# From the Rector

Dear Friends,

The winter months of early darkness and shortening days will soon be punctuated by many thousands of tiny, blazing lights. Homes, schools, businesses and churches in our villages will be bathed in the glow of countless glistening fairly lights and candles each evening in the run-up to Christmas.

In church, the four weeks preceding Christmas are set aside as a special time for preparation. This season of Advent is really all about darkness, and how darkness was broken by a wonderful light. 'The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light' wrote the prophet Isaiah in the Old Testament, foretelling that our dark world would one day be visited by a great light and would never be the same again.

The season of Advent is important not just because it gives us an opportunity to step aside from the busyness of December. As we enjoy the festive glow of Christmas lights, let's remember the 'true light' of the world who came to save us from the darkness.

May the peace of the Light of the World, the Christ-child, shine into your homes and your lives this Christmas.

# Avon Wildlife Trust - Chew Valley Group

# Thursday January 23<sup>rd</sup> 2025: Avon Wildlife Trust Chew Valley Group Dormice. Talk by Cathy Mayne.

The national monitoring programme run by PTES (People's Trust for Endangered Species) shows the population of Hazel Dormice has declined by over two-thirds since 2000, with the species hanging on mostly in southern parts of England and Wales. Climate change, as well as changes in woodland management, farming practices and loss of hedgerows, have all taken a heavy toll on their living space Find out how the dormice are faring locally and hear the latest updates on the breeding and reintroduction programme. This illustrated talk will be given by local ecologist and environmental education tutor Cathy Mayne.

# <u>Three Digs – An Archaeological afternoon with Dr Peter Guest and Dr Mike Watts.</u> Millennium Hall, Old School Room, Chew Magna.

**3.00 pm Sunday 12<sup>th</sup> January 2025. Admission £5.00. Proceeds for the Pound restoration**. Beneath the England that we can see are huge unrecorded, unmarked settlements and treasures, each even more valuable than the 2584 silver pennies discovered in the Chew Valley. Three sites have been discovered and partly researched in recent years, but they had to be hidden again.

The story of serendipity and recent investigative science is part of the fascinating and, at times, amusing, but constantly interesting, illustrated talk.

Explanation of why the treasures, mosaics of late Roman antiquity, are now hidden. Details of some of the amazing, beautiful discoveries. The portable treasures are now housed in the British Museum, with examples on the poster at Chew Magna Post Office.

The archaeological digs were organised by the British Museum, with the digging undertaken by archaeological university students.

#### Festive Customs and Traditions – Colin Chapman

## Parish Council News from Annemieke Waite, District Councillor

Dear All,

### <u>Budget</u>

In September, I wrote before about the difficult financial situation we find ourselves in at North Somerset Council. So, we are still looking for additional cuts in our budgets, but areas where we can cut back are harder and harder to identify.

Part of our problem is that our budget – calculated per head of the population – is much lower than it is at other, similar councils. There are many historic reasons for this, but mostly because the formula the government uses to make their calculations works to the advantage of some areas but to the disadvantage for others. We fit into the 'others' group. This means that many other councils have a much higher grant per head of the population than we do, and we don't think this is fair.

But there is something you can do to help:

#### **Petition Our Government**

We have started a petition to the government for fairer funding. You can read about it and sign our petition online by going to the website https://northsomersetlife.co.uk/news/nov24-02

Many people have already done so, but the more that sign, the better it is. We really **must** raise awareness of the unfairness of the current financial settlements.

### Spending Other People's Money

I'm often asked by people how it is possible that we have a budget shortfall, but that we are restoring Birnbeck Pier and the High Street in Weston-super-Mare, are working on the Banwell Bypass and will be buying 24 electric buses in 2025

The reason is that all this will be paid for by external funding that is specifically for those projects. This means that the funding does not come out of our regular council budget. It also means this funding cannot be used for fixing potholes or paying for better, more regular public transport. As much as I'd love us to spend a lot more money fixing our roads (for instance) this can only happen if we are given a bigger budget. This is why I'd love you all to sign our petition!

### Fancy a Whole Month of Free Bus Travel?

All North Somerset residents can get a whole month of free bus travel in their birthday month. This scheme is open between the 1<sup>st</sup> December 2024 until the 30 November 2025. In the last year, 72,000 people applied for a birthday bus pass, and more than 1 million free journeys were made as a result! And this year, for the first time, those under 21 get 2 months' worth of free travel!

# Winford Parish Council Meeting – Monday 21st October 2024

## **Co-option of Parish Councillor**

John Gallagher was co-opted as a Parish Councillor representing Felton Ward

Councillor Jim Webster had tendered his resignation from the Parish Council and was thanked for all his contributions.

### Public Transport Serving the Parish

A resident of Winford had raised concerns that children attending Chew Valley 6<sup>th</sup> Form were no longer entitled to utilise school transport to and from the school. District Councillor Waite explained this was an issue replicated nationally as a result of new legislation regarding accessibility for users.

The Big Lemon bus service was being utilised by local residents, with daily numbers exceeding initial expectations. A more detailed map of stops would be displayed on community notice boards and leaflets are in the process of being distributed to residents.

### Highways and footpaths

North Somerset Council (NSC) had reviewed pedestrian access to and from Winford Primary School and were in the process of developing plans for a consultation on road safety improvements in this area. It was agreed that the Clerk would contact the owner of an overgrown bush preventing ease of access along a footpath and a general reminder to home owners of their responsibilities would also be visible on the Parish Council's social media account.

District Councillor Waite had received a complaint from a resident of Kingdown regarding traffic and speeding issues. A site meeting would be arranged between District Councillor Waite, members of the Parish Council, residents of Kingdown and NSC's Executive Member for Transport in order to understand the issues.

It was noted that NSC have removed the Cattle Grid on Felton Lane due to the structure failing and posing a hazard to road users. It was agreed that the Clerk would write to the Head of Highways at NSC reminding them of rights associated with Common Land.

A large number of cones placed on various highways in Felton had been removed. The person and/or organisation responsible had not yet been identified.

It was noted that a car had been seemingly abandoned on Winford High Street. The vehicle was taxed, had a valid MOT and was not causing a hazard or obstruction.

The Parish Council were made aware of a large presence of mud on the A38 at Potters Hill due to heavy rain and nearby fields being utilised for airport parking. District Councillor Waite had already raised this with NSC who were looking into the matter.

## Felton Common

The identity of an organisation suspected to be using the common for business purposes had been established. It was agreed that the Clerk would write to the business involved requesting they immediately cease using the location for this purpose.

It was brought to the attention of the Parish Council that vehicles were parking on the grass due to a lack of space in the parking area. After a lengthy discussion the situation was not able to be resolved.

## Airport

District Councillor Waite was continuing to liaise with representatives from the airport regarding their flight data.

## Compost site & allotments

There continues to be an issue with green waste being left on the footpath at the compost site. The Parish Council would attend a site visit to review.

Any other business It was agreed the Clerk would continue to seek an update from the owner of Winford Manor as to whether this was still be utilised by the Home Office. Next meeting: Monday 18<sup>th</sup> November October 2024, 7.30pm Felton Village Hall
