



Tori Whitlock Broadbent came to love the Appaloosa horse through the initial influence of her grandparents, Wes and Lynn Whitlock.






Spud-Nik, T-2707, by 'Poteet B 'out of 'Granny Jane'

In the early sixties, Wes and Lynn Whitlock teamed up with good friends Jerry and Sally Slocum to create Sun-Bar Training Stables in Poway, California. There, the team stood the famous stallion Spud-Nik, T-2707.

Sun-Bar Training Stables had many renowned appaloosas, to include Mr. Independence, Frauline, and Ouachita. Before the ApHC National Point system was established, all three of these horses excelled in the show ring up and down the coast of California. Both Wes and Lynn Whitlock were involved in training horses. Wes was partial to the roping and cutting horses, his wife, Lynn, was partial to training the Western Pleasure and trail horses. Appaloosas were booming in the sixties and seventies. The Whitlocks usually had 50 to 60 youths training at their facility. Some would stay the summer to show and learn. During this time, the Slocums and the Whitlocks established the Poway Valley Riders Association. This club is still in existence today, now relocated to Riverside, California.

Wes and Lynn had two sons, Kevin and


Frauline, A Spud-Nik daughter

Jeff, both active today in the horse industry. Kevin Whitlock, Tori's father, is the Vice President of Gilbert Promotional Corporation and Rodeo Chairman for Gilbert Rodeo Days. Jeff Whitlock is a trainer today in Southern California. Both Kevin and Jeff showed appaloosas and other breeds as they were growing up. The Whitlock brothers did participated in horse shows, but their true love was in the rodeo arenas, roping. Jeff Whitlock is shown here showing Mr. Independence, a.k.a., Indy. Born on the fourth of July, Indy was found in the backyard as a young colt. He grew to be such a large horse, he was used to aid the breaking of young colts. One weekend, he was used to break colts in the morning then went on to win the \$10,000 stock horse stake at the Del Mar Southern California Exposition.




Tori was a year and a half when her mother, Desiree Whitlock, bought Tori her first horse. By the age of two, Tori was riding by herself. As a pre-teen,

Tori competed in local gymkhana events. In high school, Tori competed in shows, gymkhanas and aiding horse events. She always took care of her horses, refusing to let her dad feed. Competitive in nature, she showed lambs and goats as well. Tori was

an achiever, participating in various rodeo and gymkhana competitions, succeeding in becoming the 2002 Gilbert Days Teen Queen.

As a young girl, Tori aspired to be a fire fighter. Little did she know she would end up fighting one of the biggest forest fires in Arizona, the Willow Fire, South of Payson. While still in high school Tori attended the East Valley Institute of Technology fire



fighting program. In the program, Tori received EVIT student of the year. Upon graduation, Tori started her career in fire fighting at the Bureau of Land Management. A mentor let her know that if she wanted to fight fires, she needed to apply for a position with the US Forest service in Payson. She applied, and got the job. She went to work out of the Payson ranger station. After one month, Tori was asked to join the Hot Shots, the elite fire fighting team. The Willow Fire broke out a few days later and she spent a month fighting that fire. She has been on the Fire department for the last six years at Johnson Ranch at Engine 841.

Fire fighting still allowed Tori time to pursue her love of horses. She fell in love with a young colt named Beyond Imagination, a.k.a., Pongo. Tori trained Pongo in games, succeeding at the top levels at the 2009 Appaloosa World show where Pongo earned a top-ten placing in Appaloosa Games Horse Association Futurity in the Nez Perez Stakes Race.


Tori is currently a trainer that specializes in games events. She has been the games champion of the Arizona Appaloosa Association at the past several shows. Her speedy horse, Pongo, has earned ROMs in Open Camas Prairie Stump

Race, Open Figure 8 Stake Race and Open Nez Perce Stake Race.

When not showing, Tori trains other riders general horsemanship skills and teaches more advanced riders the skills necessary to compete in gymkhana events. Tori is frequently seen supporting riders at local gymkhanas, helping them improve their horsemanship skills.

Current Activities

In 2010, the AAA asked Tori to accept the position of Vice-President that had been vacated the previous year. Tori accepted, then went on to win the re-election as Vice-President for the 2011-2012 term. In addition to Vice-President, Tori participates on the Show Committee, which organizes all AAA shows. Tori is not one to believe in spare time, so she has also volunteered to lead up the Parade committee, as the AAA will investigate supporting a parade later in the year.


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Spotted on the Trail




