Get Out The Vote:

Tuesday, 5 November, is election day. Early voting has already started in Virginia and continues through 2 November. In Fairfax County, early voting sites are the Fairfax County Government Center, Mount Vernon Governmental Center, and North County Governmental Center. Starting 17 October, additional early voting centers will open, including the Sully Governmental Center and the Centreville Regional Library.

Absentee by mail voters may vote in person if they choose. If you received a ballot in the mail, you must bring it with you and surrender it to vote in person. If you received a ballot but do not bring it with you, you may vote a provisional ballot. Mail ballot drop boxes are available during early voting location operating hours.

Membership Update

We will be conducting a membership drive at the Centreville Coast Guard Exchange on November 9th from 10:00 until ~ 17:00. Please let me know if you can assist recruiting for a two-hour block. Our current membership status as of October 3rd is 85 renewals (online/mail) and 51 (Paid Up for Life) PULFs. National set our membership goal for 2025 at 198 which is a 9% increase over 2024 of 180. We are current at 68.69% of that goal. I thank all those who have renewed for 2025 already and those who have chosen to renew for three years. You may renew by sending back one of the renewal letters National sends out or going online at

Renew (mylegion.org) to renew. It is your choice, but doing so online is quick, simple, and saves you the cost of a stamp, plus you get your new membership card a bit faster. Should you have any questions about your membership, please call or email the post's adjutant/membership chairman.

National raised its dues by five dollars, therefore the Post's dues amount included that increase, so all the increase goes to National. The Post retains \$11 dollars of the \$45. The rest is divided between supporting the Department and National.

Multi-Year Memberships Are Now Available - As mentioned in previous newsletters, the Legion now has a three-year renewal option. If you do not want the inconvenience of renewing annually, this option may be worth considering. PUFL Memberships - PUFL members pay a one-time fee for a lifetime American Legion membership. You never have to pay yearly dues again or increases, which will come over the years. For those considering getting a Paid Up For Life membership, an added incentive would be a \$100 discount, but you must call National and request the availability of it. The kicker however is that you must pay all of it with a credit card or check in a single payment. This option is not available with their payment plan. TODAY IN U.S. HISTORY: (Compiled by Jim Robison)

October 1, 1908 – Henry Ford's Model T, a "universal car" designed for the masses, went on sale for the first time.

October 1, 1979 - After 70 years of American control, the Panama Canal Zone was formally handed over to Panama.

October 2, 1918 – The U.S. 77th Division's "Lost Battalion" is surrounded by German forces after an American attack in the Argonne Forest.

October 2, 1967 - Thurgood Marshall was sworn in as the first African American associate justice of the U.S. Supreme Court. He served until 1991.

October 2, 1968 - California's Redwood National Park was established.

October 3, 1863 - President Abraham Lincoln issued a proclamation designating the last Thursday in November as Thanksgiving Day.

October 3, 1974 - Frank Robinson was hired by the Cleveland Indians as baseball's first African American major league manager.

October 3, 1993 – The 2-day battle of Mogadishu, Somalia begins.

October 5, 1813 - Shawnee Indian Chief Tecumseh was defeated and killed at the Battle of the Thames in Ontario during the War of 1812. Regarded as one of the greatest American Indians, he was a powerful orator who defended his people against white settlement. When the War of 1812 broke out, he joined the British as a brigadier general.

October 5, 1877 - Following a 1,700-mile retreat, Chief Joseph of the Nez Perce Indians surrendered to U.S. Cavalry troops at Bear's Paw near Chinook, Montana. "From where the sun now stands, I will fight no more forever," he declared.

October 5, 1986 - Former U.S. Marine Eugene Hasenfus was captured by Nicaraguan Sandinistas after a plane carrying arms for the Nicaraguan rebels (Contras) was shot down over Nicaragua. This marked the beginning of the "Iran-Contra" controversy resulting in Congressional hearings and a major scandal for the Reagan White House.

October 6, 1949 – "Tokyo Rose" (Iva Toguri d'Aquino) was sentenced in San Francisco to 10 years imprisonment and fined \$10,000 for treason. She had broadcast music and Japanese propaganda to American troops in the Pacific during World War II. She was pardoned by President Ford in 1977.

