Baseball Update – While attending the Department Spring Conference (more about this later) I had the chance to meet with the Stormin' Seventeenth District Baseball Commissioner, Mike Farabaugh. We spoke mostly about a draft budget for our team and made plans to have Greg Hinton, Post 1995 GM for baseball to meet with Mike and our prospective coach, Doug Wilman. We plan on inviting Coach Wilman to a Post meeting in the near future. We will soon start a fundraising campaign to support the team although

funding will be a joint effort with the families of the players. The season will consist of 18 to 20 games in a nine-team league.



American Legion College – For the first time the American Legion Family College will be held near where we live. This year the college will be held in three locations by region. The northern region will hold their all-day session on March 14th at Post 176 in Springfield, just a quick trip down the Fairfax County Parkway. It will never be easier to attend and this year it is free! Yes, this is the third time I have posted this invitation. America 250 Observation – On February 25th, my wife Pam and I visited Mount Vernon as we are members of the association, and it was right after President’s Day. Last year I made a personal commitment to do something every month to honor the America 250 campaign to commemorate our nation’s independence. Serendipity is the condition where you start out looking for something and finding something else. That day was one of those. We went to the Washington family tomb at noon to hear a program led by a MVLA staffer named Melinda. When we got there, we were invited to participate. Pam, a career teacher, was asked to read Washington’s letter to the governors about supporting the new nation. I was asked to step into the tomb and lay a wreath. Once I placed the wreath I rendered a hand salute to the sarcophagus of the greatest American Soldier. Immediately afterward the crowd recited the Pledge of Allegiance to the flag. I was surprised to feel a bit overcome. Melinda told my wife she gets weepy when she sees a Veteran Salute General Washington’s tomb. Had I known, I would have worn my Legion parade hat.

Department Spring Conference – From February 27th through March 1st, your Post was represented at the Department of Virginia Spring Conference in Portsmouth Virginia by Department Sergeant-at-Arms, Steve Hunter and me. Steve did his duty escorting Department Commander Scott Maddrea and ensuring physical arrangements were made for all general sessions. Steve also attended Department Executive Committee meetings determining the near-term plans for the Legion in Virginia. I attended information sessions on Oratorical, Americanism, Boys State, Legislative, the Northern Region meeting, the Commander’s Banquet on Saturday, and the religious service on Sunday. One of the weekend’s highlights was the oratorical contest. All three students presented excellent speeches on the Constitution. Also attending and speaking at the banquet was the leading candidate for National Commander 2026-2027, Matt Shuman from the Department of Arizona.

BE the ONE – Flipping through the channels on TV the other day I landed on Congressional hearing about Veteran’s suicide. One of the Congressmen asked if the Veterans Administration had any statistics about Veteran’s spouses’ suicide. The answer was “No.” Frankly I had not thought about that issue of collateral damage of this scourge. Suicide affects everyone left behind and we need to understand the suffering of all those around the Veteran who takes his own life. So, just LISTEN when a Veteran needs to talk. Remember: dial 988 then #1 to ask for help for yourself or another Veteran.

Academy Day at the U.S. Army Museum – Fort Belvoir

The Army museum held an academy day on Saturday, March 7th. Seven hundred and fifty registered for the event from 10:00-13:00 in the museum's "Veterans Hall". More than 20 schools with a military (Corps of Cadets) education attended to include all five academies. Other organizations represented included the American Legion, VFW, Young Marines, and the Civil Air Patrol. Representing the 17th District were your Post's Adjutant along with six members of Post 176 – Springfield. We talked to students and parents about Boys and Girls State, Legion's Baseball, and the Youth Law Cadet Program. Unlike Academy Days held by congressional representatives and Senators, there were no formal presentations.

I contacted the offices of the 10th and 11th Representative Districts about two weeks ago about if and when they may hold an Academy Day, so far, no response from either. Senator Warner will be holding one however on April 25th at Mary Washington University in Fredericksburg. VA Welcome Kit

Number of veterans dying of suicide dropped slightly from 2022 to 2023, but the rate of suicide grew. Recently released [National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report](#) also notes that veterans experiencing mental health, substance use or homelessness, and those with easy access to firearms were at a higher risk of suicide.

