#### AGNES HELENA TOWNLEY 1911 – 2010

The funeral of Agnes took place in St Andrew's Church, Whilton on Wednesday 6<sup>th</sup> October 2010; the day before her 99<sup>th</sup> Birthday.

Agnes was born 7<sup>th</sup> October 1911 at Blenley Farm, Yardley Hastings to William & Ethel Wooding and was the last surviving sibling of a family of six. Agnes was seven when her mother died and she duly went to live with an Aunt & Uncle in Desford, Leicestershire.

When considered old enough she went into service in London with her sister Edna and in time they returned to work nearer home. Agnes moved to work at Spratton Grange and then Brockhall where it proved to be a turning point in her life. At a village dance at nearby Whilton she met John Samuel Leonard Townley, son of a farmer at Whilton. Romance blossomed and Agnes and John were married on 9<sup>th</sup> May 1936 in St Andrew's Church, Yardley Hastings.

Their marriage started in a cottage in Little Lane, Whilton and when Martins Farm (now Church Farm) came on the market, Mr Townley senior purchased the house and land and Agnes and John moved there.

After a long wait of thirteen years on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1949, John Samuel William was born. Agnes and John Samuel Leonard moved to Home Farm when his widowed mother died. Agnes returned to Martins Farm some years later after she was widowed.

She was fully involved with the farm, loved working outside in the fresh air and she drove a tractor, affectionately known as 'my little grey Fergie' with great confidence. Agnes was an excellent cook and music and dancing were a big part of her life and even on her 80<sup>th</sup> birthday she was dancing the Charleston, one of her favourites.

Agnes was very proud of her two grandsons John (the 9th) and Phillip and later her great-grandchildren.

After Agnes stayed at Martins Farm, where she was very happy, she then moved to a bungalow in Daventry where she lived before becoming too frail to cope by herself,

For the last four years of her life Agnes resided at the Grange Residential Home in Daventry where she was very happy and content.

Although John 8<sup>th</sup> and Sue moved to Long Buckby in 1998, their son John 9<sup>th</sup> and his wife Isobel and their two daughters still live and farm in the village

#### **Parish Council Notes**

The last Parish Council Meeting was held on Wednesday 12th November 2010. Mike Lewis, Jonathan Hanslip, Sue Wingrave, Michael Thomas and Nora Swinford, along with Steve Osborne (Northamptonshire County Councillor) and 2 parishioners were present. Apologies were received from Ken Bower, Wendy Amos (District Councillor) and Sarah Gray (Police Community Support Officer).

The main points from the meeting were as follows-

- Ros Gardner reported that Sarah Gray has been off sick since July. She is now back at work but not mobile so there are no Surgeries organised in the near future.
- The Village Green the adoption has been accepted in principle. Various solicitors are to be approached for quotes for Access agreements etc.
- A joint meeting of the Parish Council and Allotment Holders is to be arranged for early 2011.
- The problem with the drainage in Brington Lane is being addressed.
- The salt bins have been refilled ready for the winter.
- The Parish walk for the Councillors has been arranged for Saturday 27<sup>th</sup> November.
- There has been a problem with the noise from Whilton Mill. An official letter from the Council is to be written.

Steve Osborne, the County Councillor, reported that


The Flore bypass is being relooked at.

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# MY 50 YEARS as a MEMBER of the DAVENTRY BRANCH of CHURCH BELL RINGERS 1960 - 2010



When I joined the branch on 12th November 1960 it was at the Whilton Meeting. I had been ringing for at least a year prior to that date and was taught by my school teacher Mr Harold Haynes, who was my Proposer. It was at this time that the Webb family from Staverton was coming over to the tower at Whilton on a Thursday evening to help us out with our ringing numbers. So it was Mrs Iris Webb who Seconded me into the Branch.

The Whilton ringers [possibly only 4 of us] were taken to Staverton by Mr Haynes on a fortnightly basis. It was in the early 60's that I learned a lot from the Webbs, and so rang my first Peal at Staverton in 1967 on the 3rd bell, being:- KENT T B, St CLEMENTS, & PLAIN BOB.

Also by 1967 I had been ringing the Handbells with Stan & Iris Webb, to become founder members of the HANDBELL RINGERS OF GREAT BRITAIN. We had been to Worcester & Birmingham to ring at a rally the 2 years prior, and in Ashton-under-Lyne (1967), it was decided to start this Society but the distance was too great and we would be unable to attend.


I believe it was in 1962 when I was voted to join the Branch Committee, an office which I held for quite a number of years and then in the 70's I became the BRANCH RINGING MASTER, this I did for one or possibly two years.

It was also in the 70's that we held at least 1 or 2 Evening Bar-be-que's in the Barn opposite the green at Whilton when my cousin, Mr Colin Stanton, cooked the sausages in the barn, [I have the photo!]. Mr Malcolm Chown, who conducted most of our early peals, loved the idea of a Branch Get-Together every so often, but it was after this time that Malcolm sadly passed away. We were very close and I am Godfather to his eldest Son. Malcolm was helping me on conducting at this time, and I still have his notes on touches & conducting quarter peals.

