"Luke the beloved physician greets you, as does Demas." — Colossians 4:14

Beloved of God,

We're about to spend a year with Jesus through the eyes of Luke. Our Sunday gospel readings for most of 2025 will be from his pen.

Luke is an interesting Gospel writer. Unlike Matthew and John, he wasn't one of the twelve apostles who were able to tell first hand stories about what Jesus did. Luke is also unlike Mark, who supposedly got a lot of his Jesus stories firsthand from St. Peter.

Instead, Luke was a traveling companion of Paul in his missionary journeys. The Scriptures also describe him as a doctor, and some scholars think he may have even been a Gentile.

Also, Luke seems to have gotten his stories about Jesus from a variety of eyewitness interviews. He writes at the beginning of his gospel, "In as much as many have undertaken to compile a narrative of the things that have been accomplished among us, just as *those who from the beginning were eyewitnesses* (my emphasis) and ministers of the word have delivered them to us, it seemed good to me also, having followed all things closely for some time past, to write an orderly account for you, most excellent Theophilus, that you may have certainty concerning the things you have been taught." (Luke 1:1-4).

You can see from the above passage that Luke interviewed many eyewitnesses of Jesus' ministry to write this account. He did the same thing to write the book of Acts, although Luke did witness some events in that book firsthand.

So what can we expect from Luke's version of the life of Jesus? Luke — perhaps because of his work as a physician — records many of Jesus' healings and miracles. He also tells many stories of Jesus reaching out in compassion to the poor, the marginalized, and the outcast (including Gentiles). Luke's gospel also emphasizes the importance of the Holy Spirit and of women in Jesus' ministry.

Some passages found only in Luke are among those people listed as their favorite Jesus stories, including the parables of the Good Samaritan and the Prodigal Son, the account of the Annunciation, the visit of the shepherds to Jesus on Christmas night, and the disciples on the road to Emmaus on Easter Day.

A final question: who is this Theophilus guy? You may have noticed in the above quote from Luke 1 that the gospel is written to Theophilus (Acts is written to him as well). He's apparently someone who Luke wanted to give this well-researched account of Jesus' ministry so that Theophilus could be certain in his faith.

Scholars and church historians have — you guessed it — many theories about who Theophilus was. Some believe he was a Jew from Alexandria or an important Roman official. Others think he was a Jewish high priest (Caiaphas'' brother in law) or Paul's lawyer during his Roman imprisonment.

A final theory is that Theophilus wasn't a real person at all. The name "Theophilus" means "friend of God," and so we could think of this gospel and Acts as being written to anyone who is a friend of God and who wants their faith to be strong and certain.

So get ready, friends of God. We're in for some wonderful stories.



Approval of the Vestry Meeting Minutes, October 8th, 2024

The vestry minutes from the October 8th, 2024 meeting were approved on a motion by M. Lundberg, seconded by W. Pettit, then unanimously approved by the vestry.

2 Rector Report - Mtr. Christina

Pastoral updates:

- 1 Led our second Teen Breakfast Club on Sunday, Nov. 3. Topic was Horror and Holiness: A Reflection on Halloween and All Saints Day.
- 2 Did two home visits with pet blessings and two other home visits without.
- 3 Officiated Mari Bennett's memorial service on Nov. 2.
- 4 Officiated at a memorial service for Col. George Munro on Nov. 2. (About 30 folks attended, many of them new to St. Peter's).
- 5 Officiated the funeral and burial of John Cerniglia on Nov. 3.
- 6 Prepped Anna Barnes for First Holy Communion, which she received on Nov. 3.
- 7 Celebrated the Eucharist on All Saints' Day, Nov. 1, with John Davis preaching.
- 8 Awarded ice cream cards to two children for October's ABCs Bible Memory Challenge.
- 9 Led the Rock and Root Hikers outing on Oct. 20 at Thatcher Park. A dozen of us enjoyed the fall colors. Led another hike on Nov. 17 at Fox Preserve with seven hikers participating.
- 10 Co-led "Walk with Peter" studies with John Davis on Oct. 13, Oct. 27, and Nov. 10. The classes have been well attended with good discussion in the group. John has also led shortened sessions on each of the class dates after the 8:30 service.
- 11 Making progress on our web redesign.
- 12 Took an overnight study retreat on Oct. 18.
- 13 Was installed as the Albany Diocese chaplain of the Daughters of the King at the yearly assembly at Christ the King Center and preached at the closing Eucharist on Oct. 26.

