial website is the result of eight years of research by Bath Abbey's archive team of staff and volunteers, which was carried out as part of the Footprint Project funded largely by the National Lottery Heritage Fund.

Winford Community Orchard Action Group Update

In less than a month since our establishment on the 5th of July we raised almost £28k of local pledges, membership subscriptions and crowdfunding which enabled a substantive offer to be made to Killen's Informal Tender on the 4th August.

Unfortunately, we heard on the 10th August that our offer had been unsuccessful, and the vendor had accepted an offer from a higher bidder though one assumes the sale will not be completed until all the legal processes have been completed. We have therefore told Killens we are still interested if the sale falls through.

Due to the Tender process, we do not know the identity of the purchaser, what they offered or more importantly what they intend to do with the land, we can only hope it is something appropriate and in keeping with the past uses of the field.

Through this article we hope they will make themselves known to the community together with their intentions for the land.

Barrow Gurney First XI had managed to push themselves into 4th place In Division 4 at mid-season following 2 good wins against Blagdon and St Mary Redcliffe. Guy Fisher made an important 65 in a low scoring game at Blagdon, to set up a chance for bowlers Ed Holdaway (3/30), Mark Fisher (3/30) and Frank Forge (3/30) to take the team to victory. At Redcliffe it was an heroic half century from the injured Ben Hodges, batting on one leg, in partnership with Josh Yelland, which set up a total that the opposition only briefly threatened to get. Four wickets for Mark Fisher and 3 from Kieran Owen supported by an excellent performance in the field decided the matter.

Rain then washed out the next 3 of the next 4 games. Nevertheless the First XI, when they have been able to play have enjoyed further success. Away at Long Ashton on a tricky pitch, Barrow put up 158 thanks to another half century from Mark Brown in a good partnership with Josh Yelland. Ed Holdway then took a hat trick to leave Long Ashton reeling at 20-5 and added a further 2 wickets as Barrow finished the home side off for only 91.

Away at Chilcompton rain reduced the game to 20 overs, and after a tame start, Jason Cryans (55) and Phil Milton (22) got the score moving and when Mark Fisher helped take 17 off the last over, a total of 131-7 was better than it might have been. Chilcompton seemed be cruising at halfway at 62-1 but some accurate bowling from Milton, in partnership with Guy Fisher, slowed the rate to a crawl. Ed Holdaway then worked his magic again this time taking 3 wickets in 4 balls, having an appeal turned down for another hat trick. With this coming at a time when the opposition needed 30 off 3 overs, Mark Fisher was able to bowl Barrow to the win. So, the team are closing on third place with 3 games to go.

The second XI are in mid table (In Division 13) after some good performances. Top among them being a maiden century from Sam Mitchell (116 not out) against Bradley Stoke 4ths, which he then followed up with a half century against Abbots Leigh to set up a second consecutive victory. Debutant Matt Edgar also made a half century in that game. Like the firsts more games were lost to the weather and the team have only been able to get in one League game in the last month, with a bye week on one of the dry weekends! Nevertheless, a good home win against Hambrook 3rds keeps them on track for a good finish to the season.

The midweek XI were disappointing in their final outing at Stoke Bishop getting bowled out for only 47 to lose their first game of the season. The team are now waiting for other results to determine whether they win their division.

Meanwhile the club welcomed back players from yesteryear with the annual Legends game. A beautiful day at Hobbs Lane and with the barbecue fired up it was good to catch up with old friends and supporters. The Legends team won this year, which I am sure they will never mention!

Finally the club are delighted to acknowledge the generosity of the charity London Hearts in providing a free defibrillator that will be available during matches and training: although of course it is to be hoped that it will not need to be used.

- Or write to: Bristol Airport, Noise Complaints, Lulsgate House, Bristol, BS48 3DW. Residents
 will need to provide the same information including name, address, date, time of incident, and
 relevant information as per the previous noise reporting telephone line.

The website will be updated with the above information.

All complaints are responded to and recorded, with statistics being publicly reported to the Airport Consultative Committee and within Bristol Airport's, Annual Monitoring Report.

