Machel Montano recently got international acclaim when he performed the Save Soil song, "Touch

The Ground" for the first time at Mahashivratri 2022 in the presence of Sadhguru. The people in India who heard it for the first time were already dancing to the track.

It was mind-blowing to see millions appreciate our music yet on local radio we have to wait and see how much airplay it will get if any at all to create an impact.

Gradually local radio is losing it's listenership to social media platforms and there is a need for a more global approach to their programing. Radio Deejays are hesitant to take the risk and rotate a song to make it an after carnival smash.

They are satisfied in just programing what was already big for carnival. Unlike days gone by when artists would say I make this one for after carnival there is no local market for that.

To simply put it, if it did not get played for carnival, it isn't going to get played again.

We can do better.

### Exploring the Guanapo Gorge

place full of adventure that every Trinbagonian should visit is the Guanapo Gorge. Situated in the evergreen valley of the Heights of the Guanapo region.

To the north lies, the Lalaja Hills and to the south is the Guanapo Quarry. What makes the gorge so appealing is its fascinating geological features enclosed by steep walls of pre-historic rock. The gorge is 400 metres in length and in some places, its deep vertical sides are 70 feet high.

Exploring its channel is an unforgettable and worthwhile experience that is breathtaking. To get inside the gorge requires an 8-foot jump into a deep pool and a short paddle through the water.

As you venture through the narrow passageway there are small cascades to descend and hurdles of floating debris to overcome. The expedition through its channel is loaded with lots of fun and excitement.

The canyon is accessible from two routes. The first is a descent from Lalaja located 6 miles north on the Arima, Blanchisseuse Road. The other and preferred route for the hike is from the Guanapo Quarry where a 40 -minutes hike will lead upstream to the mouth or exit point of the gorge.

Before entering the gorge there is the option to place ones bags there to secure them from them from getting wet and on the return, they can be easily lo-





cated. To reach the entrance of the Canyon requires a further 20-minute hike through the evergreen and hilly forest of Guanapo.

There is an old sign in the middle of the forest that says Sambasson, which after a few miles will lead up the mountain to a series of cascades. The area was once an estate and dilapidated cacao trees still exist in the forest.

The river source originates from the two highest peaks El Cerro Del Aripo (940m) and El Pico Escondido (the hidden peak 938.7m). Inside the canyon, the rocks are magnificently carved into irregular shapes caused by the hydraulic action of the water.

Degradation of these granite rocks can take centuries since they are resistant to weathering. As the sun reflects on the rocks they radiate vibrant colours and their surfaces appear smoothly polished. Interlooking spurs occur on the inside of each bend, where they jut out from the slopes and divide the gorge into sections.

Giant lobster like-crayfish play hide and seek between the rocks of the riverbed. They breathe through feather-like gills and are members of the superfamilies called Astacoidea and Parastocoidea.

When exploring its course, a life jacket is recommended since in many areas there are deep pools to cross. In the rainy season when there can be sudden torrential showers, it is advisable not to venture into its narrow passageway.

For those not wanting to explore the gorge there is optional, to spend the time cooling down at its mouth where there is a shallow pool for swimming.
