



The Origin of Sayings and Expressions

A KANGAROO COURT is an irregular or illegal tribunal that is conducted with disregard for due legal process and originated in America. Kangaroo Courts have clear links with the Gold Rush of 1849 during which time informal courts were set up to deal with illegal prospectors known as claim jumpers, many of whom were Australian. This phrase became widely used in Britain in relation to the dubious tribunals set up by trade unions to deal with members who were regarded as strike breakers.

BARKING UP THE WRONG TREE is the phrase used when we are pursuing the wrong course of action. In the 1800s raccoon hunting in America had to be done

at night as these animals are nocturnal and hunting dogs were used to pick up their scent. The dogs would bark at the trees where they thought the raccoon was hiding but they made frequent mistakes and the phrase originates from this.

If you LET THE CAT OUT OF THE BAG you reveal a secret carelessly or by mistake. This saying originates from medieval markets when a buyer would be shown a piglet and while the haggling over the price was taking place, the piglet would be substituted for a cat and bagged

up ready to be taken home. The deception would only be discovered when the buyer reached home and the cat was found.

To make a PIG'S EAR out of something is to attempt a task and get it so wrong the effort is useless. This phrase dates from the Middle Ages when it was said that the only part of a pig that was unusable was the ear. Any craftsman or apprentice who

made something that was ineffective or unusable was considered to have produced a 'pig's ear'.

WHILTON VILLAGE HALL

We would remind hirers that if they do use the village hall drying-up cloths that they take these away launder and return to the key-holder as soon as possible. It has been reported that cloths have been left un-washed and we would point out that we do not have an appointed caretaker to deal with matters of this nature. The hall is serviced by an independent firm of commercial cleaners monthly and this not part of the contract.

Under the Health and Safety Policy the hall is suitable for seating approximately 45 persons at tables: otherwise the capacity is between 65 and 70 persons non-seated. It is important to ensure that in the event of an evacuation, the fire exits are readily accessible

PARISH NOTES

The last Parish Council Meeting was held on Wednesday 8th September at 7.30pm when five councillors and five parishioners were present. Mike Lewis sent his apologies as he was on holiday and Ken Bowers was elected chair for the meeting.

After further enquiries it was clarified that District Councillor Wendy Amos and County Councillor Steve Osborne are very seldom available on a Wednesday evening because of other meetings.

The question was raised as to whether sheds are allowed on the allotments. This is not allowed as it is stated in the conditions of tenure between Whilton Parish Council and Daventry District Council that no structures are allowed. It was suggested that a joint, open, meeting is held between the Parish Council and the allotment holders to discuss various issues. Progress that has occurred since the last meeting —

- The adoption of the village green is proceeding.
- The Clerk has been in further contact with Daventry District Council about the ownership of Rose Cottage and they are following this up.
- The overhanging shrubbery between Wadd Lane and Holly House has been cut back.
- The list of village assets has been updated.
- Yet another letter has been sent to Highways re the drainage in Brington Lane.

The next meeting will be on Wednesday 10th November 2010 at 7.30pm in the Village Hall.
