Due to the fact that bad weather predictions kept a great many people from the scheduled MCWRA meeting in Springfield, Missouri, on Feb. 8, a quorum of board members was not in attendance, as reported by President Willie Huckabee.

The president was endeavoring to set up a meeting in conjunction with the annual period ball March 1. However, at last count, the next meeting will not be held until August.

President Huckabee conducted a telephone poll as provided by the MCWRA by-laws, to accommodate the following probation requests, so that they will be in effect for the 1997 event season.

- The Indian Territory Cadet Corps, sponsored by TMR, has requested to be put on probation.
- The following units have requested that they be removed from the probationary period:

The Battle of Indian Creek, set for Rocky Mount, MO on April 19-20, is being sponsored by Wade's Battery.

Registration on site for the MCWRA sanctioned event and for early set up will be April 18, with April 19 to begin the event at 6 a.m. with rations at the pavilion. Rations will be eggs, potatoes, sausage, bread and onions. A tactical is planned from 8 to 11 a.m., with a ladies tea at the pavilion from 10:30 to 11:30 a.m.

The tactical will include issuance of a map of the 400 acre site, on which two flags will be hidden--one CS and one US-with the object to find, capture, defend and bring back to headquarters your opponent's flag.

A 12:30 p.m. picnic basket auction is being planned, with a battle on the front field at 3 p.m. Camp tours conducted by local Boy Scouts will be held from 4 to 6 p.m., followed by a pot luck dinner.

The ball will be at the Amvets 3 miles from the site. A map will be available at the pavilion for directions.

On Sunday of the event, rations again will be available at the pavilion at 6 a.m., with church services at the pavilion from 9 to 11 a.m. A fashion show at the same site is set for 12 noon, and the battle at the front field is set for 1 p.m.

Paul Kidwell, a Civil War buff in Poplar Bluff, MO, has an interesting service for CW questions, answers, trivia, this day in history, etc. To participate on the Internet: ww.pbmo.net (Poplar Bluff, MO) Pond Books of Doniphan, MO, has announced a new book by Jerry Ponder, *The Civil War Battle of Fredericktown, Missouri.*

In 1861 the U.S. government was pouring troops into Missouri to drive the elected government from the state and continue Missouri as part of the Union.

With limited resources, the state was fighting to remain neutral, soon forced by the U.S. Army to enter the Confederacy. As part of the effort, Missouri Gen. M. Jeff Thompson moved his division of state troops north, defeated the Illinois unit at Blackwell Station, near DeSoto, on the St. Louis-Iron Mtn. Railroad, burned bridges and destroyed tracks to disrupt rail transportation to the important federal outpost at Pilot Knob and Ironton.

The general then concentrated his cavalry, infantry and artillery troops at Fredericktown and prepared an ambush for the Union troops.

Federal forces, calling themselves the Army of SE Missouri, responded from Pilot Knob, St. Louis and Cape Girardeau. Most of the troops were from Illinois, but others were from lowa, Wisconsin and Indiana, plus a few provisional regiments trying to recruit citizens from Missouri.

On Oct. 21, 1861, the two armies met in a bloody, three hour battle on the south edge of Fredericktown, ending with the Missourians withdrawing as they had intended in their battle plan. Losses were severe and continued as a final skirmish was fought near Greenville.

Both sides claimed victory; the Federals because they continued in control of Fredericktown and had killed Gen. Thompson's second-incommand, Col. Aden Lowe; the Missourians throught they won because they had inflicted damages four to one upon the Union troops and managed to follow their battle plan to the letter.

All details have been ferreted out and the book is fully documented to make it an accurate account of the battle as well as the actions in Iron, Jefferson and St. François Counties. All action was strictly Missouri against the U.S. No Confederate troops were involved in the battle.

The book is 170 pages, indexed, with photos, maps, charts, and with a quality softcover. It is billed as the first documented account of the 1861 actions.

Cost is \$16.95 plus \$2 per book postage and packaging. Missouri residents add 80¢ per book sales tax.

Old soldier campaigning tricks

Let's face it . . . camping authenticly is uncomfortable at best, unhealthy at worst. One way the soldiers survived was by developing little tricks to make camp life more tolerable. Since these are as useful to reenactors as they were to the original soldiers, following is a list of "old soldier" tricks (with some modern ones tossed in). Although most will be well known to "old hands", I trust even they will pick up a trick or two.

HYGIENE

- Tuck your trouser cuffs into your socks. This will keep dirt and vermin off your leas. If the socks won't stay up by themselves, roll the tops down, or tie a string around the tops.
- To prevent an authentic case of heat rash or jock itch, apply zinc oxide ointment at the beginning of an event.
- · Use the first cup of water you boil in the morning, not for coffee, but to clean your face, ears, and (if applicable) eyeglasses.
- If your tunic gets sweat-soaked, turn it inside out and lay it on your tent to bake in the sun.

