"On this day the LORD has acted; we will rejoice and be glad in it." – Psalm 118:24

Beloved of God,

When I was a little kid growing up in the Assemblies of God, "praise and worship" music with guitars, song leaders, and tambourines was the norm. One of our regular songs was "This is the Day," which I also sang in Sunday School. It was a musical version of the Psalm quoted above with a slightly different translation than our Prayer Book, "This is the day that the LORD has made; we will rejoice and be glad in it."

Psalm 118 is special. You could say all Holy Week and Easter is contained in its 29 verses. In fact, it's always the Psalm our church traditionally reads on Easter Sunday morning. How fitting! Could there be any other day that has caused more rejoicing and gladness than the morning of the empty tomb?

As I write this, we're almost at the halfway point of our Lenten journey. Every Sunday in Lent, as many of you know, I'm preaching on Lenten Psalms. It made sense, then, to share with you some of the riches of Psalm 118 as we near the spiritual journey that is Holy Week.

- Psalm 118 is about Palm Sunday. Verses 25-27 say "Hosannah, LORD, hosannah! ...Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD...God is the LORD; he has shined upon us; form a procession with branches up to the horns of the altar." All of these quotes are fulfilled on Palm Sunday when Jesus enters Jerusalem in triumph as the promised Messiah. The crowds call out "Hosannah" (which means, "Save us!") as they cut palm branches and throw their cloaks at his feet. Each Sunday in our Holy Communion prayers, we remember this moment when we, too, say, "Blessed is he who comes in the name of the LORD." Just as the people of Jerusalem welcomed Jesus as the one who can save, so we welcome him to our altar to save us by his power made manifest in the Eucharistic feast.
- Psalm 118 is about Jesus' rejection by sinners. Verse 22 says "The same stone which the builders rejected has become the chief cornerstone." This verse is quoted multiple times in the New Testament. Jesus even quotes it as being about himself when he tells the parable of the wicked tenants who kill the landowner's son (Matthew 21:33-46).
- Psalm 118 is about Jesus' vindication by God. Verse 17 says "I shall not die, but live, and declare the works of the LORD. The LORD has punished me sorely, but he did not hand me over to death." Even through Jesus' death on the cross seemed to indicate that he was cursed by God (see further Galatians 3:13), his resurrection vindicates him – that he was truly God's son, doing the will of the Father.
- Psalm 118 is about Jesus' triumph over the powers of hell. Verse 10-13 say "All the ungodly encompass me; in the name of the LORD I will repel them. They hem me in, they hem me in on every side; in the name of the LORD I will repel them. The swarm about me like bees; they blaze like a fire of thorns; in the name of the LORD I will repel them. I was pressed so hard that I almost fell, but the LORD came to my help." These verses describe a violent attack on the Psalmist that is thwarted by the power of God. Jesus' cross and resurrection is the ultimate triumph over the dark designs of the forces of hell who war against God and God's good creation.
- Psalm 118 was likely what Jesus and the disciples sang after the Last Supper as they walked to Gethsemane (Mark 14:26). Psalm 118 was the last of the Passover Psalms traditionally sung at the end of the meal. Imagine Jesus singing those words, knowing what lay before him: he was about to become the living sacrifice going up to the altar. He was about to be rejected, and he was about to be vindicated.

This Holy Week, perhaps you'll choose a day to read Psalm 118 to yourself and reflect on our Lord's suffering, his victory, and his everlasting love that led him to the cross for you.

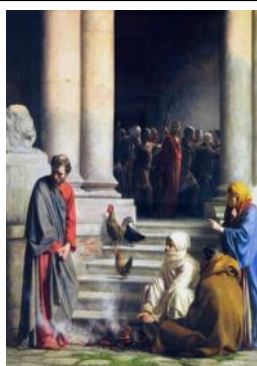
Adult Bible Study - Walking with Peter

The Classic Lenten Disciplines

Lent is a season of clearing away distractions in our lives to draw closer to Jesus. The practices below are ways of growing in repentance and intimacy with our Lord as with journey with him toward the cross. Each week, St. Peter's parishioners are invited to try on a new practice. We also have a Zoom group on Tuesday mornings where parishioners can come to ask questions and share experiences (see page 3 in the newsletter).

