Declaration on the Crisis of Global Trust in Western Powers:

A Call for Sovereignty, Dignity, and Global Peace

Preamble

In the name of the Almighty, Source of Justice and Righteousness, and in eternal remembrance of the blood of martyrs who have fallen in the sacred struggle for liberty, we, the sons and daughters of Africa and freedom-loving peoples throughout the earth, now raise this Declaration before The World.

I. A Legacy of Betrayal: A Pattern of Subversion and Assassination

From the rising of the independence spirit among colonized peoples, foreign powers – chiefly Western in origin – have employed assassination, destabilization, covert subterfuge, and economic bondage to prevent true sovereignty.

Among the noble lives extinguished by these designs were:

- Patrice Lumumba, who dreamed of a free and united Congo, betrayed by Belgian and American hands.
- Thomas Sankara, the upright "African Che Guevara," was cut down for daring to teach self-sufficiency and dignity to Burkina Faso.
- Kwame Nkrumah, father of Pan-Africanism, overthrown by internal subversion linked to external masters.
- Amílcar Cabral, who built a people's movement so strong that even in death, his spirit led his people to freedom.
- Muammar Gaddafi, whose vision of a United States of Africa threatened the foundations of global imperialism, thus leading to his brutal execution by a NATO-led intervention.
- Malcolm X, who sought to internationalize the Black struggle and link it with anti-colonial movements worldwide was assassinated before realizing this vision.
- Dr. Martin Luther King Jr., who in the final years of his life moved beyond civil rights to openly oppose militarism, capitalism, and colonialism, and who paid with his life for this boldness.

Each of these leaders dared to imagine an order built on dignity, equality, and self-rule. Each was met by violence from forces invested in perpetual domination.

II. Libya, the warning to all leaders who dare to assert independence.

In 2011, Libya, once a beacon of prosperity in Africa, boasting free healthcare, education, and the Great Man-Made River, was destroyed through NATO aggression.

- Former Secretary of State Hillary Clinton spearheaded the campaign to destabilize Libya.

- Former President Barack Obama himself later admitted Libya's post-intervention chaos as his "worst mistake."
- The devastation of Libya not only toppled a sovereign nation but triggered a migration catastrophe, destabilized the Sahel, and fed over a decade of insecurity.

III. The Modern Awakening: Africa Rises Again

The seeds sown by Lumumba, Sankara, Cabral, and Gaddafi bear fruit today.

Africa's youth are conscious, and sensible.

- Africa has the youngest population in the world, with over 60% of its population under the age of 25. By 2030, young Africans are expected to make up 42% of the world's youth population.
- Julius Malema of South Africa speaks boldly against neocolonialism, intruders that overstayed their welcome, demands the return of stolen African lands and minerals to Africans, and calls for a continent unchained from European hegemony.
- Captain Ibrahim Traoré of Burkina Faso embodies the spirit of Sankara, fighting for the dignity and self-determination of his people despite slanders and threats from disgruntled Western actors like *Emmanuel Macron* and *Gen. Michael E. Langley*.
- Colonel Assimi Goïta of Mali and General Abdourahamane Tchiani of Niger stand firm against French neocolonial exploitation and demand new terms for Africa's future.

Across Mali, Burkina Faso, Niger, and beyond, the French military is being expelled.

The CFA franc – a colonial currency – is being challenged.

New coalitions of sovereign African states arise, committed to mutual defense and real economic independence.

IV. Western Fear and Retaliation: Undermining Peacemakers

The attempt on the life of President Donald J. Trump, a figure seeking to halt endless wars, rebuild national sovereignty, and foster genuine peace, is no anomaly. It follows the dark pattern recorded in the recently declassified JFK assassination files, which expose decades of deep-state conspiracies to maintain imperial dominance.

We are reminded of another peacemaker: President John F. Kennedy.

Following the Bay of Pigs disaster and the Cuban Missile Crisis, Kennedy rejected hawkish counsel and steered the world away from nuclear war. He forged the 1963 Partial Nuclear Test Ban Treaty, pursued diplomacy with the Soviet Union, and publicly warned of the military-industrial complex and CIA overreach.

Kennedy saw that adversaries were not monsters, but humans - desiring safety, security, and peace. He gave speeches calling for global empathy, even friendship with former foes.

