

Welcome to the Autumn 2011 issue of the Whilton Newsletter.

As the new team embarks on editing the Newsletter, we must express our debt of gratitude to Derek and Shirley Brown, who carried out this task so well and so long. In the edition of December 1992 there was a note that the Newsletter had been going for 5 years, and the editors asked whether or not parishioners wished the Newsletter to continue. 40 questionnaires were returned with a positive response. By August Shirley had joined the editorial team with Harold and Trudy Haynes and Anne Heeley. Shirley has been involved with every Newsletter since then.

When Anne left in April 1998, the editors reported: "We welcome to the committee Derek Brown, who for some time now has been making a considerable input to the Newsletter." This was no understatement. His contributions included notes on Neighbourhood Watch, the Spinney Project, the PCC, Operation Spring Clean and the Village Hall Committee.

After Harold's death in 2000, Trudy retired from the group in 2002. Sara Meadows was part of the team from 2001 to 2005. From that time Shirley and Derek have kept the parish informed with no assistance for another six years. We appreciate all they have done in keeping the Newsletter lively and interesting, encouraging contributions from around the parish, and arranging the distribution every two months.

The Newsletter will now be published quarterly, and we shall try to keep up the high standards set by our predecessors. Under Shirley and Derek's leadership the Newsletter has moved from mainly handwritten articles as the villagers have become computer literate. Even so, contributions in any form are still welcome. Following a time of turmoil in the spring I am pleased to report that we now have a full complement of councillors.

I personally would like to thank Mike Lewis for his help and support whilst he was Chairman of the Parish Council.

At the Parish Council Meeting on 13th July 2011 Peter Wingrave and Greg Lye were voted onto the council. Ken Bowers resigned as Chairman and Peter Wingrave was subsequently elected as the new Chairman and Ken Bowers was elected as Vice Chairman.

Over the past 2 months there have been 3 planning applications received by the Parish Council, namely —

- 7 South View, Whilton (renewal of outline planning application)
- Erection of a Motor Control Centre Kiosk, Distribution Kiosk and a Standby Generator at Whilton Sewage Treatment Works
- Proposed altered access and storage of Caravans at Norton Fields Farm, Norton

Work has been carried out do alleviate the flooding along Brington Lane, hopefully the problem has now been alleviated.

New quotes are being sort for a new village sign. It is hoped that a sign will be in the centre of the village again before too long.

There has been a good uptake of the vacant allotments with only one currently unoccupied. The noise level from Whilton Mill is being monitored.

WHILTON PARISH COUNCIL

In April 1996, Jim Gardner was about to retire as Chairman of Whilton Parish Council. More Councillors were needed and he wrote: "Candidates should have a genuine interest and commitment to the whole parish and at times have broad shoulders because *you cannot please all of the people all of the time.*" Mike Lewis was already Vice Chair and these words could be a suitable description of Mike's attitude for the following years during which he was Chairman of the Council, and I believe the first Chairman from the Locks.

Although the work of the Parish Council Chairman sometimes seems repetitive and humdrum, a great deal has been achieved during Mike's chairmanship. Despite having to cope with a barrage of new regulations, systems and codes of conduct, he was reliable, committed and always acted for what he believed was for the good of the community. Over the years he gained deep experience and knowledge of the planning system and gave innumerable voluntary hours to answering consultations, attending meetings and educating the parishioners about individual planning concerns. These have included opposition to the Rye Hill tip, the proposed Rugby Airport, consultations over Long Buckby station, and giving Whilton a voice particularly over traffic concerns generated by proposals for the growth of Daventry.

Concerns about traffic and highways led to the inauguration of parish walks to note problems and dangers, whether from speeding traffic or blocked drains. During his chairmanship Mike was pleased to see the Parish Council regularizing the mowing of the churchyard and providing a more suitable mower, providing notice boards and seating in the village and Locks, arranging litter picks, and installing a dustbin and a new street lamp at the Locks. The Council supported the production of the Village Design Statement giving the community a say in the development of the parish.

He was in the chair when the Parish Council funded the Millennium Map, the production of a celebratory mug made by our local potter, Peter Ilsley, and refreshments and fireworks on the eve of 2000, despite the rain. As noted at the time: "Mike Lewis, Chairman of the Parish Council and his wife Barbara were not to be beaten and carried on under very difficult circumstances to complete the display...this was a very successful evening." In 2002 celebrations for the Queen's Golden Jubilee were again funded by the Parish Council and organized by a band of enthusiastic volunteers.