FIGHTING THE ELEMENTS

- To keep cool on a hot day, soak a handkerchief with water and put it on your head, under your hat.
- If you have a choice, wear a round-brimmed hat; it will keep both rain and sun off you better than a kepi.
- A rubber or oilcloth poncho is an excellent investment. You can use it as a raincoat, ground cloth, dew cover, to close off the end of a tent, or as the tent itself.
- The cape of an overcoat is not just ornamental. Throw it over your head as a hood, or roll it up around your neck as a muffler. Actually, an overcoat is not essential; you can use your blanket as an overcoat more easily than you can use your overcoat as a blanket.

ACCCOUTREMENTS

 A blanket roll is a lot easier to carry than a knapsack. Two hints: twisting the roll before you tie the ends together will help keep it from unrolling. Also, the blanket roll should rest on your left shoulder (so PITCHING YOUR TENT as not to interfere with firing).

- Wear your waistbelt over the shoulder slings of your cartridge box and haversack to keep them from flopping when you run.
- Does your bayonet scabbard slide around your belt as you march? Punch a hole in your belt and the inside of your bayonet frog, then use a brass paper clasp to attach the two.
- Straps on your canteen too long (e.g.: to hang on your ridge pole)? Tie off part of it to make a smaller loop.

CAMPING

- Two things every camp needs: a shovel and a hatchet (the latter with a claw to pull tent stakes).
- Need kindling to get a fire started? If you've got straw bedding, use a handful of that. Or use the hatchet to shave some wood chips off a log.

DINNERTIME

- Don't leave your tin cup over the fire without liquid in it, else the heat may melt the solder holding on the bottom.
- · Adding a wire handle to the top of your cup will make it a lot easier to lift it off the fire. A bayonet (socket side to fire) makes a good hook for this purpose.
- Speaking of bayonets, the socket makes a good candle holder.
- While the Civil War soldier used his bayonet or ramrod to skewer and hold food over the fire, I don't advise this for the reenactor who wants these items to last more than four years, since the heat may draw the hardening out of the steel.
- Tin cup too hot to drink out of? Rest the lip against the side of a full tin canteen to draw off some of the
- You don't need a frying pan if you have a tin plate. Just split a stick, wedge the edge of the plate into the split, and you have a frying pan.
- It doesn't take a gallon of water to clean your dishes. Thrust knives and forks repeatedly into some sandy soil. For your tin plate, use a handful of straw or grass to wipe off the big stuff, then some sand to scrub off the rest. A damp cloth suffices to finish the job.

- Camping on hard, lumpy ground? Use a shovel or bayonet to loosen up and contour the ground to your body before you pitch your tent.
- It's easier to put your straw and bedding down and pitch the tent over it than to try to pull the bedding in after you've pitched the tent.
- · For a "dog" tent that will stand up to the strongest winds, after you've pitched it, tie the uprights to the ridgepole and to the tent itself.

SLEEPING

- A canteen, cartridge box, or both, covered with an article of clothing, makes a serviceable pillow.
- A tent with the ends closed off is a lot warmer than one with open ends

Fulton site for 135th anniversary battle

The 135th anniversary of the Battle of Moore's Mill, near Fulton, MO, will be held Sept. 12-14. The event is a benefit to raise the funds necessary to build a monument to those men in both blue and gray, who fought for their ideas at Moore's Mill 135 years ago.

The MCWRA sanctioned event is being sponsored by the Elijah Gates Camp #570 Sons of Confederate Veterans-MO Division, and Erwin's 6th Missouri Infantry, Co. A, CSA.

The site consists of 1,000 acres of primitive land along the banks of the Auxvasse Creek, in northeast Callaway County, Missouri, located on the east side of the original battlefield.

All military participants whose pre-registration is postmarked on or before July 1, will be admitted. No non-MCWRA walk-ons will be allowed. In addition to the scripted historic battle scanding, there will also be bushwhacking and foraging scen-

Prairie Grove, Arkansas, as a great place for a reenactment. The battlefield was picture perfect. The weather held out for us but it was still freezing at night and warm during the day.

This was truly a great reenactment. But as at all reenactments, something happened to offend one side or the other. This time it was the Confederate reenactors that were offended.

The only path that led to the sutlers besides the main highway went through the Union camp. One of the Union units, I don't know which one, set up a picket on the path. The only way that we could get across is if we knew the password, or went down the highway.

And those of us who just stepped over the fence were escorted by harassing Union reenactors the whole way and back. Something that was brought to my attention was that an elderly lady in an electric wheelchair, escorted by her Confederate dressed son, was harassed to the point that she was very upset.

Now I can understand them asking us to go around while they are filming, but not force us to go around by raising their bayonets. This continued through the night, and the filming had stopped long before that.

Reenacting is meant to be fun for everyone, not just a handful of Union dressed reenactors. We Confederate reenactors didn't put a picket on the only path that led to the battlefield, which ran through our camp, because we didn't feel it was necessary.

All I'm asking is that the Union reenactors respect the Confederate reenactors as we respect them. Let's quit fighting each other and make this more fun for both sides. If we don't, reenacting will no longer live.
