# IBM History

## 1925–1929: IBM's early growth [\[edit\]](#)

Year	Gross income (in \$m)	Employees
1925	13	3,698

The newly minted IBM continued to develop its core cultural attributes during the 1920s. It launched an employee newspaper, *Business Machines*, which unified coverage of all of IBM's businesses under one publication. [\[33\]](#) It introduced the **Quarter Century Club**, [\[34\]](#) to honor employees with **25 years of service to the company**, and launched the **Hundred Percent Club**, to reward sales personnel who met their annual quotas. [\[35\]](#) In 1928, the Suggestion Plan program – which granted cash rewards to employees who contributed viable ideas on how to improve IBM products and procedures – made its debut. [\[36\]](#)

**Lew Ackert** began his 42 years at IBM in 1948 in Poughkeepsie. From there his career took him to Kingston and finally to San Jose. In San Jose he worked in various capacities on management information systems within information technology. He had served in the US Army Ordinance department in World War II.

**Al Arruiza** began his IBM career as a cost engineer, but soon joined the personnel (HR) organization as the administrator of the EOP program as it came together in IBM San Jose. Prior to IBM he served in the US Air Force

**Ron Boyle** had a varied 30 year IBM career, beginning in manufacturing engineering records. He later worked on planning and scheduling in production control and in GPD management. He was a US Navy veteran where he had served as a radar man on shipboard.

**Dick Doubrava** was a manager in the computer facility in building 26 and then later in his career he was a manager in facilities. His career spanned 30 years. He had served in the US Navy during the Korean War.

**Shel Ellis** was an engineer and later a manager in the lab. He worked on disk drives in building 26 and later managed a head disk assembly advanced development group.

**John Fox** began his IBM career in San Jose as a materials planning manager in production control, then transferred to Tucson where he variously managed a field support group for tape drives, and site services. He returned to San Jose in retirement. Prior to IBM he had served in the US Army.

**Norm Howery** was a manager of a number of groups within the quality assurance organization. He was formerly a pilot in the US Navy and he remained in the reserves for many years. In retirement he had been living in Sun City, Arizona.

**Shel Jacobs** had a 38 year IBM career, beginning in 1952 as a marketing representative in Chicago. In 1959 he transferred to Endicott, where he was the market planner for the 1401 system. He continued as a planner after his transfer to San Jose, where he remained, except for a stint in Armonk, until his retirement in 1990. He served on the Quarter Century Club board in various roles including club President.

**Hal Jenkins** had a 38 year IBM engineering career. He worked on disk storage and managed storage control engineering, responsible for storage control units such as the 2841, 3830 and 3880. He later transferred to Tucson and lived in Green Valley, Arizona.

**Don Lindahl** was an engineer in the lab. He worked in product test, the Los Gatos lab and did head and disk analytical work.

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**Joann Patch** worked as a secretary (“administrative assistant”) for more than 30 years in a wide variety of areas including accounting, industrial engineering and production control. During this time she was an executive secretary and had been a manager.

**Pete Potosky** was a valued member of the Board and was the web site developer and manager. His positive viewpoint and friendly manner will be missed

**Earle Rice** worked in storage products program management and then later in personnel programs and management development. He had served as a US Army officer and served for 15 years in the Army Reserves and the National Guard.

**Joe Russo** began his 33 year IBM career at 99 Notre Dame Avenue, providing financial support to the creators of the original RAMAC disk drive. In his later career he worked in many areas of the lab and served as a financial manager. He also was an advisor to, and served on the board of, the Quarter Century Club

**Dr. Willi Volksen** had a 38 year career in the Research Division. His specialty was polymer science

**Wally Weseman** worked in production control and later managed a manufacturing department responsible for machine covers. He was a former US Navy Sergeant and Marine Reservist.**John**

**John Yaccarine** retired in 1984 after a 32 year IBM career as a manager in production control. He began in Poughkeepsie and transferred to San Jose in 1957. In retirement he represented the Quarter Century Club while visiting ill members in hospitals and nursing homes, to bring them cheer. He was a US Army World War II veteran of the 4<sup>th</sup> Infantry Division.

## Magical China a Wondrous Adventure

Experience the mysteries of this ancient culture and immerse yourself in its amazing breathtaking country  
May 2020 - 16 days (exact date tbd)

Begin your day with a tai chi lesson as we sail the dramatic Xiling Gorge the longest section of the Three Gorges. Discover the state-of-the-art site; The Three Gorges Dam. Next day we will enjoy a remote ride in Pea Boats up the Shennv Stream. Return to our ship as we sail the Wu Gorge with its 12 forest-covered peaks. On to the dramatic cliffs that surround the Qutang Gorge. We will arrive at Shibaozhai (Precious Stone Fortress) with its 9 story red pagoda, at the top a picture perfect view of the river and surrounding countryside. Disembark in the mountain city of Chongqing and travel to Chengdu. The teahouse culture and leisurely lifestyle makes this city so captivating. In Chengdu we will visit the Giant Panda Breeding Research Base. On to Shanghai. We will take the super-fast Maglev train into central Shanghai and that evening be amazed at a Chinese acrobatics show. The next day we will explore Old Town, visit the magnificent Shanghai Museum. Explore the "Bund" which runs along the Huangpu River. You will have the opportunity of POST NIGHT addition to Hong Kong with its awe-inspiring skyline. Explore the famous Stanley Market and seaside village bazaar, visit Aberdeen Fishing Village. On to Macau the "Vegas of China". We are Still finalizing price for the basic trip and the Post Trip. ## CULTURAL TREASURES OF..... JAPAN

October 6-19, 2019

Our tour begins in the amazing city of Tokyo. While here we will visit the Imperial Palace, Niju Bridge and Sakurada Gardens. Our climb of the famous Tokyo tower will give us a amazing view of the city from high above. Throughout this tour we will explore ancient and modern Japanese Culture firsthand. Now on to the lakeside resort of Hakone, renowned for its hot springs. Take a ride on the Hakone Ropeway, an aerial cable car, for breathtaking views of Mt. Fuji. Next we cruise the deep blue waters of Lake Ashi, with epic mountain views. Today we journey to Takayama, where visit Matsumoto Castle. Next, step back in time in the rural Edo-period town of Takayama, nestled in the Japanese Alps. We will visit a 200-year-old sake brewery and later, a 600 year old open air market along the Miyagawa River. On our travels today to Kanazawa, we visit Shirakawa-go, with its gassho-zukuri-style houses with their thatched-rooftops. Our next stay is in Kyoto where we find more than 2000 temple and shrines. We Kinkakuji, the Golden Pavilion, a zen temple with two floors that are completely covered in gold leaf. We will also visit the Gion district, with its narrow lanes of teahouses. We now travel to Kyoto where we board the Shinkansen bullet train for Hiroshima. On this adventure we take a ferry to Miyajima Island to see the iconic Torii gate and the Itsukushima Shrine that appears to float on water. Now we are on the bullet train back to Kyoto. Today we tour Nijo Castle and later we get a lesson in the art of Japanese stenciling. We end our tour with a special kaiseki farewell dinner and Geisha show.

The cost of this amazing 14 Day tour is 6399.00 which includes hotel, air, air taxes, included tours, transfers and our roundtrip flight, out of SFO.