The 2025 U.S. Department of Veterans Affairs’ [National Veteran Suicide Prevention Annual Report](#) showed that while the total number of veterans who died by suicide slightly reduced from 2022 to 2023, the overall rate of veteran suicides increased over that period.

However, the rate of suicides per 100,000 veterans rose during the same period in both the male and female population. For women, the rate rose from 13.7 to 13.9, and for men, it rose from 37.3 to 37.8.

The report also showed that 61 percent of veterans who died by suicide in 2023 were not receiving VA health care in the last year of their life. For veterans receiving VHA in the previous year or year of their suicide, the suicide rate dropped from 40 percent to 39 percent from 2022 to 2023.

“Veteran suicide has been a scourge on our nation for far too long,” VA Secretary Doug Collins said in a press release. “Most veterans who die by suicide were not in recent VA care, so making it easier for those who have worn the uniform to access the VA benefits they have earned is key.”

Also noted in the report is that suicide rates are elevated for veterans aged 18 to 34 years, and those with certain risk characteristics. Those include:

- **Mental Health Issues or Substance Use:** Among veterans in VHA care who died from suicide in 2023, 60.9 percent had a VHA mental health or substance use disorder diagnosis, while 39.1 percent did not.
- **Head Trauma/Traumatic Brain Injury (TBI):** Research shows increased suicide ideation, attempt and death rates among people who have experienced head trauma. In each year from 2001-23, suicide rates for veterans in VHA care were elevated for those with a TBI. In 2023, the suicide rate was 77.6 per 100,000 for those with a recent diagnosis of TBI, which was 94.3% higher than for those without a diagnosis.
- **Unsecured Firearms:** Unsecured firearms in the home increase the risk of suicide death. In 2023, firearms were involved in 73.3 percent of veteran deaths by suicide, compared to 52.9 percent of suicides of non-veteran U.S. adults.
- **Homelessness:** In 2023, the suicide rate among veterans in VHA care with diagnoses of homelessness was 146 percent higher than for those without diagnoses of homelessness.

The American Legion's Be the One veteran suicide prevention mission seeks to reduce the stigma associated with mental health treatment, providing free suicide prevention training and empowering everyone to take appropriate action when a veteran or servicemember may be at risk. Membership Update

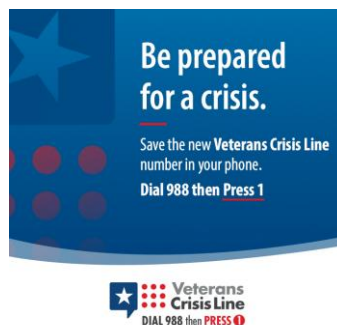
The most recent National renewal notices were mailed out between March 2 through March 8th. The cutoff date was February 11th; therefore, those members who renew after February 11th will still receive a renewal notice. For those Legionnaires, no further action is required as you should already have your 2026 membership card from the Post.

We currently are at 104.08% of our 2026 membership goal of 196 members with 204 countable members. I thank all those who have renewed for 2026 and/or joined our Post.

If you have not renewed, you may renew by mailing the renewal letter or preferably going online at [Renew \(mylegion.org\)](https://mylegion.org) to renew. It is your choice, but doing so online is quick, simple, and saves you the cost of a stamp and you get your new membership card a bit faster. Should you have any questions about your membership, please call or email the Post's adjutant/membership chairperson.

Multi-Year Memberships Are Now Available - The Legion now has a three-year renewal option. The benefit of renewing for three years and paying in advance is that you avoid any dues increase over the next three years and get renewal notifications. While there is no discount for the multi-year membership, you are locked in at the current dues amount, even if the fee increases during this time. PUFL Memberships - PLFL members pay a one-time fee for a lifetime American Legion membership. You never have to pay yearly dues and future increases, which will come over the years. For those considering getting a Paid Up For Life membership, an added incentive would be a \$100 discount, but you must call National and request availability of it. The kicker, however, is that you must pay all of it with a credit card or check in a single payment. This option is not available with their payment plan.