Jeffrey Sachs, in *To Move the World*, describes Kennedy's pivot from aggression to diplomacy as revolutionary – a lesson buried with him when he was assassinated in 1963. Sachs and Chris Hedges note that since then, <u>war has replaced dialogue</u>, and military expansion has substituted statesmanship.

This failure echoes today in Ukraine, the Middle East, and Africa, where nuance is drowned in propaganda and peace is dismissed as weakness.

The forces that destroyed Kennedy, Martin Luther King Jr., Alberta King, Abraham Lincoln, Emperor Tewodros II, Malcolm, Sankara, Lumumba, and Gaddafi still operate.

They fear peace.

They profit from war.

They tremble at the prospect of nations charting their own destinies.

"My fellow citizens of the world, ask not what America can do for you, but what together we can do for the freedom of mankind." - JFK.

V. Trump's Challenge and the Shadow of Empire

President Donald J. Trump, despite political differences, has also called for an end to endless wars. His attempts to restore diplomacy with Ukraine, North Korea, Gaza, Syria, DR Congo and even Russia were met with sabotage by elements in the intelligence and defense establishment.

The recent attempt on President Trump's life must be seen not in isolation, but within a broader global history – a pattern wherein leaders who challenge military dominance are removed.

Rwanda and the Democratic Republic of Congo have signed an agreement to remove Rwanda's backed M23 rebels, draft a peace deal by May 2025 and to respect each other's sovereignty in front of US Secretary of State Marco Rubio.

Current president of DR Congo Tshisekedi has accused former president Kabila of backing rebel forces stating his return would be contentious.

Many International work laws are generationally violated while extracting minerals from most of Africa.

They, like Kennedy before them, seek cooperation over conquest. But history warns us: such leaders must be protected, or the self-determination sought by an entire world of people will forever stain the everlasting journey for World Peace.

VII. Affirmation of the Ethiopian World Federation (EWF) as True Diplomats

In light of the 1951 Treaty of Amity and Economic Relations between the United States of America and Ethiopia, we, The Ethiopian World Federation (EWF), reaffirm our role as legitimate diplomats and emissaries of peace. This treaty, established to promote friendly relations and mutual economic interests, underscores the importance of diplomatic engagement and the recognition of sovereign entities in international affairs.

The EWF, rooted in the principles of unity, self-determination, and global cooperation, embodies the spirit of this treaty. Our commitment to fostering peaceful relations and advocating for the rights and dignity of African peoples aligns with the treaty's objectives of encouraging mutually beneficial investments and closer economic intercourse between nations.

As such, we assert our position as true diplomats, dedicated to upholding the values enshrined in the 1951 treaty and working towards a world where sovereignty, dignity, and peace are paramount.

VIII. Resolution

We, proclaim this resolution before the nations of the earth:

- That war must never be the first instrument of foreign policy.
- That Africa including Africans and Negroes will never again be the playground of imperial designs.
- That leaders pursuing peace be they African or American must be shielded, not slain.
- That the AU has been compromised by the EU and is not fit to represent Africans at home or abroad.
- That the doctrine of Kennedy, Gaddafi, Sankara, Lumumba, and others lives on in this generation.
- That unity among nations based on shared humanity is not idealism but necessity.

Let the lessons of the Cold War, the destruction of Libya, and the recent resistance across West Africa serve as permanent testimony:

The future belongs not to those who exploit, but to those who reconcile.

IX. We, The Ethiopian World Federation, Incorporated Therefore,

- Declare ourselves as the rightful, living diplomatic representatives of the African peoples, at home and abroad.
- Affirm that our historic ties to Ethiopia through the 1951 Treaty, The League of Nations, and the EWF Constitution are divine and binding.
- Demand an end to imperialist meddling, economic sabotage, and character assassination against American and African leaders who prioritize their people's sovereignty.

- Stand united in brotherhood with all African governments who are karmically seeking peace, justice, and economic independence.
- Call for recognition at The United Nations as a sovereign intergovernmental organization (IGO) and rightful observer to all bodies addressing Africa's future.

We invoke the spirit of Emperor Haile Selassie I, the balance of Empress Menen, the truth of Malcolm X, the courage of Ibrahim Traoré, the wisdom of Thomas Sankara, the sacrifice of Lumumba, and the unity of all African peoples as we rise to our ordained position in the community of nations.

Let the world know: Africa shall no longer be the battleground of empires. It shall be the sanctuary of nations.
