## WHILTON VILLAGE HALL 200 CLUB 2009

In the last issue of the newsletter, notice was given that there would be a holiday period and the new year of membership commence as from 1<sup>st</sup> April 2009 in place of the usual start date of 1<sup>st</sup> January. A request was made for volunteers to assist with the collection of the membership subscription but to date there has been no response. ## PARISH MATTERS JANUARY 2009

The Parish Council has met twice since the last Newsletter. On 29<sup>th</sup> December 2008 there was a short meeting to consider planning application DA/2008/1218 for a conservatory at 1 Lodge Cottage, Whilton Locks. The Parish Council supported this application which has since received approval from the District Council.

The main Parish Council meeting was held on  $5^{\rm th}$  January, and was also attended by two parishioners.

#### Finance

The meeting approved payments for lighting maintenance, the Clerk's salary, the allotment water charge, printing the Newsletter and the annual subscription to the Open Spaces Society.

The precept for 2009 -10 was set at the same amount as last year, £5750, with expected use of the money as follows:

## The clock

Our County Councillor Steve Osborne had applied for a grant towards the costs of the replacement of the clock winding unit. Councillors were very pleased to hear that a grant of £2297.25 from the NCC Empowering Councillors and Communities Fund has been agreed. This will cover the whole amount. It was agreed to authorize Smith of Derby to proceed with the work.



## Roads, Transport and Footpaths

The Clerk reported that she had put drainage as the top priority for Whilton on the MGWSP list, and that problems with water on the road at both Whilton Locks and Main Street were being followed up. The NCC has posted its intention to adopt Manor Lane and CPM is hoping to instal the new street furniture, once conditions are suitable.

Following the last Parish Walk, the Clerk had been asked to suggest to the County Council that a footpath should be provided between the village and the Locks. The County Council has agreed to look into this.

## Village Green

The Clerk reported that the NCC have not yet made a decision on registration of the Green, but have requested a further legal opinion.

The tree report has not yet been received, but it is likely some work will be required this winter.

There had been very little response to the competition for a village sign on the Green. The Chairman asked if anyone would be willing to take responsibility for following this up and investigating a grant, as the £300 allowed in the precept is unlikely to be enough. As there were no volunteers, it was agreed that the matter will be followed up by the Clerk as and when there is time.

The Clerk reported that she had arranged with the DDC for the collection of Christmas trees from the Green for recycling.

## **Planning**

- Greg Lye agreed to hold the spare copies of the Village Design Statement and to be the contact for those who request a copy. Three further copies will be given to the Clerk.
- West Northants Development Corporation: Mike Lewis reported that all the developers have now put in amended plans, and that these are available on the website. The appeal inquiry has been postponed to 20 January.
- DDC response re planning concerns: a letter from Keith Thursfield of the DDC had been received, confirming his understanding that the DDC had already apologised over the handling of the outline planning application for 7 South View.
- The Clerk was asked to follow up the DDC's response to the query on the field entry to the barn at the end of Brington Lane and the appeal against the application for a barn at Felines.

## WHILTON LOCAL HISTORY SOCIETY

## January 2009

On Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> January Whilton Local History Society met for a medieval winter meal. Over 30 people sat down by candlelight and tucked into a meal based on food either available or produced in Whilton in about 1388.

1388 was a significant year, because John Holt, a lawyer and the lord of the manor of Whilton, a supporter of Richard II, had been declared a traitor by the Merciless Parliament of that year. The king was too weak to prevent him from being exiled to Ireland. Because all the property of any traitor became forfeit to the Crown, the "civil servants" of the day needed to know what John Holt was worth. As a result we have details of the crops and livestock in the lord's demesne that year from the ricks of rye and peas and the malt in the granary to the sow with her 12 piglets worth two shillings.

John Holt 's land is described as three gardens for depasturing, (this probably means enclosed fields for grazing), 200 acres of arable adjoining the manor, "divers pieces of meadow and pasture", a dovecote, a water mill, rents, perquisites of courts and 13 boon — works for mowing hay. There were fish ponds too, but it appears no one was very keen on fish, despite the medieval rules for avoiding meat on Fridays and other occasions. The fish in the ponds were sold for two shillings.

The first course was leek and rabbit soup, providing a flavour of the medieval winter cooking pot, which hung over the fire. Every cottager had his own piece of garden, which was cultivated to produce essentials for the family. Onions were grown throughout the country, as were leeks.

The rabbits may have been poached, or may have just been culled to protect the crops. The lord of Whilton Manor, William de Whilton, had obtained the grant of free warren in 1258, and so officially all the rabbits belonged to his successors. However it seems unlikely that they all stayed inside the warren!

This was followed by a small taste of terrine of pike, one of the fish which may have been stocked in the lord of the manor's fishponds.

The main course consisted of smoked bacon, pigeon breast, pease pudding, parsnips and rye bread with mustard sauce. Records show that peas were grown in quantity in Whilton, and put into ricks. They provided protein and a filling ingredient in the days before potatoes. The pudding was cooked very long and slowly, and took in the flavours of other items in the pot, in this case the bacon. Parsnips were probably grown in the gardens here and perhaps a few pigeons escaped from the lord's dovecote!

Lastly oatcakes were served with a choice of honeyed apples or cheese, all good winter fare in medieval Whilton.



## The onion and mustard sauce

Some people liked the sauce and asked for the recipe to be put in the Newsletter, as follows:

Ingredients: -

One onion

A knob of butter (about 1 ½ oz)

1 rounded tablespoon flour

Heaped teaspoon Colman's mustard powder

About 2/3 pint of milk and stock (or liquid from your cooking pot)

Heaped teaspoon French whole grain mustard from Waitrose

Melt the butter and very gently cook the chopped onion, without letting it turn brown (about 15-20 minutes).