Lent 4 (March 30-April 5) Reading the Scriptures

Reading the Scriptures is a way of entering into God's sacred story that is – in fact – our own. Reading for even five minutes a day can have a profound impact on our lives over time. Pick a time each day when you can read a manageable amount of Scripture – a single chapter or a Psalm. For this week, challenge yourself by reading through an entire shorter book (like 6-chapter Ephesians or 4-chapter Philippians) or consecutive chapters in a gospel.

Lent 5 (April 6-12) Meditating on the Scriptures

Meditating on the Scriptures is less like reading the Bible and more like inviting the Bible to read us. Pick just a single verse or two (perhaps from the passages you read last week or from Sunday's gospel) and spend five minutes reading slowly, savoring each word. Ask the Holy Spirit to speak to you through associations or images that come. End your reflection with a minute of silence, enjoying God's presence.

Lent 6 (Holy Week) Encountering Christ in Worship

Plan to attend at least one mid-week Holy Week service this year (Maundy Thursday, Good Friday, or Holy Saturday). Ask Jesus to help you encounter him in a new way during that service. Come to church open to what the Spirit may speak to you. Consider writing down your reflections afterward and what you think God may have been saying to you.

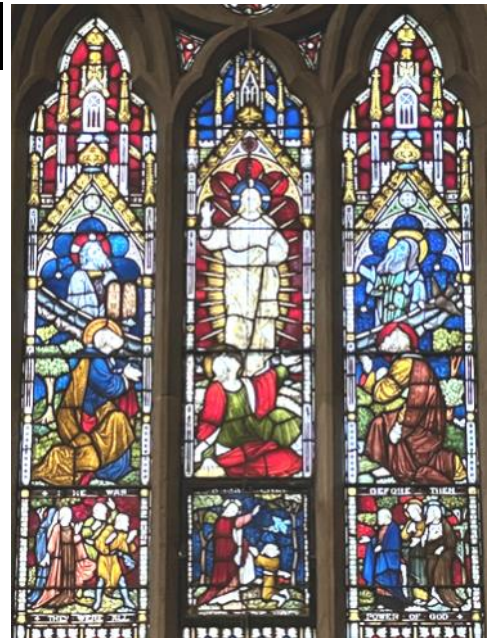
Christmas, the nativity of Christ; the Lansing Window, designed by Henry Holiday in honor of Abraham Lansing.

1. Approval of the Vestry Meeting Minutes, January 14th, 2025

The vestry minutes from the January 14th, 2025 meeting were approved on a motion by W. Petitt, seconded by A. Panzironi, then unanimously approved by the vestry.

2. Rector Report – Mtr. Christina

Pastoral updates:

1. Participated in Teen Breakfast Club on Sunday, Feb. 2. Teaching was led by Katie Brillat. The theme was different kinds of love.
2. Participated in the internment service for Ted Philips in our Columbarium on Jan. 15.
3. Have begun working with younger kids who want to become Acolytes in Training, starting with Matthew Saffares, who helped during Holy Communion on Jan. 19.
4. Participated in the Walk with Peter class on Feb. 9 on Peter's rescue from prison by the angel.
5. Initiated the launch of the new website with our IT team.
6. Hired Andrew from the Albany Ambassadors to work for us for the next six months on Sunday mornings. He was excited to return after his month with us in December.
7. Helped lead the Annual Meeting, Tea and Hymn Sing on January 26.
8. Officiated the funeral of David Moltke on Feb. 1. His interment at St. Peter's will follow in the next several weeks.
9. Made one nursing home visit to a parishioner.
10. Trained a new member of our Lay Eucharistic Ministers team.
11. Daniel and I have started receiving back choir survey forms – the deadline for submission is late February. He's also updated our recruiting flyer for kids, and we're planning on making a visit to the South End Children's Café soon to see if we can interest any new kids.
12. Took a study day on January 24 and attended the ordination of a friend in Pittsburgh.

6. Property –

Though this is a very important ministry the vestry would like to move forward with, the other two projects are more vital at this time and our yearly budget can not fund all three. The vestry discussed advertising to parishioners for donations to help move the project forward.
