ROCK OF THE MONTH







Beryl, (Be3Al2Si6O18), is Beryllium Aluminum Silicate, a cyclosilicate in the hexagonal crystal system. Unlike quartz crystals, there are no terminations on the crystal end(s). Beryl crystal ends have one plane of basal cleavage parallel to the crystal base. Beryl crystals are prismatic where one direction is always longer than the others. Field identification is the hardness and the prismatic and hexagonal (six-sided) crystal structure. Beryl is often synthetically made but these can be identified by an experienced jeweler because they are too perfect.

Beryl has a hardness (H) of 7.5 - 8 but is no heavier than a quartz specimen of the same size, with a specific gravity (S.G.) of 2.65. Beryl is transparent to translucent, usually with so many inclusions it appears opaque. Massive beryl is often confused with quartz and hardness tests must be utilized.

If you have never heard of beryl, it is because the different colors of beryl have names much more familiar to the general public. While the colorless varieties called goshenite and achroite are the pure form of beryl and not well known, the impure versions which have small amounts of other elements, have more familiar names. Emerald, used in the Crown Jewels of England, is the brilliant green variety colored with vanadium or chromium. Less popular than emerald, but still lovely, aquamarine, widely used in 19th century jewelry, is a sea-blue variety, colored with iron. Heliodor a Greek word meaning 'gift of the Sun', a brilliant but rare yellow variety, is also colored with iron. Manganese gives pink beryl, morganite, its' color. Morganite was named for J.P.Morgan, a bank magnate and gem collector.

Beryl is most often found in granite pegmatites and can grow quite large. The emerald variety is most often found in dark metamorphic limestone/marble. There the beryl does not grow as large as that in granite pegmatites because of the different mode of formation. Beryl is also found in hot hydrothermal deposits called greisen with other rare minerals. Because beryl is so hard and very resistant to acids, crystals weather out of the parent formations intact and end up in stream bedloads.

Beryl is the chief ore of beryllium and is mined worldwide. Only the non-gemmy material is ground up for ore. In Egypt and Columbia, there have been gem quality emerald mines for thousands of years. Cleopatra's emerald mines of Egypt were worked as early as 2000 BC. Spanish explorers brought emeralds to Europe in the 1500s. Most were treasures from conquered native civilizations in Central and South America, particularly Columbia and Peru. Since 1934, the mines of Columbia, including Muzo and Chivor, are owned by the government and are subject to strict rules and export regulations.

Beryl is also abundant in Pakistan, Zimbabwe, Brazil, Russia, India, Norway, Madagascar, and other countries. In the USA, aquamarine is found in Branchville, Connecticut; Grafton, New Hampshire; and Albany, Maine. Large, massive deposits of aquamarine have been found in North Carolina. With only small visible crystal structure, compact masses have been manually cut into huge six-sided "gems" and put in museums as curiosities. Heliodor is found in San Diego County California. Morganite is found in Colorado, and the Black Hills of South Dakota.

Beryl, in all its varieties, is a treasure for any collection.

A NEW COLUMN FOR ROCK TALK

Crafty Corner by Lidia Duvall

Greetings rockhounds and crafters. Welcome to the newest addition to the newsletter. Got rocks, and want to create something with them? This month's wonderful idea comes from a craft show I went to. Do you have slabs 1" or less thick? Make a wall hanger and add epiphytes. (epiphytes are air plants that don't need soil) The finished product looks like a mountain landscape and the plants look like trees.

You will need:

A wooden or metal premade shelf. 12" 18" or 24" depending on how big you want to make it and the size of slabs.

3-5-or 7 or more slabs polished or rough, preferably roughly shaped triangles. One edge must be straight for gluing to shelf. Slabs that look like landscapes and or mountains are ideal. Use different shapes and colors

1 large round cabochon, if you want to have a moon or sun E 6000 glue (walmart)

3-5 epiphytes (available online)

Begin by gluing down slabs to your shelf. One side of your slab must be straight for gluing. Alternate slabs so some are to the back, middle and front. Glue the moon strategically at the highest point to a slab, but let it hang off a bit so it looks like it is rising and its own entity. Strategically tuck plants, they will just easily sit between slabs. You can easily remove them to water. Once a week you soak them with bottled water or rainwater, and feed them once a month, tucking them back into slabs after watering.
