The hall floor needs replacing. Not only are the wood blocks showing signs of wear but also there is substantial deterioration to the sub-floor causing extensive damp problems throughout the hall. If all this goes to plan we shall be aiming to have the work done during the summer holidays when the hall is least used. At the same time we propose to replace the kitchens base units and worktops. CRIME REPORT

There has been no reported crime in Whilton between January and May 1997.

This is good news and reflects our awareness of personal security and community vigilance.

As summer approaches it is vitally important to continue this fight against crime. Remember to keep downstairs windows closed, doors locked and front gates shut at all times. Garages, sheds and parked vehicles are also easy targets for the opportunist thief especially if they are left unlocked.

Always report anything or anybody suspicious to Daventry police who will investigate further. Co-operation between the police and local co-ordinators is good and this strong link is beneficial for the village.

Northamptonshire Police have praised Neighbourhood Watch Schemes throughout the County for their help in fighting local crime.

Crime rates in the Western area have fallen for the third successive year and Supt. Vickers has attributed this to the hard work of his officers and staff, combined with the support and cooperation of the local communities.

OPERATION DEFENDER

This is the code name for an autocrime initiative which ran for the month of April in the Western Area. The results of this Operation have not yet been published.

Please ensure that your vehicle is always locked and that no personal property is left inside.

WHILTON LITTER PICK 1997

It was a fine evening on Wednesday 23rd April when the *litter pick* team of volunteers met on the village green at 6.00 pm. It was a good turn out, there being representatives of the W.I., Whilton Parish Council and school children. The group was made up of five adults and five children.

The *litter pick* extended to a point just beyond the village at the top to the Nobottle Road incorporating boundary roads of the triangle and at the bottom of the village to the pumping station at the entrance to Roughmoor Farm drive.

Surprisingly very little litter was found compared to 1996 when the W.I. did the first Spring Clean of the village - obviously they made a very thorough job. Another factor is that Whilton has a very caring community and villagers are known to pick up litter when out walking.

The group effort resulted in collecting three black plastic bags of litter, one piece of angle iron, one wheel trim, an interior spring to a mattress and one gas cylinder. There was also a pair of walking boots

deep into the hedge but luckily for us no body attached.

On our return Trudy Haynes had opened up the Village Hall where she provided refreshments which were gratefully received and enjoyed.

Thank you all for the time and effort made to improve our environment.

We have entered the Village of the Year Competition for 1997 which takes place form 1st June to the end of September. During that period judges make unannounced visits to the village and as "absence of litter" accounts for 25% of the points awarded, constant attention to this aspect will be required. We will be having further litter sweeps through the village but your assistance in picking up any litter when out walking would be appreciated.

Several members volunteered to help with the "Litter Pick" on 23rd April - a very necessary job if we are to keep our village looking neat and tidy.

Our Speaker for the evening was Mrs Celia Lowe who spoke on "The History of Ladies Underwear". Celia until recently designed and made exquisite ladies underwear, mainly from pure silk and handmade lace.

We were taken through the ever-changing fashions of the various garments incorporating bustles, panniers, corsets and bras to mention just a few.

Women would go to extremes to fit into garments - tiny 18 inch waists, squeezed,

laced or sewn into underwear only to be released when the garments rotted away in some instances.

Whalebone hoops, pillows stuffed with sheep fleece and even wooden frames were among some of the items strapped around one's waist to get the right effect for the layers of petticoats and finally the dress itself to drape over. Some dresses could measure as much as 48 yards round the hem. With so much padding and materials swathed around, ladies were unable to sit and were taught how to stand and walk in such a way that they were able to keep their balance.

Some fashions remained unchanged for 90 years. I wonder if the "Doc Marten" boots and leggings of today's fashion will still be around in 90 years!!

An excellent talk with members participating by trying on some of the garments that Mrs Lowe had brought along.