Winford Parish Council Meeting - Monday 10 July 2023

Open Forum: Eight members of the public attended. Two of attendees asked whether anything could be done to reduce speeding in Felton, on Felton Street and by people using Currells Lane and Stanshalls Lane as a cut through. The Chair explained that new speed limits had recently been introduced after several years of trying, but despite a Parish Council request for a 20mph zone, North Somerset Council (NSC) had agreed only to reduce speed limits to 30/40mph. It was agreed to request a 20mph zone again. It was also agreed to seek volunteers for Community Speedwatch, via social media and the village magazine. The installation of speed bumps on Felton Street was mentioned as an idea, but the Chair responded that this was unlikely to be acceptable to residents.

Two members of the public spoke to float the idea of a deal involving the transfer of Felton Allotment land in return for an allotment site elsewhere. They hadn't identified an alternative site yet, and no details of what the deal might involve were proposed at this stage, but they wanted to hear the Parish Council's initial thoughts on the idea. It was agreed to put this on the agenda for discussion at the next meeting.

Highways and footpaths: An email had been received from NSC Highways regarding the proposed reversible removal of the cattle grid at West Lane. It was agreed to wait for a detailed design before commenting. A new footpath bridge had been installed in Winford, a vast improvement making the footpath much more accessible. The footpath budget had also been earmarked for possible stile improvements, and maybe a new footpath bridge in Regil as well. The upper part of the urban link footpath from High Winford to Marketplace Steps had become narrow due to vegetation, and was very muddy in places. It was agreed to look into the possibility of NSC undertaking remedial works under their Active

Travel Strategy. Now that the telegraph pole had been removed, there was no impediment to the diversion of the footpath running across the compost site. The Clerk would chase NSC regarding the progress of the diversion application. It was agreed that the Footpaths Working Party should expand their remit to include road safety/active travel.

Felton Common: No further solicitor's advice had been received regarding access to adjacent land across the Common, but it appeared more likely that Hay Lane would be used. This was a bridleway, so could only be used for access if there was legal permission. There were insufficient stones to do everything the working party wanted to do to deter driving on the Common; the working party would continue to look for a reasonably priced source.

Airport: The red lining had been installed on the A38 and the access to Felton Allotments, but was not making any apparent difference to the number of cars parking/waiting on the allotments access road. It was agreed to write to the airport police expressing disappointment that they didn't appear to be policing it and that the lining had made no difference, representing very poor value for money for the local community. The Clerk would request a meeting with the police and the airport to discuss. The Parish Council was concerned by information from the airport that, following approval of the 12 million passenger per annum planning application, the criteria for the Community Fund were being revised and would be much more restrictive. The Clerk would write to NSC requesting input into these discussions, and Councillor Patch would ask for an update at the Consultative Committee.

Under the latest round, Winford residents had received over £42,000 from the Community Fund towards noise insulation measures, representing c.50% of the total awarded under this criterion.

Compost site & allotments: All the green waste had been cleared from the compost site the previous week. The Parish Council continued to seek reimbursement from NSC for the cost of dealing with green waste.

Potential new community orchard, land off Chew Road, Winford: The Parish Council considered a request for a grant towards the purchase of land in Winford for a community orchard. Given the lack of other sources of funding it was not considered a viable proposition. The Parish Council had very specific rules about what it could spend money on. They were concerned that the land was very overvalued and about the lack of detail about the constitution of the organisation that the money would be granted to. These factors made it very difficult for the Parish Council to legally support the proposal at the scale of funding needed, and it was agreed not to make a grant for this purpose.

Any other business: The Clerk would chase the larger "No dogs allowed" signage that had been promised for Vee Lane Play area. The broken picnic table would be removed and the Clerk would apply to the Airport Community Fund for a grant towards the purchase of four new composite picnic tables, including, if possible, a smaller children's one. A repair for the rocker was being pursued. It was agreed to remove the litter bin from Walton Crescent play area, because, rather than being used by visitors to the play area, it was always full of general waste and dog poo bags that should have been put into householder's bins.

A contractor would be engaged to cutback the vegetation on the corner opposite the junction of Regil Lane with the B3130 to improve visibility.

Assuming that a replacement for the retiring lollipop lady could be found, further sponsorship of the school crossing patrol would be sought in October/November.