Mike retired from both the Village Hall Committee and from the Parish Council in May 2011, having served as Chairman for 15 years, and worked with four Parish Clerks.

We thank Mike for all his commitment and wish him well in his retirement from the grass root level of Local Government.

COOKERY CLASS



THE WHILTON PAROCHIAL CHARITIES

The Trustees decided in their Annual Report that a notice would again be published in the August issue of the Village Newsletter reminding residents about to embark on university study or new work training of our existence, or of any age, in difficult circumstances, and continuing to indicate safeguards for confidentiality of applicants. We will discuss any 'What if?' situation before any name is mentioned if you, or an agency, approach one of us. Recipients of grants in previous years are welcome to apply again if circumstances remain the same or indeed if a new need has arisen.

Annual Report presented to the Annual Parish Meeting on 14th April 2011

This has proved to be a disappointing year in many respects. The value of the Charity's assets has risen slightly mainly due to recovering share prices, but they are still some way from their 2007/08 value. That said, the main disappointment is that only one application for a grant has been made, despite last year's expectation that demands should properly rise as difficulties multiplied for residents. During the year the Trustees have met twice which has allowed our new Rector to acquaint herself with what could be provided. Ideas on how to achieve more applications from residents as well as actual applications are very welcome. Our view remains that if the need is there, it should be met, and if the funds are thereby extinguished then this should accepted. So once again we would remind residents, young and old, of our criteria permanently displayed on the two village notice boards.

- i) The Trustees are prepared to give up to £900 in grants in sums usually not exceeding £300 and limited to one application per financial year.
- ii) These would be given on receipt of a written application to the trustees, in confidence, given to one of the trustees, explaining the need and difficulty in financially meeting it, or if preferred, an interview with one of the trustees which they would record.
- The need may be for a piece of equipment or experience that anyone with reasonable means could be expected to acquire e.g. a replacement mattress, TV licence, small house repair, musical instrument, evening class/skill giving course, playgroup fee, taxi fare to visit relative/friend in hospital, holiday break or significant school trip/expedition that would fulfill potential. It could be help with fees for, or transport costs including insurance, to further training.
- iv) Eligibility for an older or disabled person is defined as living mainly on a basic state pension or benefit, for a family living on an income half the national average wage, and for young people in their own right in a situation where it would not be expected a parent would fund the expense required. The payment may be requested to avoid consequences of a loan or the incurring of further debt.

This fund remains for anyone normally resident in the Parish Boundaries and we would urge you to mention the possibility to those who should benefit from the forethought of previous wealthier generous parishioners.

The three Charity Trustees to be approached are Ann Gilbert at Langton Cottage, Keith Hiscock, as the Parish Council nominee, at Langton House The Rector, Reverend Sue Kipling at Brington Rectory.

- The mobile libraries have a wide range of books, large print books and audio books.
- It is free to join. There are no forms to fill out.
- The mobile libraries have access to the library catalogue so staff can check the availability of titles from the huge range of stock in other Northamptonshire libraries. Reservations cost £1.25.
- · Each mobile is fitted with a lift for disabled people.

The County Council will review this new system in January 2012.

WHILTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

DON WELCH AND HIS TIMES 11 APRIL 1921 – 11 JULY 2010

The Local History Society met in July to hear the about the life and recorded memories of Don Welch, who died last year.

Don had clear memories of his happy Whilton childhood. His father and grandfather were hand sewing shoemakers from Northampton, but Don was born in 1921 in Holly House, where his family had moved, and he remembered his father as a shoemaker and repairer with his shop in Rugby. When he was still small the family moved into the shop, now the Old Shop, on the corner of Buckby Lane. Don's mother, Flo, kept the shop there until she was over 80. Don was brought up living with the shop, which was curtained off from the front room. He was used to customers arriving at any time of the day or evening; his mother always had time for them.

Downstairs was the living room, curtained off from the shop and a little narrow pantry or larder. Up the winding narrow stairs were two rooms, one leading into another, and after another brother arrived, the three boys all slept in one bed. They went up to bed with a candle. There was no heating, but they kept each other warm. The wash place was by the cobbled yard, with a copper boiler heated by a fire below. Clothes being washed were prodded with a stick. Soft water for washing came from the roof and was caught in a barrel. Water for drinking was fetched from the well across the road behind what we now call the Old Post Office. This well was shared by several households. His mother cooked on a black leaded stove, with a hook over for the pot and a kettle to one side.