Stir in the flour and mustard powder over a gentle heat.

Gradually add the stock and milk, until you reach the consistency you wish, stirring all the time over a low heat.

Allow to barely simmer for about 5 minutes.

Just before serving, stir in the French mustard.

## Stay safe at home with DASH!

Daventry Area Safety in the Home (DASH) is a partnership project involving a range of community safety organisations. These include Daventry District Council, the NHS, Age Concern, Care and Repair, The Police, The Fire Service, DIAL (Disability Information Advice Line) and Daventry Volunteer Centre. It aims to improve the safety and well-being of older people by reducing risks that commonly affect them in their homes such as fire risks, household accidents, home security, and poor heating systems

Since the project began over 3,600 residents across the District have taken advantage of the initiative and now have homes that are safer, more secure and more energy efficient. The project employs a Coordinator to support village volunteers who help to spread the word about the project and may provide a familiar link when workers arrive to carry out a job in someone's home.

DASH can offer:

- Grants for heating and insulation; (or FREE in some cases)
- . FREE low energy light bulbs for the over 60's;
- FREE home fire safety checks,
- FREE smoke alarms for all residents;
- FREE security checks
- · FREE door chains for the over 60's and
- FREE medication review
- FREE Door Intercoms
- FREE loft insulation for the over 70s.

We now await for further news, hopefully that someone has applied.

In the meantime services continue as normal with the help of visiting retired priests. Christingle and Christmas Morning Family Communion were taken by David MacPherson and the Carol Service by the Archdeacon of Northampton and all were well supported.

## THE JOY OF THE GARDEN VISITORS

A garden of shrubs, trees and other bird loving plants bring such a variety of birds. With the cold weather we have been having it has brought some rarer types. I am enjoying regular visits now from the Red Poll which I had not seen before (bird book came out to identify it). Firstly it was the Mealy Red Poll, then a few days later a similar bird but with a white underside – identified as Artic Red Poll. At the end of last year a Barn Owl was seen perched on the fence and a pair of Bull Finches and Black Caps have been observed.

Last week two male pheasants had a rare old fight in the middle of the lawn which went on for 4-5 minutes (don't know who won, it finished behind the shrubbery).

I think we are lucky in Whilton to have such a variety of birds. I have counted and logged 34 different ones in the last 18 months – 2 years. The birds are also lucky that many parishioners supply them with food and in return, we have the delight of observing them.

## **NEIGHBOURHOOD WATCH**

A number of debit and credit cards have been compromised at the Shell Service Station on the A5 at Paulerspury near Towcester and also A508 at Wootton.

The police are advising people to check their bank statements. Anyone who thinks their card has been compromised over the past weeks should contact their bank in the first instance and they can also contact Northamptonshire Police.

Detective Constable Pete Novakovic of the Force's Economic Crime Unit, said: "These types of incidents, while they are very common up and down the country, are thankfully quite rare in the country.

People should always be cautious. Do not give your card to anyone else and always keep hold of it and put it into the machine yourself. If you think there is a camera covering the machine alert the authorities and cover your PIN number with your hand to make sure no-one can read it over your shoulder."



## WHO CAN USE THE DACT CAR SCHEME?

Anyone who has difficulty accessing public transport, either because they cannot physically get on a bus or because there is no bus service available at the time needed.

## **DOES DACT ONLY DO MEDICAL JOURNEYS?**

We are not a taxi service, and cannot take you to work, shopping or on a pleasure trip. However, if an organisation such as Age Concern were to make a request on your behalf for a journey which was non-medical, but which they considered essential, we would normally try to help.

## **HOW DOES THE SCHEME WORK?**

We call upon the services of volunteer drivers, who use their vehicles to take you to medical appointments. Please book well in advance if possible. Drivers are usually booked up to a week ahead which means that we sometimes cannot help with late booking requests. If required, our volunteers will accompany you, wait with you for UP TO 2 HOURS, then return you to your home afterwards. There is no charge for the driver's services or for any waiting time. All you pay is a contribution towards petrol and motoring costs.

## **HOW MUCH WILL MY JOURNEY COST?**

There is a nominal cost per mile paid directly to the driver. You will be advised of the cost when you book your journey.

If you are not in when the driver calls or you have not notified the Office of a cancellation you will be expected to cover the minimum charge to cover the driver's expenses.

#### **CAN I GET HELP WITH THE COSTS?**

Passengers currently claiming certain benefits may qualify for help with journey costs. e.g. INCOME SUPPORT; PENSION CREDIT GUARANTEE CREDIT: HOLDERS OF HC2 OR HC3 CERTIFICATES; WORKING TAX CREDIT: JOB SEEKERS ALLOWANCE (MUST BE INCOME BASED). Please ask if you are not sure. Proof of claim will be needed so please be prepared to produce your current written award notice or letter. Expenses can normally be reclaimed for hospital appointments only. OUR DRIVERS ACCEPT NATIONAL TRANSPORT TRAVEL TOKENS.

### WHERE DOES THE SERVICE OPERATE?

We cover the whole of Daventry District, with the exception of Byfield and Woodford Halse who operate their own scheme. (Rural Wheels, Tel: 01327 260992)

#### **HOW DO I BOOK A JOURNEY?**

Please telephone 01327 701665, 701666 or 701667 when you receive your appointment. The earlier you book, the greater chance of confirmed transport. Tell us if you have any special needs or if you need to take a wheelchair or walking frame. A friend or partner may accompany you at no extra cost.


