Dear friends,

You may know that an orphan from the planet Krypton became Superman, a young Amazon came to help end WWII and became Wonder Woman, and a kid from Queens became Spider-Man after a radioactive arachnid bit him.

Today we're going to learn — if you didn't already know it — the secret origin story of Morning Prayer, formally known as "Daily Morning Prayer" from the Book of Common Prayer that's part of our inheritance as Anglican — now Episcopalian — Christians.

Morning Prayer isn't as prevalent these days in the United States as our other major worship service, the Holy Eucharist (aka Holy Communion or the Lord's Supper). The Eucharist's origin story is pretty well known because it's told every time we gather for communion: Jesus himself instituted it on the night before he died, and Jesus' followers have worshipped this way since the very earliest days of the church.

But Morning Prayer also has ancient origins. One of the reasons is that Jesus, like his first disciples, was Jewish. Faithful Jews sought to follow the Law, to love God completely by walking in his statues. In order to do that, Jews had to be steeped in the Scriptures. They gathered each week in the synagogue to hear God's holy Word, to be taught, and to pray. There was also an ancient pattern of offering animal sacrifices every morning and evening at the Temple in Jerusalem.

All of these things — worship morning and evening and seeking to be formed by God's sacred Word — gradually developed into our Prayer Book "Daily Office.". Early monastics in the church — whose main job was to pray — expanded daily prayer to be said throughout the day at pre-dawn and dawn (Matins/Lauds), 6 am (Prime), 9 am (Terce), 12 pm (None), 3 pm (Sext), 6 pm (Vespers), and bedtime (Compline). These many prayer times were far too much for your average English Christian to say.

With that in mind, Thomas Cranmer, who was a Protestant reformer and the Archbishop of Canterbury under King Henry VIII, compiled the first English language Prayer Book in 1549 that condensed and simplified the monastic prayer offices into Morning and Evening Prayer. Clergy were required to say these services, in the church, every day so that even illiterate Christians would be able to learn the Holy Scriptures. Someone who attended these services each day would hear all 150 Psalms each month (now it's every two months) and would hear almost the entire Bible in a year.

Prayer Books have been revised over the centuries by the church, but Morning Prayer has remained a constant. As we know at St. Peter's Church, Morning Prayer was the major service of worship on Sundays until the mid-20th Century in the United States. We are one of the few American churches left that retain the tradition of regular choral Morning Prayer on a Sunday morning (along with celebrating weekly Holy Communion).

That's a little of the history of this worship service that's so important to our parish life. If you're looking for a good Bible reading plan, spending 15 minutes a day praying the Daily Office is a wonderful way to start this spiritually healthy habit.

And maybe you've tried and found the Office too long or too confusing? No worries. It was the same way for me when I started. I'd love to sit down with you, go over Morning or Evening Prayer 101, and help you adapt it to your lifestyle so that you're not missing out on this way of formation (I can show you some pretty cool apps, too).

So as Yosemite Sam famously said to Bugs Bunny, "Say yer prayers, varmint!"

Nine Days of Prayer for St. Peter's Church, 2025

Once again, the people of St. Peter's are invited to join in special prayer intentions during the great Nine Days of Prayer, lasting from the day after Ascension (Friday, May 30) to the Eve of Pentecost (Saturday, June 7).

As you'll remember, it's traditional to have special prayers during these nine days in imitation of the first disciples, who prayed together for nine days in Jerusalem as they awaited the coming of the promised Holy Spirit after Jesus ascended into heaven.

Below are prayer prompts for each day. You can offer these prayers to God privately, with your family/friends, or in community on Zoom each of the nine days at 6:30 am during Morning Prayer. To join the Zoom group, use Meeting ID 837 6018 1434 and Passcode 027098.

Day 1 (Fri., May 30): Pray for our World. For world leaders to seek justice, freedom, and the dignity of every person. For nations at war to seek a way to cease fighting. For relief of famine, natural, and environmental disaster. For an end to persecution of Christians and all vulnerable people in every society. For corruption, violence and wickedness to be overcome by justice, peace, and righteousness. For farmers and an abundance of food for all. For artists, athletes, musicians and storytellers to thrive.

