

Talc can be cut into pieces without cracking making it an ideal material for carving (soapstone). It has plenty of good uses in lubricants, ceramics, paper, paints, plastics, and rubber. White Mountain Gem & Mineral Club Meeting minutes January 7, 2024

he meeting was called to order by President Sandra Angelo at 1:33 PM and was opened with the Pledge of Allegiance.

For Show and Tell, Shelly shared her Christmas gifts of sodalite, moss amber, And black light from "Miners Rock Shop" (minersrockshop.com). Sandra passed around a pre-dinosaur vertebrae fossil from our recently procured site at Blue Hills Environmental. Carl showed the deed to our new property.

December meeting minutes were accepted as printed in *Rock Talk*.

Interim Treasurer Carl Hickman presented the financial report. The club is financially very stable. Carl noted that for every dollar income only half was expensed. He issued copies of the 2024 budget and asked members to review and send any questions or comments to him.

The Board met December 7 to plan for 2024. The budget was reviewed, and several items were put back that had been removed when we were following an austere budget. The club will now be able to purchase Rock and Gem Magazine for our libraries and some deferred capital purchases can be made. More marketing dollars have been put into the show budget. Year end prizes have been reinstated. Members will get an entry in the year-end drawing for activities above and beyond attending meetings. This would include participating in the highway clean-up, donating a specimen for the door prize or 50/50 raffle, volunteering for an outreach event, and so forth. The record is kept in a book in which members may sign their names at the monthly meeting.

Rollo Pool provided us with 250 Arizona topographic maps indicating collecting areas. He suggested selling these books at our show. Sandra suggested we may want to give one to each person who volunteers for the show. Cathy thought they would make nice gifts for our vendors.

2024 Officers were introduced. There are a number of open positions. The most important

position is treasurer. Carl is interim treasurer until the position is filled. Volunteer positions include two greeters as well as Chamber of Commerce contacts. This responsibility would ensure that the chambers are supplied with our trifolds and any additional information.

Second Vice President Carol Glick was unable to attend the meeting, but she is working from home on ways to increase membership. Cathy, BG, and Carol are working on a flier that can go to chambers, RV parks, libraries, and so forth. Carol also mentioned a need for rocks for the Kids' Corner at the show.

Sandra reported that 18 people attended the December field trip to club property at Blue Hills Environmental. This month the club will travel to the Gila County Gem and Mineral Show on Saturday, January 13. See Page 5 in **Rock Talk** for further information on both trips.

Cathy Cargile gave the Show Report- It's happening! We did get the first promo piece together for the show. BG and Cathy are working on marketing pieces. They have reached out to a business that posts banners on their website for \$35 dollars. The fliers can be emailed or passed out; all club members should try to share these materials. Carl hasn't counted vendors, but we have a total of 49 tables sold. We are just about full; we're way ahead of where we've ever been before with our shows. So far there is only one new vendor; everyone else is a repeat.

Sandra asked if there was any interest in continuing with the rolling auction. This discussion was tabled due to low attendance.

Cathy Cargile mentioned that she has reached out to Mellon Center in Concho Valley as to the possibility of hosting a mini gem show.

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DUMORTIERITE

umortierite is a silicate, specifically a nesosilicate where the silicon/oxygen tetrahedrons (SiO4) are only connected by ionic bonds. The formula, AI7 (BO3) (SiO4)3 03 shows this as an aluminum borosilicate, with three separate SiO4 tetrahedrons.

Dumortierite has a hardness (H.) of 8 $\frac{1}{2}$, specific gravity (S.G.) of 3.41, cleavage good in one direction, and an uneven fracture. While this mineral is a member of the orthorhombic mineral class, it rarely forms visible crystals, but is usually massive, fibrous, radiating, or columnar. Crystals often resemble prisms if formed large enough.

Bright colors form in this mineral as blue, violet, and occasionally pink or red/brown. The streak color is white. Transparent to translucent, with a vitreous to dull luster, dumortierite sometimes fluoresces under ultraviolet light. Acids or applied flame do not affect this mineral.

Formation


Dumortierite forms from slow cooling of magma resulting in coarse-grained igneous rocks such as granite pegmatites, with andalusite and quartz, in hydrothermal replacement deposits with andalusite and muscovite mica, and in metamorphic formations rich in aluminum, with kyanite, mica schist, marble, and gneiss. Stable formations intruded with hot fluids resulting in contact metamorphism can also form dumortierite along the cooked margins of the original formation.

Where Is It Found?

Dumortierite is a rare mineral but is found in Arizona, particularly along the Arizona/ California border area. It is often mixed with, or intermixed with, quartzite. The quartzite will be more coarsely-grained and less colorful. Locations include the far eastern section of the Superstition Mountains where it is associated with metamorphic formations of marble, quartzite, schist, and gneiss; with quartz and kyanite at Clip, north of Yuma, Arizona; and around Lake Havasu. In Oreana and Rochester in Humboldt County, Nevada deep-blue and violet dumortierite can be found. Dehesa in San Diego County, California has fluorescent purple dumortierite, and blue dumortierite in gray quartz has been confused with lapis lazuli in Los Angeles County. In other areas, building excavation in New York City has produced dumortierite, and it is also found in Lyons, France; Sondrio, Italy; Brazil; and the Malagasy Republic.


Uses

Dumortierite is used to produce aluminum refractories, and if visible crystals form, it is used as a hard and durable gemstone. Tumbled and polished, it makes a striking addition to any collection.









Only diamonds, ruby, sapphire, and emeralds are considered to be precious stones?

All others are semi-precious, including alexandrite, amethyst, garnet, lapis, pearl, peridot, and so many more. Semi-precious stones, however, can be more valuable, depending upon rarity, quality, etc.

So why not get those stones out and wear them as everyday wear in the new year, rather than keep them tucked away? Or get out those gem projects you have been putting off and showcase these this year. Maybe fix that broken jewelry, or do the unconventional and sew those beautiful stones to clothes, shoes, or a handbag? Remember Stan's license plate of a slab in the shape of Arizona?

Shown above are photos of examples of crafting with these stones that might give you some inspiration. Learn to drill a hole in a stone, wire wrap, or facet the stone, string those chip beads, sew with them, or repurpose broken jewelry pendants as used in the purse above. How about bedazzling that club name tag? Also is a photo of jewelry findings, including such items as a lobster claw fastener, a ring that can be fashioned by wiring on pre-drilled stone beads, and a "cage" that can be purchased in which a stone can be inserted. Add a chain, and you have a lovely necklace! The projects need not to be complicated or time consuming.

So "bling" in the new year with these wonderful gifts of nature. Get busy using those stones this year, rather than hidden away for another year! I hope to see some gem and mineral club name tags or other projects you have made that showcase gems and minerals!