October 7, 1765 - The Stamp Act Congress convened in New York City with representatives from nine colonies meeting in protest to the British Stamp Act which imposed the first direct tax by the British Crown upon the American colonies.

October 7, 1985 - Palestinian terrorists seized the Italian passenger ship *Achille Lauro*, threatening to blow it up if Israel did not free 50 Palestinian prisoners. Leon Klinghoffer, an elderly wheelchair-bound American, was murdered.

October 7, 2001 – Operation Enduring Freedom begins in Afghanistan.

October 8, 1871 - The Great Fire of Chicago erupted. Over 300 persons were killed and 90,000 were left homeless as the fire leveled 3.5 square miles and destroyed 17,450 buildings.

October 8, 1918 – A relief force from the 77th Division links up with the "Lost Battalion".

October 8, 1918 - During World War I in the Argonne Forest of France, U.S. Sergeant Alvin York lead a small group of men in taking out a German machine-gun battalion, silencing 35 machine guns, killing over a dozen, and capturing 132. He was later awarded the Medal of Honor and the French Croix de Guerre.

October 10, 1973 - Spiro T. Agnew resigned the office of Vice President of the United States amid charges of income tax evasion. He was succeeded as Vice President by Gerald R. Ford, who went on to become President after the resignation of Richard M. Nixon.

October 11, 1939 - Albert Einstein warned President Franklin D. Roosevelt that his theories could lead to Nazi Germany's development of an atomic bomb. Einstein suggested the U.S. develop its own bomb. This resulted in the top secret "Manhattan Project."

October 13, 1775 - The United States Navy was born after the Second Continental Congress authorized the acquisition of a fleet of ships.

October 13, 1792 - The cornerstone of the White House was laid by George Washington. In November of 1800, President John Adams and his family moved in.

October 14, 1912 - Former President Theodore Roosevelt was shot by a fanatic while campaigning in Milwaukee. Roosevelt was saved by his thick overcoat, a glasses case, and a folded speech in his breast pocket, all of which slowed the bullet.

October 14, 1947 - U.S. Air Force Captain Chuck Yeager became the first man to break the sound barrier, flying in a rocket-powered research aircraft.

October 14, 1964 - Civil Rights leader Martin Luther King, Jr., became the youngest recipient of the Nobel Peace Prize.

October 16, 1859 - Abolitionist John Brown seized the Federal Arsenal at Harpers Ferry with about 20 followers. Three days later, Brown was captured, and the insurrection was put down by U.S. Marines under the command of Col. Robert E. Lee. Brown was convicted by the Commonwealth of Virginia of treason, murder, and inciting slaves to rebellion, and was hanged on December 2, 1859.

October 17, 1777 - During the Revolutionary War, British General John Burgoyne, and his entire army of 5,700 men surrendered to American General Horatio Gates after the Battle of Saratoga, the first big American victory.

October 17-25, 1944 - The Battle of Leyte Gulf, the largest naval battle in history, took place off the Philippine Islands, during World War II. The battle involved 216 U.S. warships and 64 Japanese ships and resulted in the destruction of the Japanese Navy.

October 19, 1781 - The British Army surrendered to the Americans at Yorktown. More than 7,000 British and Hessian troops, led by British General Lord Cornwallis, surrendered to General George Washington. The war between Britain and its American colonies was effectively ended. The final peace treaty was signed in Paris on September 3, 1783.

October 19, 1960 - The U.S. embargo of Cuba began as the State Department prohibited shipment of all goods except medicine and food.

October 19, 1987 - "Black Monday" occurred on Wall Street as stocks plunged a record 508 points or 22.6 per cent, the largest one-day drop in stock market history.

October 20, 1818 - The U.S. and Britain agreed to set the U.S.- Canadian border at the 49th parallel.

October 20, 1944 - During World War II, U.S. forces landed on Leyte Island in the Philippines. General Douglas MacArthur fulfilled his promise, "I shall return."