Day 2 (Sat., May 31): Pray for Married people. For Christian marriages "to be a sign of Christ's love to this sinful and broken world, that unity may overcome estrangement, forgiveness heal guilt, and joy conquer despair" (BCP 429). For those engaged to be married. For marriages strained or failing, that God would bring healing.

Day 3 (Sun., June 1): Pray for the Departed and for Resurrection Hope. For those who have died in the hope of Christ, that their joy may be fulfilled in God's presence. For those who mourn, the "strength to meet the days ahead in the comfort of a reasonable and holy hope, in the joyful expectation of eternal life with those they love" (BCP 481). For the joy of Easter never to leave us. For God to grant us a holy death and to know his presence always.

Day 4 (Mon., June 2): Pray for those who Suffer and Those in any Trouble. For the sick. For those suffering from depression, mental illness and addiction. For prisoners and their families. For the poor and neglected. For refugees and immigrants. For physically disabled people. For the homeless. For the unemployed. For those facing discrimination and hatred. For the Capital City Rescue Mission, the Damian Center, Loaves and Fishes, and the Children's Cafe.

Day 5 (Tues., June 3): Pray for St. Peter's Church. For our parish to live out its mission to "Worship in Beauty. Practice Mercy. Hope in Jesus Christ." For our parishioners, from the youngest to the oldest. For our priest. For our staff. For our Guilds and lay leaders. For our Vestry. For our choir. For the Daughters of the King, Julia Chapter. For God to raise up from our parish new leaders, to give us fresh vision and to give us a heart to reach our city.

Day 6 (Wed, June 4): Pray for Single people and Children. For singles to taste the love and presence of God in their lives in a powerful way. For them to enjoy deep and nurturing friendships and extended family circles. For those who feel called to marriage to find godly partners. For those who are single because of divorce or death to find healing and hope for the life ahead. For a particular blessing on youth and children — for protection and nurturing as lights of Christ in their generation.

Day 7 (Thurs., June 5): Pray for the Universal Church, its members, and its mission. For Christ's one, holy catholic and apostolic church throughout the world and throughout time. For Christian unity. For our part of the church: the Anglican Communion and for the election of the next the Archbishop of Canterbury. For the Episcopal Church and Sean Rowe, Presiding Bishop. For the Diocese of Albany and Jeremiah Williamson, our bishop. For the ministry of all the baptized and of all bishops, priests and deacons. For the gospel to be rightly preached and the sacraments to be rightly administered. For an increase in baptisms and confirmations.

Day 8 (Fri., June 6): Pray for the Nation and all in authority and service. For the Congress, President, and Supreme Court of these United States. For the state Assembly and Senate, our Governor, and New York courts. For our city of Albany: our Common Council, our Mayor, and the courts. For the military, police officers, firefighters, emergency workers, health care workers, and all government employees. For utility and sanitation workers. For schools and teachers. For the news media. For business people and all workers.

Day 9 (Sat., June 7): Pray for the Coming of the Holy Spirit. For a fresh encounter of the Holy Spirit to direct, fill and rule our lives this Pentecost, individually and as a parish. "Almighty and eternal God, so draw our hearts to thee, so guide our minds, so fill our imaginations, so control our wills, that we may be wholly thine, utterly dedicated unto thee; and then use us, we pray thee, as thou wilt, and always to thy glory and the welfare of thy people; through our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. Amen" (BCP 832).

Teen Breakfast Club

The Teen Breakfast Club will meet on Sunday, June 1st for a discussion of the Holy Spirit. This will be our final meeting until the Club resumes in September. We meet the first Sunday of each month to enjoy a simple breakfast, have a short spiritual discussion, and pray. The Club meets in Mtr. Christina's office from 9:30am to 10:05am. Rock and Root Hikers

Our hiking club, the Rock and Root Hikers, will explore Hollyhock Hollow on Sunday, June 22 at 1:30 pm. We'll be hiking the white trail, which is about 1¹/₂ miles on mostly flat terrain. Hollyhock Hollow Sanctuary is at 46 Rarick Road in Selkirk, about a 25-minute drive from Albany. This will be our last parish hike until the fall. All are welcome!