I had taken over from Mr Haynes, [Harold] as Tower Captain at Whilton right up to us having our old 6 bells recast, with 2 extra bells to make this a lovely 8 in 1994. I think it was in 1996 that I relinquished my post as Whilton Tower Captain, as playing the Organ for Whilton & Gt Brington was a bit too much, then Sue & I moved to Long Buckby in 1998.

I now ring with Branch members at Staverton, in the Mornings once a month, as well as Gt Yarmouth when I can get there. I rang in a peal to mark the 900<sup>th</sup> anniversary of St Nicholas Church in 2001 and I became a life member of the Norwich Association of Bell Ringers.

On 13<sup>th</sup> November 2010 I rang in a quarter peal of Plain Bob Major, at Whilton, to mark my 50 years as a member of the Guild.

# Anthea traces a thousand years of Whilton history

After five years of painstaking research, Whilton villager Anthea Hiscock has just published a wonderful history of our small rural parish – a cracking story that spans a thousand years.

In 280 well-illustrated pages, Living in the Gap: the story of Whilton and its thousand acres, 1,000-2,000 A.D., reveals how the lives of local folk have been influenced by their geography and by events in the wider world during the period between the beginning and end of the second millennium.

The work has been a real labour of love for Anthea, for she regards it partly as "a celebration" of the 25 years she has lived in the village. As well as bringing up three daughters, she has been a playgroup supervisor in Whilton, president of the village W.I. and parish council clerk. In recent years she has shared her enthusiasm for delving into the past with members of her local history group.

Her scholarly credentials for the mammoth task of producing the book include a history degree from London University and a diploma in archive administration, followed by work with the London borough of Barnet and Bedfordshire Record Office. The discipline of research is enhanced by her attractive, straightforward style. Each of the 19 chapters can stand alone as a jolly good read.

She draws on a long list of sources to reveal changes and challenges in the parish in its passage from years of woad-growing and ox-drawn ploughs to heady times of wars, religious ruptures, lordly litigations and the coming of the railway, the canal and the M1. Her detective work has unravelled a complex web linking Whilton with many old families, estates and crafts in nearby parishes and adjoining counties.

Her main focus, however, is always on local villagers and their dramas, tragedies and triumphs. Numerous ancient wills are analysed, disclosing changing circumstances over many generations. Later chapters are packed with fascinating accounts of intimate oral and written memories of present inhabitants and others not long gone.

Present day references often based on personal interviews and documents provided by well known residents, make a gripping climax to a story that for me fully lives up to that wise comment by author and historian Thomas J. Noel: "History happens to all of us all the time. Local history brings history home; it touches your life, the life of your family, your neighbourhood, your community." This book will undoubtedly be cherished on many local shelves, and welcomed throughout the county and beyond as a model of its kind.

Anthea concludes with comments on the present and future.

"The inhabitants of Whilton no longer expect to be sustained by the fields around them, nor are their livelihoods dependent on the thousand acres which are home to them. The people of Whilton are better educated, have higher expectations and wider experience than their forebears, but they may not have more ingenuity or awareness of their environment."

Whilton's location as part of the famous Watford Gap, she notes, has brought involvement in events including Simon de Montfort's rebellion, Charles I's attempt to feed the Oxford garrison, and the arrival of the M1 motorway. Its geography is yet again presenting new challenges from planned nearby developments which will involve a larger population and greater levels of traffic and other activity.

#### CHRISTMAS PARTIES AT WHILTON LODGE

In the 1930s, when Colonel Shaw owned the Lodge, he and his family hosted a party for Whilton children in the week before Christmas. These parties were remembered for years afterwards by the village children, not only for the food and special treatment, but for the majestic journey in a chauffeur-driven Daimler or Lancia from the village down to the Lodge, and for the welcome by Colonel Shaw with his monocle and waxed moustache, accompanied by his film star-like wife.

Members of the society sat around a table, as the children did eighty years ago, and sampled thinly cut sandwiches, orange jellies and fancy cakes. Leaf tea was poured through a strainer and sugar was served with silver tongs.

As Christmas is coming we also enjoyed the nostalgic, perhaps rose-tinted, memory of Stanley Haynes, one of those Whilton children. This memory must date from about 1937 when Rev. Lawrence Edward Brown became Rector of Whilton.

It was Christmas Eve. In the church new candles were in place, the stove was going well, and the polished copper lamps shone on the holly which decorated the lectern and the pulpit. There had been a brief snowfall - it would be a white Christmas - and as the congregation assembled they shook the snow from their boots on the welcoming doormat, warming their hands over the stove before taking their places for the Christmas Eve carol service.

The boy in the corner pumped the organ, Parson Brown announced the hymn, Betty Pride played the opening chord, and the church rang to the sound of "O come all ye faithful".

... There'd be two Christmas services for Dad to attend – the early communion and the mid-morning Matins. Then it was home to put the dinner in the oven. From the spring broods of poultry we'd keep a cockerel. By Christmas this bird would be in the pink of condition. For some weeks Mum would take a stick into the hen run to fight the blighter off as he'd always attack a woman – not a man, as a rule, but how did he know one from the other? Anyway, he'd now be trussed and stuffed – a feast for kings.