Resolutions

1. Lindane

This meeting urges H.M. Government to withdraw the use of lindane, due to a possible link between breast cancer and the use of organochlorine pesticides, in line with 28 other countries world wide.

This resolution was thoroughly discussed, covering the danger of a build up in cattle meat and the effects of spraying various crops such as sugar beet. It was unanimously agreed to support the resolution.

2. <u>Agenda 21</u> - The document on the environment drawn up by heads of government after the Rio Summit in 1992.

Resolution

This meeting urges all W.I. members to support Agenda 21 and to work on furthering its social, economic and environmental aims.

It was felt that, despite action already being taken by local authorities, the W.I. could do more and, if passed, the resolution would allow the W.I. to take an active lead in educating and co-ordinating work at both local and national level.

Passed unanimously.

Resolutions relating to changing the method of voting at the Triennial Meetings and to changing the title of the Voluntary County Organisers were rejected.

At the close of the meeting members were able to enjoy sampling the very delicious savouries, salads and cakes which they had all contributed and which made a happy ending to a serious meeting.

Growing up in Whilton in the 1960's

To many people the 1960's are not that long ago. It is easy to forget, however, that over a quarter of a century has passed, a new generation has grown up and the village has seen a considerable amount of change in that time. Now, as an occasional visitor to Whilton, I see the full impact of those changes, especially if I think back 35 years.

We first moved to Whilton in 1963, living for a short time at 4 South View, before moving to 9 The Gardens. The village was very different then. Langton Rise was an orchard belonging to the Miss Gammages. There were no houses at the bottom of the village opposite or next to the Old Farmhouse (which belonged to the Emery's). Neither were there any new houses by the triangle.

The bank separating the houses in South View from the road was originally overgrown with trees and shrubs, and provided a fantastic hiding place when playing 'Kick the can'. In fact we spent quite a lot of time playing in the road. Cars were far fewer and were generally not parked on the road as they are now. We would play football and other ball games, and ride our home-made karts down the hill from Emery's farm, all in relative safety.

When we first moved to the village there were two shops. Mrs Welch ran a small shop from her house (now called The Old Shop) and there was a Post Office run by Mrs Gardner next to he Green. If you did not own a car then the the village was probably less isolated than it would be today. The mobile butcher from Daventry Co-op visited and, in addition every Tuesday the hardware van would call from Bailey's in Long Buckby. Also on Tuesdays and Fridays a fruit and vegetable van would visit the village. On Wednesdays and Saturdays the United Counties bus would come and take you to the old Derngate Bus Station in Northampton. Occasionally a mobile Fish and Chip van would visit, with a portion of chips costing 6d (21/2 pence in modern money!). I remember one memorable evening when we were denied our weekly portion; the van caught fire!

As now, children of primary school age went to Brington CP School. The school was run by Mr & Mrs Bickerton, who did a great deal to modernise the approach to school life. We would go swimming once a week to Northampton in Mr Bickerton's 'Dormobile', and play football and hockey against other local schools. A favourite fixture for the boys was against Litchborough, whom we beat 10-0 on more than one occasion!

Village life was never boring, despite the absence of computers and videos! There were a number of children of similar age and we seemed to spend most of our time in each others' company. A favourite venue was the home of Clive Haynes (The Old Plough), because of the large amount of space in the 'big room' as we called it, at the back of the house. We would also spend a great deal of time down at Whilton Locks at the home of the Steele family. One highlight of my childhood was to witness the construction of the Whilton Marina.

The Church played an important part in the life of the village. Many of my contemporaries joined the choir, and learned to play musical instruments with Betty Pride. I personally have much for which to be grateful to Betty. Her encouragement of my piano playing has subsequently led to many good things, including the opportunity to play the organ in Canterbury Cathedral. The rector during the 1960's was Bishop Hugh Otter-Barry, who had been Bishop of Mauritius. I have a tape recording of the 1969 Nine Lessons and Carols service which was held in the church. It contains the voices of many of the village characters of the time, both singing and reading the lessons. One of the most striking was Freda Adams, who had a very distinctive singing voice! Freda was also the deputy organist, who sometimes found the music difficult. I recall one service where, following an uncertain play through the hymn tune by Freda, the Bishop, choir and congregation began to sing what they thought was the hymn, whilst Freda played another!

