

RFID Identification and Uses.

After the election of the Progress and Reform Party there would be a two year consultation period to propose uses and protections and limitations for the implementation of the ID system.

The implantation of a RFID chip in all citizens and residents of the United Kingdom or member states of the Federal Union of Nations carrying an ID number and date of birth.

There are many ways in which this can benefit both individuals and society.

Once created the RFID chips would enable the following.

For citizens to tie bank accounts and cash payment cards to, facilitating payments with the use of biometrics and pin numbers included for security purposes.

To enable faster access to flights at airports or to tie in season tickets for railway passengers.

To enable faster logins for computer access of services and to enable individuals to be held accountable for online activity such as trolling, cyber bullying and other similar offences.

Helping stores and businesses and clubs with the sale of age restricted products (i.e. knives, tobacco, alcohol etc) and the enforcement of age related or membership related entrance to premises (i.e. age restricted films in cinemas).

Restricting or recording access to residential and business premises. (crime prevention or health and safety provision)

In cases of disaster or emergency to provide police, fire, ambulance or medical staff rapid access to identity and medical records to enable better provision of emergency services.

Also to enable the identification of bodies retrieved after disasters, accidents or crimes whether in this country or abroad.

That such use would require ratification by the electorate and any further amendments could only be utilised after an itemised referendum by the electorate to determine the services allowed and the uses companies could put them to and the uses to which the state could utilise the technology.
