This document covers donations and implementation requests — the two ways to engage with the Brisart ecosystem outside of running official releases. Neither of these grants or restricts any legal right; for what you're actually permitted to do, see `LICENSE.md`.

Donations

Donations support ongoing development of the Brisart ecosystem — new tools, research and experimentation, long-term maintenance, and documentation.

A donation is not a subscription. It doesn't come with technical support, guaranteed features, or any right described in `LICENSE.md` — including the right to submit implementation requests. If the ecosystem is useful to you and you'd like to support its continued development, a donation is one way to do that. Anyone can donate, subscriber or not.

Implementation Requests

Implementation requests are how active subscribers suggest future capabilities for Brisart software. Submitting one requires an active subscription — see `LICENSE` §2. This section describes how requests work in practice, not the underlying right.

What to suggest: new features, workflows, tools, or ecosystem integrations. Example areas include local identity records, offline authentication, research archive features, preservation utilities, and developer automation.

No guarantee: submitting a request doesn't mean it will be built. Brisart may accept, reject, modify, defer, or reinterpret any request based on ecosystem priorities.

Implementation requests are a way to influence product direction — they are not support tickets, bug reports, or consulting requests.
