Diamond Point near Payson is a favorite spot for rockhounds. The beautiful crystals found in this area are so clear they resemble Herkimer diamonds. Keep an eye out for a glint of light reflecting off the stones, in



streambeds or areas recently washed over by rainfall. A special gem quality form of doubly terminated quartz crystals found only in the hills east of Payson Arizona, the smaller ones closely resembling natural diamonds.

WHITE MOUNTAIN GEM & MINERAL CLUB MEETING MINUTES MARCH 5, 2023

he meeting was called to order by President Sandra Angelo at 1:30 PM. After the Pledge of Allegiance, members and guests were welcomed. Thelma Gray and Blue Thompson were welcomed back after a long absence.

For "Show and Tell," Othello Ayem shared petrified wood and fossils from the Joseph City field trip. Judy Harrell shared specimens collected at the Deaf Camp. She also showed Apache Tears and Diamond Point crystals from her collection.

The minutes of the February meeting were accepted after the misspelling of two words were mentioned.

Treasurer Carl Hickman presented the club's financial report and stated that the club is in good financial standing. He also mentioned that the club may be considering sponsoring a Pinion High School student to attend the state STEM fair.

President Sandra Angelo reported on the club's attendance at the STEM Fair on Saturday March 4 in Snowflake. Club members distributed club information to participants and participated as judges. The Pinion High School science teacher agreed to bring some students to share some of their very impressive projects to our April meeting. Sandra mentioned that club member Peggy Lancaster is recovering from pneumonia and doing much better.

The club still needs two volunteers: one for field trip chair, and one for assistant chair. Please contact Sandra if you are interested in either of these positions. A current most urgent need is a leader for the upcoming March trip. Volunteers are needed for single trips until a permanent trip leader can be found. One suggestion for the March trip is Diamond Point and the fossil site near Payson. Please contact Sandra if you are available and willing to lead the March trip. Diane Moten has been working on a special raffle that will run for several months. The first item is a large amethyst point measuring approximately four by six inches. Suggested amount of raffle tickets was five dollars each. A unanimous vote was approved to sell the raffle tickets for five dollars each with the raffle running for two months.

Carl Hickman reported that 13 vendors have purchased 48 tables for the July show, and a vendor placement map will be available soon. Shirley Leistikow will purchase large bags for the raffle baskets, the themes for which will be barbeque, pets, car wash, date night, gardening, kids, and spa/salon. Debbie Christmas reported that peridot is no longer available to non-reservation members in San Carlos. However, the mine owner has offered a special deal to the Anthem Club. The offer includes a price of five dollars for an empty bucket plus \$50 to fill it up, for a total of \$55. Since Debbie is a member of the Anthem Club, she will get more details about the specimens being offered and follow up next month to see if there is any interest.

Debbie also reported that this year's Rocky Mountain Federation annual meeting/ convention is scheduled for July 13-16 in Casper, Wyoming, the same weekend as our gem show. Sandra said that she will reach out to club member George Putnam, who lives in Wyoming, to see if he could represent us as a delegate.

Carl mentioned that there is a need for host families for foreign exchange students and one student is interested in being placed with a host family interested in rocks and gems. Carl has contact information for anybody who might be interested.

Hematite is Fe2O3, an iron oxide. It is one of the most abundant minerals on earth and is one of the most important ores of iron, composed of about 70% iron.

member of the hexagonal crystal system, crystals are tabular, semi-prismatic, or stubby rhombohedral, often with curved or striated faces, and may be iridescent. Hematite can also be laminated, columnar or massive. It is often found in striking mammillary or botryoidal shapes as tightly formed, rounded structures with a smooth fracture and banded interiors. These structures are called kidney ore because they look like animal kidneys. A lovely form of hematite has crystals that are arranged like petals on a rose, called hematite rosettes. Another bright version of hematite is specular hematite, made up of tiny micaceous type metallic flakes.

For a metallic ore, hematite is quite hard at 5-6 hardness (H). The specific gravity (S.G.) is 4.9-5.3 which is twice as heavy as a same size piece of quartz. It is opaque. The fracture is usually uneven and brittle. The color of hematite is steel-gray to black, though massive varieties may be dull to bright red, soft and earthy. The streak is red to reddish brown. Hematite often colors other formations with its red (ochre) shade. The Painted Desert of Arizona is colored with hematite.

Hematite forms in various ways. It forms in hydrothermal veins from percolating iron and silica-rich heated water. It is often seen as an accessory mineral in igneous rocks, particularly lavas, or exhaled in gases from volcanic activity. It is widely occurring as a sedimentary rock. The vast iron ranges of Lake Superior, Wisconsin, and Michigan are of sedimentary origin. Hematite forms in oxidizing conditions, often from the chemical and physical changes in limonite found in sediments. It is also found in large deposits of disseminated minerals where the small pieces of hematite and other metallics, such as copper, fill any space in a formation such as granite. Arizona is rich with disseminated deposits.

Hematite is so common it would be hard to find a place on earth where it cannot be found. Oolitic (small rounded ball) deposits of hematite are found in Tennessee. Beautiful crystals are found on the Island of Elba; Tuscany, Italy; Cumberland, England; and Brazil. Iron crosses are found in Switzerland. Hematite that has replaced magnetite crystals, called Martites, are found in Twin Peaks, Utah; Lake Superior; and Quebec. Reniform (kidney shaped) masses are found at Aztec Peak in Gila County, Arizona and in just about any wash in the state. Brilliant black crystals are found in Bouse, Arizona, and in the Bradshaw and Wickenburg Mountains of Arizona. Red and black druzy crystals are found in Edwards, New York.

The name, hematite comes from the Greek Haimatites, meaning blood-like, for the streak color. Besides being an important iron ore, it is also used as a red pigment, and a polishing powder. The Chinese used powdered hematite mixed with red clay as a medicine for various ailments. The mineral is also cut into cabochons and beads for semi-precious jewelry.