October 20, 1973 - The 'Saturday Night Massacre' occurred during the Watergate scandal as President Richard M. Nixon fired Special Prosecutor Archibald Cox and Deputy Attorney General William Ruckelshaus. Attorney General Elliot Richardson resigned.

October 20, 1978 – The Women's Army Corps was disestablished, and all WAC units were integrated with male units.

October 21, 1879 - Thomas Edison successfully tested an electric incandescent lamp with a carbonized filament at his laboratory in Menlo Park, New Jersey.

October 21, 1915 - The first transatlantic radio voice message was made by the American Telephone and Telegraph Company from Virginia to Paris.

October 21, 1944 - During World War II, American troops captured Aachen in western Germany after a week of fighting. It was the first large German city taken by the Allies.

October 21, 1967 - Thousands of anti-war protesters stormed the Pentagon during a rally against the Vietnam War in Washington, D.C. About 250 were arrested.

October 22, 1962 - President John F. Kennedy appeared on television to inform Americans of the existence of Russian missiles in Cuba. The President demanded their removal and announced a naval "quarantine" of Cuba. Six days later, the Russians announced they would remove the weapons. In return, the U.S. later removed missiles from Turkey.

October 23, 1983 - Terrorists drove a truck loaded with TNT into the U.S. and French headquarters in Beirut, Lebanon, exploding it and killing 241 U.S. Marines and 58 French paratroopers.

October 24, 1861 - The first transcontinental telegram in America was sent from San Francisco to Washington, addressed to President Abraham Lincoln from the Chief Justice of California.

October 24, 1929 - "Black Thursday" occurred in the New York Stock Exchange as nearly 13 million shares were sold in panic selling. Five days later "Black Tuesday" saw 16 million shares sold.

October 24, 1945 - The United Nations was founded.

October 25-30, 1983 - The Caribbean Island of Grenada was invaded by the U.S. to restore "order and democracy." Over 2,000 Marines and Army Rangers seized control after a political coup the previous week had made the island a "Soviet-Cuban colony," according to President Ronald Reagan.

October 26, 1881 - The shoot-out at the O.K. Corral in Tombstone, Arizona, occurred between the feuding Clanton and Earp families.

October 26, 1825 - The Erie Canal opened as the first major man-made waterway in America, linking Lake Erie with the Hudson River, bypassing the British-controlled lower St. Lawrence.

October 27, 1787 - The first of 85 Federalist Papers appeared in print in a New York City newspaper. The essays, written by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay, argued for the adoption of the new U.S. Constitution.

October 27, 1904 - The New York City subway began operating, running from City Hall to West 145th Street, the first underground and underwater rail system in the world.

October 28, 1636 - Harvard University, the oldest institution of higher learning in America, was founded in Cambridge, Massachusetts.

October 28, 1886 - The Statue of Liberty, a gift from the people of France commemorating the French American alliance during the Revolutionary War, was dedicated on Bedloe's Island in New York Harbor.

October 28, 1919 - Prohibition began in the U.S. with the passage of the National Prohibition (Volstead) Act by Congress.

October 28, 1949 - Helen Anderson became the first woman ambassador, appointed by President Harry Truman to be Ambassador to Denmark.

October 28, 1962 - The Cuban Missile Crisis ended with the announcement by Soviet Russia's leader Nikita Khrushchev that his Soviet government was halting construction of missile bases in Cuba and would remove the offensive missiles. President Kennedy immediately accepted the offer then lifted the U.S. naval blockade of Cuba.

October 29, 1929 - The stock market crashed as over 16 million shares were dumped amid tumbling prices. The Great Depression followed in America, lasting until the outbreak of World War II.

October 31, 1941 – Mount Rushmore National Memorial was completed after 14 years of work.

October 31, 1950 - Earl Lloyd became the first African American to play in a National Basketball Association (NBA) game when he took the floor for the Washington Capitols in Rochester, New York.

October 31, 1952 - The U.S. detonated its first hydrogen bomb at the Elugelab Atoll in the Eniwetok Proving Grounds in the Pacific Marshall Islands.

October 31, 1968 - During the Vietnam War, President Lyndon Johnson ordered a halt of American bombing of North Vietnam.