He was particularly friendly with the Dunkley children at Martins Farm, now Church Farm. He reckoned that he and Bob Dunkley were the young tearaways of Whilton, riding horses up and down the street, and sometimes sheep too! He loved helping with the farm work, especially shocking up the sheaves to dry at harvest, and haymaking. He was interested in the Dunkleys' animals too, and had his own tortoise and angora rabbits at home.

His mother sold sweets and the Welch children were allowed to help themselves, on condition that they did not give them away – that would undermine mother's profits! Not that Flo made much money. A packet of cigarettes was 11 ½ d, which left Flo with no profit, but Don reckoned she enjoyed the company of the half dozen or so who came in during a day. She had always been used to company, as she was one of 14 children. In his memories Stan Haynes described how the Haynes children liked being sent on an errand to visit the shop, perhaps for a quarter of cheese, adding: "Mrs Welch always seemed glad to see us." She clearly enjoyed children's company. Stan also recalled that sometimes a group of children would go foraging for dandelion leaves and take a bundle to Mrs Welch for their pet rabbits. "Hold out your hands," she would say, and would fill each with half a dozen comfits, which she called "guinea pig mucks"!

We also heard how Don left Whilton School and trained as a carpenter in Daventry, sometimes going far afield for work during the difficult 1930s and receiving no pay when the weather was too bad for work. When war came he was involved in rebuilding the "gun shops" in Coventry by day after bombing by night. Later he was called up and was part of the invasion force, crossing the Channel in very rough weather in a flat bottomed American ship, with tanks which had broken loose. He then went through France, Holland, and Belgium in a Bren carrier, a small tank, coming to Arnhem where he witnessed the chaos a few days after the fighting there. He had to walk across the gliders which had landed there in order to cross a canal. As he said: "We were the support troops which did not make it." After crossing the Siegfried Line, Don could find no words for what he saw at Belsen, and then went on to the River Elbe, to face the Germans fleeing from Russian bombing and revenge.

When at last he came home he took up his work again, and finally returned to Whilton, where he renovated and modernized the house he had lived in as a child. His craftsmanship and carpentry skills meant that he was much in demand, and there are few older houses in Whilton where he did not do any work. Thus we could say that he literally made his mark on our community.

His patience and hard work helped him through a number of difficulties, which included the sudden loss of his first wife, leaving him with four children, and a serious work injury, which he overcame. A good number of his family attended the meeting and were able to meet with old friends, all a sign of the respect in which Don was held all his life.

The next meeting of the Local History Society will be on Thursday, 8th September, when the speaker will be Barry Smith on the subject of "Ridge and Furrow". All are welcome.


The next Social Lunch is planned for Thursday 17th November 2011.

Run a Travel Club helping your local area get the transport they need. Travel clubs can take groups of people shopping or on social trips

Volunteer Car Scheme

We call upon the services of volunteer drivers, using their own vehicles, to take clients to medical appointments. Clients telephone the office approximately a week before their appointment to book their journey. The Car Scheme Co-ordinator then telephones the available volunteer driver to arrange the journey. Volunteers from villages are usually matched with clients from the same village. Volunteers are reimbursed at the rate of 45p/mile.

Vehicle

You must own, or have access to, a reliable vehicle, and your road fund licence and M.O.T. certificate must be kept up to date. Most insurance policies automatically cover "car sharing", which covers DACT's situation. However, "Business Cover" or "Carriage of passengers for hire and reward" will also be sufficient

References

We are required to carry out CRB checks on all volunteers.

Minibus Scheme

DACT own a fleet of 15-passenger seat Coach Built Mercedes minibuses which are available to affiliated groups to hire for social or pleasure journeys. **Travel Clubs** can be set up to do weekly shopping trips or regular outings. If your bus route has been cut we may be able to help you. For insurance purposes, our minibus volunteer drivers must be between the ages of 25 and 70, with a minimum of 2 year's driving experience. We will train you in one of our modern coach built Mercedes Minibuses.

DACT Shopmobility

DACT runs the Shopmobility in Daventry Town Centre. We hire out scooters & Wheelchairs. We also sell a wide range of mobility aids.
