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



EASTER FUN FACTS

What is the true meaning of Easter Sunday? Why does the date of Easter change every year? How is Easter calculated? Why are eggs associated with Easter? Here are some answers from The Old Farmer's Almanac.

What Is Easter Sunday?

Easter is the most important holiday on the Christian calendar—and has been regularly observed from the earliest days of the Church.

Easter Sunday celebrates Christ's resurrection from the dead, following crucifixion. It marks the end of Holy Week, the end of Lent, and the last day of the Easter Triduum (Holy Thursday, Good Friday, and Easter Sunday), as well as the beginning of the Easter season of the liturgical year.

The resurrection represents the triumph of good over evil, sin, death, and the physical body.

When Is Easter Sunday?

Easter is a "movable feast" and does not have a fixed date; however, it is always on a Sunday.

How Is the Date of Easter Determined?

Would you believe that the date of Easter is related to the full Moon? Specifically, Easter is celebrated on the first Sunday after the paschal full Moon on or just after the vernal equinox.

For simplicity, the equinox is considered to be March 21 (a fixed spring date set by the Church), although in astronomy, it's not always that day. The paschal full Moon always falls on the 14th day of a lunar month; because ancient calculations (made in AD 325) did not take into account certain lunar motions, it may differ from the actual full Moon date by a day or so.

Easter always falls on a Sunday between March 22 and April 25.

What Folklore Is Associated with Easter? Eggs, traditionally forbidden during Lent, symbolize new life.

The Easter Bunny recalls the hare, the Egyptian symbol of fertility.

Where Did the Word "Easter" Come From? The origin of the word "Easter" is unclear.

It may have derived its name from the Anglo-Saxon dawn goddess Eostre, whose feast was celebrated each spring at about this time.


Or, it may have derived from words meaning "rising," "dawn," or "east."

SEABOARD - Longtime residents of Seaboard well remember the days when the railroad was running and the town was a bustling community with two doctors to care for townspeople. That was 30 years ago. Since then, the town has withered a bit and times have changed. Citizens had to drive to receive health care and were nostalgic for the days when travel wasn't required. Their wait is over.

Northampton Family Practice, located at the newly

Northampton Family Practice, located at the newly renovated Sallie Ransom Jordan Memorial Health Clinic, opened its doors to visitors for the first time at

106 Clay St., in Seaboard Saturday.
"This is progress in the best sense," said David Emanuel, grandson of the clinic's namesake, Sallie Jordan - a renowned midwife who died in 1999. Emanuel and his cousin Lindsey Merritt served as ers of ceremonies, providing introductions for the day's five speakers

Also present was Jordan's daughter, Dorothy Also present was Jordan's daughter, Dorothy Jordan, who appeared both as a member of the family and the Eastern Seaboard Trust - an organization with significant participation in the clinic's development. "Sallie Jordan was a woman of unbounded energy, ethics and accomplishment," she said, then joked, "She was in control of the Seaboard Community for 106 years."

Taking a more serious tone, Jordan emphasized the importance of continued commitment to the clinic's

"Go out and solicit patients. Let's not leave today and say the doctor's office will take care of itself. We have to do that."

Carmen Hooker Odom, an official from the North Carolina Department of Health, began the accolades and stressed the importance of community in creating this project.

"Clinics like these only happen and only thrive because communities get behind them and make them happen," Odom explained. "What we have here is a committed community."

Dr. Frank Taylor, a native of Seaboard and graduate of East Carolina University's Medical School, will return to his childhood community and serve as practicing physician. Taylor currently works in a Conway office,

physician. Taylor currently works in a Conway office, but has been involved in the project for five years. A ribbon cutting, tour of the building and refreshments were enjoyed by the approximately 300 people in attendance. Each was glad to see the project completion, but no one more than the senior citizens who have had to drive as far as Conway, Jackson and Roanoke Rapids to receive treatment.

The clinic will accept patients beginning Aug. 1

LEANNA BELL PITTMAN (Her Legacy)

(Odelia Fry of Detroit cherishes a portrait of her mother, Leanna Bell Pittman.)

October 21, 1995 marked the dedication of the historic Allen Grove-Rosenwald School in Halifax, North Carolina. The

Rosenwald schools were created so Black children could receive an education. They were named after a Sears, Roebuck, and Co. president, Julius Rosenwald, who donated \$500 to building each school. Allen Grove is one of 38 Rosenwald schools in Halifax County and 813 in North Carolina.

For 42 years Leanna Bell Pittman headed the school. Pittman was born in Halifax, NC on January 28, 1880, the eldest of nine children of David and Gillie Bell. At age 20, she became a teacher, like her father. Her first job was at Pea Hill Rosenwald School in Scotland Neck, NC, That same year, she married Matthew Pittman, a farmer who tended more than 150 acres of cotton, peanuts, and tobacco.

After two years, Pittman transferred to Allen Grove Rosenwald School in Halifax, where she continued to teach and become the principal.

"Everybody loved her. She was a wonderful woman." says her daughter, Odelia Fry of Detroit, Michigan. "She was sweet. She loved everybody. She was kind, and she was very helpful."

Fry says her mother was successful in commanding respect while nurturing her students. Above all, she was determined to teach her students the importance of education.

The two-room school where Leanna Bell Pittman taught sat vacant from the late 1950s until October 1994, when it was donated to the Halifax County Cooperative Extension Service. The cooperative relocated the greatly deteriorated building to the Halifax County Rural Life Center, where it was restored as a tourist attraction and a 4-H camp store

At the dedication ceremony last October, Fry and other family members, as well as Leanna Bell Pittman's former students, gathered in Halifax to celebrate

"A whole lot of them went on and made good of their lives," Fry says. "That's when times were hard. We couldn't get an education."

Family members donated a pair of photographs of Leanna Bell Pittman which hang in the school, a concrete symbol of
