FOUL FOOTPATHS IN WHILTON

It has been brought to our attention that there is a real concern in the village about the amount of dog poo on our local footpaths, especially on the footpath towards Buckby from Buckby Lane, and in Wadd Close.

By far the majority of Whilton dog owners are responsible, and pick up the mess, especially when it is on a right of way. However, it only takes




one person who does not do this, to create a hazard for others, particularly children, who may fall on or touch the poo. The annoyance of dog mess on adults' shoes is also most unpleasant.

Dog faeces should be picked up using a poop scoop bag and disposed of in a dog or litter bin. If there is no dog bin available it can be taken home and put into a dustbin. Any dog faeces collected at home should be sealed in a strong plastic bag and put in your household waste or it can be buried in a corner in your garden.

Under the Clean Neighbourhoods and Environment Act 2005, any person who permits a dog that is in their charge to foul any area to which the public has access is committing an offence.

Letter from the Rectory

In the Christian religion the season of Lent is an annual time of fasting and penitence in preparation for Easter, beginning on Ash Wednesday and lasting 40 weekdays to Easter. NORTHAMPTONSHIRE SEED CAKE

4 cups flour

2 tablespoons caraway

8 eggs

2 cups sugar

seeds 2 cups butter

1 grated nutmeg

- o Beat the butter to a cream.
- Add the sugar.
- Beat the egg whites and add.
- Beat the egg yolks and add.
- Beat in the flour, nutmeg and seeds.
- Turn into greased cake tin and bake in a hot oven 220 °c/425 °f/gas mark7 for 1 ½ hours or until firm to touch.

FAMILY NEWS

Tony Forward

moving to Dubai.

Tony Forward, a former seafarer who became a well-known figure on local canals, died in hospital in Daventry on January 3, aged 66.

For the last 30 years Tony's home was a boat on which he toured Britain's canal network, always returning to Whilton Locks, where he had many friends.

He came from an East London family



of haulage contractors, established since horse-and-cart days. Choosing as a boy to go to sea, he became a highly trained Merchant Navy radio operator or "sparks," and was familiar with most major ocean passages and ports. He spent several years ashore, providing radio communications for Nauru, a tiny remote South Pacific island -- then a League of Nations mandate and now the world's smallest republic.

When Morse code operators became redundant, Tony left the sea to live on a canal boat on the Grand Union Canal. A skilled woodworker, he fitted out the "Mooloolaba" himself, and set up a one-man business, Extra Hand, working for other boat owners and canalside residents. His main moorings were at Whilton Locks and the nearby marina.

A founder-member of the Whilton and Buckby Locks Association, he was a friend of the flight's legendary lock-keeper, Henry Grantham, and when Henry died he built a remarkable decorated bench using wood salvaged from the commercial narrowboat "Forget-me-Not" operated by the Grantham family. The memorial bench, a feature alongside the bottom lock since the 1980s, is familiar to thousands of narrow-boat users and towpath walkers.

Lucy Steele of The Locks

We send condolences to the family of **Lucy Steele**, who died at her home, Orchard House in Spotted Cow Lane, on 11th February, aged 79.

Lucy was born at 17 Hillmorton Road in Rugby, although her parents lived in Whilton, as did Lucy. She was baptised Lucy Beatrice in St Andrew's Church in 1933, and her funeral service was held there too on 22nd February 2013.

Lucy grew up in Whilton, as a member of a very large family. Her parents, Ted and Beatrice Poole, ran the Plough pub, and she went to Whilton School, (now the Village Hall) until she was 14. She especially enjoyed writing and singing, and was also a member of the church choir. She survived scarlet fever during the epidemic at Whilton School in 1941, although she had to be transferred to the isolation hospital at Staverton.

On leaving school she worked first for the Cockerill family at Long Buckby, and then for Duponts in Northampton, where she quickly learnt typing and telephone skills to live up to the answers she had given in her interview! In March 1956 she married David Steele, living first at the Dial House near Brockhall and eventually came to 7 South View in Whilton. Lucy was busy with her children, but also carried out the office duties for David's building and civil engineering business. About 1966 the family was able to move into their new house in Whilton Locks, where Lucy remained for the rest of her life.



She is remembered by her six children and nine grandchildren for her love of nature and all living things, particularly of birdsong, for her hospitality and for her support of Manchester United!

It is with great sadness that we record the death of Katherine Ann Denbigh (Kate), aged 28, daughter of Gill and Stephen Denbigh and partner of Joe.

The funeral will take place at St Andrew's Church at 1 p.m. on Monday 4th March.

Shopping with a smile and a song at the Locks

Whilton Marina Chandlery, situated at the bottom lock at Whilton Locks, has now been under new management for a year. And its partnership of four close friends - Karen English, Bim Simcoe and Eunice and Tom Trusler - is delighting customers.

There's always a smile - and sometimes even a song - for those who venture across the lock or through the marina's main entrance.

The shop has kept open during all the recent bad weather, providing essential groceries including bread, milk and free-range eggs, to locals. As Bim explained: 'If I can't get here in my four-wheel drive, then I'll come by tractor!'

An experienced marine engineer, Bim is also an expert beekeeper and he and Karen supply the shop with honey from bees on their smallholding in Barby. Karen is well known to boaters from far and wide from the years when she was official lock-keeper for the flight - only the second woman to hold that position.

The other members of the Chandlery quartet, Tom and Eunice, now commute from their smallholding in Lincolnshire. They both used to work at the marina, where they lived on a narrowboat. 'It's good to be back here,' says Tom.

Tom is the one who occasionally treats customers to some of his favourite folksongs, sometimes accompanying himself on the traditional boatman's instrument, the melodeon.

'After a very long slog and a few hold-ups – no fault of our own - we've finally managed to get an alcohol licence from Daventry District Council. With the New Inn still closed at the top lock, we feel we're now providing boaters and locals with a much-needed facility,' he said.

Tom's wife Eunice has a very useful hobby, knitting the yarn she has had spun from the Alpacas she keeps on their smallholding. She can knit any garment to order - hats, scarves and so on - and also has a good supply of yarn for sale.

Whiltonians are recommended to take a look around the parish's rather special shop, which is open every day (in winter till 4.30 p.m. with Sundays till 4.00 p.m. - and in summer till 6.00 p.m. with Sundays till 4.30 p.m.) and operates on the admirable motto: 'If we haven't got it, then we'll get it for you...'

So dad had to take me to the V.E.T.S, Shell gave me a cuddle to keep me calm.



14 May Ascension Day. Children attended Divine Service at 10 a.m. and dismissed as School was closed for the day.

COFFEE AFTERNOON






