Jim and Kris Stewart are currently serving with Ethnos360 Aviation and are on staff at the Ethnos360 Aviation headquarters in McNeal AZ where Jim is the Supervisor of McNeal Aviation Operations and Training. Kris is the Head Receptionist and she also oversees the flight following program and the childcare program.