At 6:30 am, all are welcome to join in saying Morning Prayer on Zoom for the Nine Days of Prayer between the day after Ascension (Friday, May 30) to the Eve of Pentecost (Saturday, June 7). To join the Zoom group, use Meeting ID 837 6018 1434 and Passcode 027098. The service lasts for about 20 minutes, and no onscreen presence is required. It's a wonderful way to start the day!

Summer Wednesdays in the Garden - Returns

Our normally scheduled Wednesday worship will move outside for the summer months into the garden between the Church and Guild House. The garden gate will be unlocked during lunch hours for anyone to bring a bag lunch and/or just enjoy some quiet. The Chancel at the very front of the church contains the six lancet stained glass windows commemorating the life of St Peter. Listed below, in order from left to right.

1st - The Harriet Langdon Parker Window pictures the Call of St. Peter with the legend: "Follow Me, and I will make you Fishers of Men."


2nd - The Irwin Window indicating the Confession of St. Peter with the legend: "Thou art the Christ, the Son of the living God."

3rd - The Taylor Window depicts the Charge of St. Peter with the legend: "Jesus saith unto him Feed my sheep."

4th - The Tremain Window pictures The Pentecostal Sermon of St. Peter, with the legend: "This Jesus hath God raised up: whereof we are all witnesses."

5th - **The Pelz Window** pictures The Healing of the Cripple by St. Peter and St. John at the Beautiful Gate of the Temple, with the legend: "In the Name of Jesus Christ of Nazareth rise up and walk".

6th. - The Amasa J. Parker Window pictures the Release of St. Peter from Prison, with legend: "The angel of the Lord came upon him, and a light shined in the prison."

1. Approval of the Vestry Meeting Minutes, March 11th, 2025

The vestry minutes from the March 11th, 2025 meeting were approved on a motion by A. Closson, seconded by A. Panzironi, then unanimously approved by the vestry.

2. Rector Report - Mtr. Christina

Pastoral updates:

Participated in Teen Breakfast Club on Sunday, April 6, with Katie Brillat leading a discussion of the four gospel accounts of the resurrection story. Did last rites on March 19 for Deborah Campbell at Albany Medical Center.

Concluded the Lent for Kids talks on Sunday, April 6. We'll take off Palm and Easter Sundays and then we'll do a 7-week series of kids' talks on the Lord's Prayer, taking us through to the summer break.

Continuing Lent Zoom Morning Prayer on Fridays.

Continuing a Lent Small Group on Tuesdays on Zoom.

Participated when I could in the weekly Lenten phase of the Walk with Peter class, which John Davis is leading.

Participated in our second and final Lenten Evensongs on March 21 and April 4.

Helped out at Loaves and Fishes on March 15, along with Laura and several other members of the parish.

Led a Rock and Root Hikers trip on March 16 on the Beaver Trail at Five Rivers.

Officiated the interment of David Moltke in our Columbarium after the 8:30 am Eucharist on Sunday, March 23.

Did one home visit with a parishioner.

Continuing to encourage children 7 and older to try out being acolytes. Have secured some used red acolytes' robes and cottas in kids' and teen sizes that we should be able to start using soon.

Met with Daniel and the choir on Thursday, March 27 to summarize and discuss the main feedback from the choir survey from this winter. It was a good conversation.

Preparing an adult for Baptism, which will hopefully take place in Eastertide.

Led a very energetic Children's Chapel on March 30 - there were about a dozen kids and perhaps five adults.

Met with my spiritual director on March 18.

Did sacramental confession on April 8.

Took a few hours for study and prayer on Wednesday, March 26.

Big Picture and Mission/Vision work:

We are continuing to do preparation for – and promotion of – our Summer Music Adventure choir camp scheduled for July 7-11 and 13th. We placed an ad in the Spotlight News Summer Camp Guide that publishes in April, and we're making calls to schools offering to do in-class music demonstrations or to host field trips to our church to teach about organ/choral music and invite kids to join choir school.