3 Sr. Warden's Report –J. Chenot

We are starting this Novembers vestry meeting a week later than we would have planned, postponed due to last week's election day. The extra bit of time putting my notes together gave me a bit more time to reflect on a great deal of services and activities that have been going on right up to this past weekend.

When reflecting on last month's notes in October, it was apparent that we were all preparing and getting ready for our upcoming busy Advent season. But, before I get started, I wanted to report just a few things that occurred during October. We were able to send out the third quarter statement to our parishioners. The week following, a Stewardship letter was sent from our treasurer George Scala, including a pledge card. Thank you for all your help with this George, including all the other financial reporting you do for us is immeasurable – thank you for your love and service to St. Peter's. The office has already begun receiving pledges for next year and we will have George inform us where we currently stand in his report. Thank you to those who have already pledged recently, as well as those who have in the past. Your financial contributions are so important to the life of the church. We are extremely fortunate to have an endowment to help supplement our budget each year and not invade the principle. There are times though, when emergency repairs are needed, which in those times your financial contributions are a blessing to all of us.

I want to mention the three memorial services that we just recently celebrated the first weekend in November. Saturday morning, November 2nd, we had a memorial service for a past member of St. Peter's and choir member Mari Bennett. Saturday evening, a service was performed honoring Col. George Munro, interred at St. Peter's. The following day, All Saints Day, we remembered our loved ones who have passed before us, as well as some celebrating First Holy Communion during the morning. That afternoon, we had another wonderful service for another past member of St. Peter's and longtime choir member, John Cerniglia. The choir performed the Faure' Requiem during the service, a musical piece John was very fond of. Finally, John was brought home to his final resting place. Many thanks to Mt. Christina and Danial Romero for coordinating all these meaningful services beforehand. A few extra rehearsals and homilies were needed, over and above preparing for the upcoming Advent season – so thank you both. The Faure' Requiem service for John was beautiful. Our choir, with many others, joined in performing in the service, many of whom had sung with John in the past. Also, I would like to mention and thank Emerson Fang for accompanying the choir with strings during the Faure' - you were wonderful. An incredible reception was held after John's service in our parish hall, which was very well attended. The following day, November 4th, we opened our doors once again to the homeless overflow shelter at St. Peter's serving those from the Capital City Mission. This year, as in the past, we will be hosting gentlemen in the evening who need shelter during the cold winter nights in our Parish Hall. Thank you to those who continue to support this important outreach mission we extend helping our immediate neighbors. Please know that your donated food, snacks, and drinks are very much appreciated. We are also looking for monetary donations for those who cannot shop for items but would still like to contribute. Financial donations are used to supplement a void in food donations when necessary, as well as, support the Mission volunteers and mentors staying with our guests overnight.

This past Saturday, November 16th we hosted our annual Pre- Thanksgiving Dinner, an annual tradition we have done for some years now. The dinner was a tremendous success with many parishioners and friends attending. Many thanks to everyone who participated in preparing all the side dishes for the Thanksgiving feast, as well as those who cooked all the turkeys beforehand at their homes. It was a great evening for all with great food and hospitality for all to enjoy. The following day, this past Sunday, our Sunday School Children baked pumpkin bread for our congregation, which will be blessed and given out this upcoming Sunday for all to enjoy.

Christmas Season is approaching with many festivities and services during December. On Sunday, December 15th, at the 10:30 service the Sunday school will be performing their annual Christmas Pageant. Once again, I want to thank Laura Rulison and the entire Sunday school staff for their commitment to our younger upcoming generation, as well as those who help in the nursery. Following that same day in the afternoon at 3:00, our choir will perform Handel's Messiah with chamber orchestra. Thank you to Danial and the entire choir for their commitment and musical gifts they offer to all the upcoming musical events that will be performed in the next few weeks.

Sunday, December 22nd, Lessons and Carols will be performed by our choir at the 10:30 service, followed by our annual Hanging of the Greens at 12:00, including the luncheon served during the event. We hope that everyone will be able to attend this traditional event which brings the congregation together in fellowship and beatifying the church for Christmas Eve.
