he meeting was called to order by President Sandra Angelo at 1:30 PM.

The Pledge of Allegiance was recited by those present. There were no new members or

quests.

For Show and Tell Debbie Christmas showed items she purchased at the Tucson Gem Show which included sectarian and polished cabochons. She mentioned that the Tucson Gem Show runs through February 12. Cathy Viney shared fluorescent stones that she found in the Concho Valley area.

The January minutes were accepted as written in the newsletter; no corrections or additions were required.

Treasurer's Report was given by Carl Hickman. He went over the income and expenses for January as well as upcoming expenses for February.

Sandra Angelo said that the club has participated as judges for the last eight or nine years for the Navajo County STEM fair. The club also donates \$200 to this event. Sandra suggested that the club continue the same donation for 2023. There were no objections. A booth can be set up at Northland Pioneer College Performing Arts Center for the STEM Fair on Saturday March 4. Volunteers are needed to be judges and also to man the booth. Sandra Angelo, Carol Glick, Debbie Christmas, and Othello Ayem volunteered to be judges. Additional volunteers are still needed to set up, tear down and sit at our booth. Please contact Sandra if you are able to help.

Sandra gave the President's Report. The board met on January 20. We discussed the progress we are making on meeting the club budget goals. We currently have enough tables sold to proceed with our gem show in July. The board still has open positions. A volunteer is needed to take on the role of field trip chairperson. Othello Ayem has agreed to lead the February field trip and possibly the trip in March. We can also try to reach out to Rollo Pool, a member of both our club and the Payson Rimstones, who is willing to help facilitate a trip in the Payson area. Please let Sandra know if you would like to lead a single field trip or if you would like to volunteer for the field trip coordinator position. We also need a volunteer to be the education coordinator. There is also a need for a second person to assist with meeting room set up/clean up. A temporary volunteer is needed to assist Diane with door greeter/raffle ticket sales.

The club also needs to bolster its community outreach. Our goal is to get out into the community to encourage membership and share our knowledge. Club volunteers are needed so that we can participate in these events:

STEM FAIR: March 4

SHOW LOW DAYS: Saturday June 10

MEDIEVAL MAYHEM: This event will be held Friday July 7 at Show Low Frontier Field. This date is designated as Educational Day. Volunteers will need to be in costume which Medieval Mayhem will provide.

SNOWFLAKE PIONEER DAYS: July 20-22

HARVEST FEST: Snowflake/Taylor, October 14

The board also discussed incoming revenues from the silent auction. In 2022, the silent auction brought in about one-half of the funds produced in prior years. Donna and Terry Pollard will try to find more attractive items to increase club profits this year.

The board is reviewing the club's by-laws for updates. The changes will circulate to members when the updates are completed.

Megan McDonald is assisting with redesign of a new club logo. We will rebrand the club printed materials when the new logo is completed.

Sandra reported on the January field trip to the Bullion Plaza Cultural Center & Museum in Globe. (See Page 6 in **Rock Talk** for further information.)

The February field trip will be led by Othello Ayem and will be to Joseph City to collect petrified wood, bog agates and jasper. (See Page 2 in *Rock Talk* for further information.)

A show update was provided by Cathy Viney. Cathy suggested themed baskets as additional raffle items, similar to what has been seen at other gem shows. It was generally agreed that this could be done. Mike, Terry, and Greg are helping with signage for the show. We will also make clearer signs at the Elks Club that are directional for the entrance. Vendors continue to sign up, but we now have sold enough tables to have a successful show.

Sandra mentioned that several utensils have been left over from the club's potlucks and are ready to be picked up by their owners. Carl mentioned that he has a sizable collection of member name badges to be claimed. The "Let's Do Lunch Club" will be held Friday, February 24 at 1:30 PM at Mr. Zeke's in Pinetop. We will celebrate February birthdays with cake. All are welcome.

Carl and Karen Hickman and Debbie Christmas have invited us to post banners along their properties that border Concho Road and Highway 260. ROCK OF THE MONTH



CHALOCITE






halcocite is copper sulfide, (Cu25). Chalcocite is a major ore of copper that few collectors know about because it is not green like malachite, or blue like azurite. It is a basic black. While it does, on occasion, form in short prismatic or tabular crystals, and very rarely as pseudohexagonal prisms that form from the twinning of crystals, it's basic nature is massive or as a powdery coating. That is not the choice of most collectors.

Chalcocite is a soft mineral with a hardness (H.) of $2\frac{1}{2}$ - 3, rather heavy with a specific gravity (S.G.) of 5.5 - 5.8. indistinct cleavage, conchoidal fracture, and a shiny black streak. The mineral tarnishes to a dull black or greenish black. The name comes from the Greek 'chalkos', for copper. Originally chalcocite was called chalcosine, and some today call it copper glance.

Chalcocite forms in hydrothermal veins with other minerals such as bornite, quartz, covellite, chalcopyrite, galena, and sphalerite. Small grains are found in disseminated hydrothermal replacement deposits like those in Arizona. In secondary zones of sulfide enrichment, massive amounts of chalcocite is found, which is the source and reason for chalcocite considered to be a major ore of copper. Unlike other copper minerals, it is often associated with pure native copper.

Almost malleable, the tenacity of chalcocite is what separates it from other copper minerals. Chalcocite is soluble in nitric acid. It also fuses in a flame, turning the flame green and releasing sulfur dioxide fumes. Another copper sulfide, digenite (Cu955) is often confused with chalcocite. But it is more blue than black. Both chalcocite and digenite are important in the material science of solar panel couple construction with Cd5 (cadmium sulfide). Galena, (PbS) is sometimes confused with chalcocite also, but galena has perfect cleavage and contains no copper.

The most interesting version of chalcocite, the pseudo hexagonal twinned prisms are found in an old mine in Bristol, Connecticut, in Cornwall, England, and in the Transvaal, South Africa. Sizeable masses are found in the copper areas of Superior, Miami, Morenci, Bisbee, and Ray, Arizona; Tooele County, Utah; Santa Rita, New Mexico; Kennecott, Alaska; and in Butte, Montana. Namibia, Chile, USSR, Mexico and Italy also have deposits. An interesting mineral indeed.