Although some of us were members of the choir, we were not saints! On several occasions a small group (I could name them!) could be found in the Gammage's orchard 'scrumping' the plums. Why is it that I have never tasted plums quite so good as those?!

Another event involving fruit was the annual auction of produce on the Monday evening following the Harvest Festival. We younger ones looked forward to this as an occasion when we could take part in the auction, and for a few old pence buy some of the produce. I especially remember one year when Marcus Swinford and I were successful in bidding for some lovely large apples, only to discover on tasting them that they were cooking apples!

We moved away from the village to live in Daventry in 1970, although my mother came back to Whilton in 1982. I regularly visit her and whilst I am no longer close to the village, it seems to have kept much of its character despite the inevitable march of time.

WHILTON PARISH COUNCIL REPORT

This has been a very busy period for the Council, involving the Annual Parish Meeting as well as the bi-monthly Committee. As my introduction to Parish affairs I have been amazed at the number of issues that have to be decided or commented upon on everyone's behalf. These range from setting and spending the village precept, through keeping enough lights in the village to matters of safety over speeding and uncut grass verges. All there is space for today is a flavour of the two meetings to which all residents are invited.

THE PARISH MEETING

Mike Lewis, the chairman, was able to report on a busy year in which there had been less planning activity but considerable interaction with the electricity company, the purchase of a new mower for the churchyard, and a very successful outcome to the Village of the Year competition. Financially the council was still solvent but decreased reserves had led to requiring a larger precept, which had remained the same for a number of years.

Harold Haynes reported that the Parochial Charitees were quite healthy with an income of about £150 a year but this had to be used to meet individual need. There had been no grant made in the past year but applications can be considered at any time by the Trustees.

Mrs Bunce, as vice chair of Brington School Governors, presented a report of another very successful school year although finances remain on a knife edge. The help of the Parents Teachers Association remains vital in its many forms. However, the rich variety of experiences available to pupils continues through the efforts of staff.

Mr Derek Brown spoke of the good use made of the village hall, which still has capacity for more use. There are extensive plans for renovation in the coming year, possible through the continuing support of the 200 Club.

Reports as well as apologies for absence were received from our District and County councillors, Mr and Mrs Amos, who assured us of their continued interest and availability for any concerns. The Millennium Map Committee reported their plans and invited everyone to get involved as the task grew.

Issues:

Two concerned residents had written in to ask if anything could be done about speeding motorists in the village and backroad. One had seen several bad crashes and the other a near serious accident involving children on the litterpick. Although these are not new issues the meeting decided to refer them to Mr and Mrs Amos and to raise them with Daventry District Planners. The Chairman alerted us to the development of the conservation area around the Locks this year and the continued need neighbourhood watch, although Bilsborough had reported a good year. The clerk was asked to raise late postal deliveries with the Post Office.

THE PARISH COUNCIL MEETING

Apart from the usual financial matters it was decided (1) to ask Derek Coates to deal with trimming the village green tree and (2) to make a donation to the completion of the Victoria History in which Whilton would appear. There were to be new signs about preventing dog fouling. A new survey of village facilities was to be completed in which to report the loss of daily papers but the holding of a mother and toddler group.

The Council were finally concerned to bring to residents' attention the local Social Services need of people to be independent chairs of Complaints Review Panels, the receipt of the Police authorities Policing Plan, the Health Authorities Coronary Heart Disease Strategy and the District Council's Hazardous Waste Disposal leaflet. These can me seen by contacting me, or for the latter two referring to the two village notice boards.

All this activity serves to show a busy council and why a letter of deep appreciation is to be sent to Anne Heeley for her many years as Clerk to the Parish.
