Daily Devotion Week 4: Walking in God's Strength and Purpose

This week, Sydel focused on walking in God's strength and purpose. It's easy to forget that we don't have to rely on our own strength to get through life. But Scripture reminds us that God's power is always at work in us, guiding, strengthening, and leading us toward His purpose.

Ephesians 6:10 tells us to "be strong in the Lord and in His mighty power." Too often, we try to rely on our own abilities, but as 2

Corinthians 4:20 says, "the kingdom of God is not a matter of talk but of power." His power works through us when we surrender our plans to Him.

Proverbs 16:3 encourages us to commit our work to the Lord, and He will establish our steps. This is echoed in Jeremiah 29:11, where God promises He has "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future." Even when we feel weak or uncertain, **Philippians 4:13** reminds us that we can do all things through Christ who strengthens us.

But walking in God's strength isn't just about action—it's about trust. **Psalm 27:1 declares,** "The Lord is my light and my salvation—whom shall I fear?" and Exodus 14:14 reassures us that "The Lord will fight for you; you need only to be still." Sometimes, the strongest thing we can do is trust God and let Him lead.

Finally, **Ephesians 2:10** reminds us why we're here: "For we are God's handiwork, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do." We were made with a purpose, and God has already laid out the path—we just need to walk in it.

Reflection:

This message is a reminder that we don't have to figure everything out on our own. God gives us strength, direction, and purpose. When we lean on Him, He doesn't just guide us—He empowers us. So let's move forward with confidence, knowing He is with us every step of the way.

A Lesson in Humility: Jesus Washes His Disciples' Feet

In John 13, Jesus does something unexpected—He kneels down and washes the feet of His disciples. This was a servant's task, yet the Son of God took it upon Himself to show what true leadership looks like.

Pastor Mark reminded us that Jesus wasn't just cleaning feet—He was teaching a powerful lesson in humility, love, and service. If the King of Kings was willing to serve in the most lowly way, how much more should we serve one another?

This act also pointed to something greater: Jesus was about to cleanse more than just feet—He was about to cleanse hearts through His ultimate sacrifice on the cross.
