For Show and Tell, Carl displayed tumbled sodalite. Its impurities fluoresce and prevent the stones from having a shiny smooth surface. Loren displayed pyrite, chalcopyrite, and iron pyrite, which are often confused with gold. Myra presented an exquisite necklace she knitted with copper wire, turquoise beads, and bells. Lynne showed an azurite and chrysocolla on schist specimen and suggested we visit the mine where she acquired it.

Dick shared wonder stone (actually rhyolite) from his Utah trip and explained some of its history. He also showed Dugway Geodes. Some were slightly radioactive, and thus the chalcedony fluoresces green. Mike thanked Donna for her Rock of the Month educational articles in Rock Talk, the club's newsletter.

# LOTS AND LOTS OF PETRIFIED WOOD ..... AND ONE 250-POUND LOGITY

n the morning of our May field trip, the weather gods were much kinder to us than during the April adventure when the dirt road into Deer Springs was so muddy from overnight snow that we were forced to turn back. As the group of 26 gathered in downtown Show Low, the winds were blowing 20 to 30 mph, but it would have taken more than that to discourage the enthusiastic rockhounds. The dirt road was dry this time, but the deep ruts from the failed April trip were still visible.

Once at the Deer Springs fire tower, the group left a few vehicles behind and jumped into other 4WD trucks to negotiate the final hill to the collecting site. With good directions from Rollo Pool, the group spread out over the steep hill and almost immediately found large chunks of petrified wood. Many pieces displayed smokey quartz crystals that sparkled brightly in the spring sun. It only took two hours of searching and digging for most club members to gather all the wood they wanted. This included one whole petrified log weighing about 250 pounds. The group quickly learned that this fine specimen was much easier rolling downhill than lifting it onto the tailgate of a Tacoma. But, with help from several of the younger members, it eventually got loaded for the trip home. (See photo below.)

### JUNE FIELD TRIP TO FOREST LAKES FOR BANDED SANDSTONE

Date: Saturday, June 29, 2024 (Note Change of Date)

Location of the Field Trip Site: We will be going to a site north of Route 260 just west of Forest Lakes.

Where and When We Will Meet: The primary meeting point will be the Show Low Chamber of Commerce parking lot on Deuce of Clubs at 7:30 AM. The secondary meeting point is at the toilet 0.2 miles north on Forest Rd 237 at about 8:30.

Recommended Vehicle: Any vehicle can make it to the secondary meeting site. The last few miles may get rough and a 4WD high clearance vehicle may be needed. Rollo Pool has a special use permit to collect at the abandoned quarry and has asked us to limit our vehicles to 10 due to limited parking at the quarry. If we have more than 10 vehicles we will carpool from the secondary meeting site in the most appropriate vehicles.

What we will collect: We will be collecting banded sandstone and marine fossils.

Recommended Things to Take: Bucket, rock hammer, sledge, chisel, grabber, digging tools, cold water, lunch, sunscreen, and a wide-brimmed hat.

Cell Phone Service: The site is moderately remote and likely lacks cell service.

**Directions to the Site:** Drive west from the primary meeting location on Highway 260 about 55 miles to just past milepost 287 and turn right on Forest Rd 273. Go 0.2 miles north and park near the toilet on the left. We will meet Rollo there and he will lead us about six miles to the collecting area.

#### Notes:

- 1. Rollo has asked that all WMG&MC attendees sign the liability waiver for the Payson Rock Club.
- 2. He will hold a five-minute safety briefing before the trip.
- 3. Rollo has samples of the rocks and fossils that we plan to collect.





# ROCK OF THE MONTH METAMORPHIC ROCK

# As we learned from the May edition of *Rock of the Month*, rocks and minerals are different entities. This month we look at *Metamorphic Rocks!*

Minerals have distinct chemical formulas and can be identified by certain common tests we can use to aid that identification. They include hardness (H): such as quartz which will always be able to scratch normal glass; streak color, such as hematite which always has a red streak; or acid testing, such as calcite which releases carbon dioxide (CO2) bubbles when it comes in contact with acid or even vinegar.

Rocks, on the other hand, do not have the luxury of having tests to aid identification. Instead of one chemical formula, rocks, with a few exceptions, can contain many minerals, so potentially, many chemical formulas. It is said people get better at geology with every rock they see. Metamorphic rock is like that. The more one sees, the more one recognizes the characteristics of metamorphic rock. Because a metamorphic rock is a "changed rock," it originally was a vastly different rock, with infinite versions of what it may look like at the present. Still, metamorphic rocks have certain characteristics common to that type of rock. Some of these characteristics include hardness and density, heavy for their size, foliated (layered), interlocking grains, swirls or distorted stripping, and regrowth of crystals like garnets or sparkly mica.

Those characteristics of metamorphic rock depend on the properties of the original parent rock called the protolith, the environment where the protolith changed, and the length of time it took for the protolith to change or meta morph. Even the word metamorphic is Greek for "change in form."

The three environments that can lead to metamorphic rock are intense heat, intense pressure plus heat, or alteration of rocks along fault zones, such as during an earthquake. There are many scholarly names of metamorphic rocks, some that are only found in select places. Metamorphic rocks form underground from buried parents or protoliths, and then are pushed back to the surface by tectonic forces. Thus, the deeper they form, the less likely we will find them in our searches at the surface of the earth. There are some common metamorphic rocks that are at the surface of the earth and can be found quite easily.

Slate is a common metamorphic rock formed from a sedimentary rock called shale that was under great pressure with some heat. While not the prettiest, it is used for roofing, counter tops, floors and other places where flat, sturdy rock is needed. If slate remains below ground it eventually changes to phyllite, a colorful, smooth, foliated metamorphic rock. Phyllite, with additional pressure, becomes mica schist, the common, sparkly rock often mistaken for a valuable mineral such as silver or gold. Mica schist under more pressure has growth of metamorphic crystals such as garnet, resulting in a garnet mica schist, or pyrite, resulting in a pyrite mica schist.

The common igneous rock granite, with heat and pressure, takes on the foliated and often swirly form of gneiss (pronounced "nice").

The last types of common metamorphic rock we are bound to find are marble and quartzite. Marble forms from heated limestone. The heat comes from molten igneous intrusions that infiltrate the buried limestone and cause the interlocking calcite crystals that have regrown in the original limestone. Quartzite, the other common metamorphic rock, forms from quartz sandstone that was also infiltrated by molten igneous magma.

The heat causes the grains of quartz sandstone to interlock, forming the hard, dense quartzite found in any riverbed or wash.

Metamorphic rock is some of the prettiest and easiest to spot at the earth's surface. It is also the oldest because of the cycle of "morphing" (changing) from one already formed rock into another formed rock. Eventually this cycle will break this rock down to sediment or bury this rock again to melt or be acted on by heat and pressure, and the cycle will continue.
