Excellence in Teaching Awardee turns student scientists' potential into pathways

Dr. Kimberly Petersen is a familiar face at UNC Greensboro, and it's not just because she teaches key prerequisite courses in the Department of Chemistry and Biochemistry. Given her dedication to undergraduate research, it is no surprise that she received this year's UNC Board of Governor's Excellence in Teaching Award.

Petersen follows a philosophy that considers different learning styles as she engages with programs at UNCG or elsewhere. "One approach to teaching will not work for everyone," she says. "Prioritizing different teaching approaches such as straight-ahead lecturing, active learning, and one-on-one instruction has been an effective strategy to give students multiple opportunities to show their knowledge."

The District Faces Large Budget Deficits This Year and Next Year

Board President Mike Krupke and District Administrators gave thanks for all the help from staff and their families making the move to temporary quarters during construction smooth and quick. The district was able to save money by not having to have Nexus make the moves.

Building and Grounds Director Chad Dix reported on progress being made with the construction. He advised the board that he is having Nexus save everything of any value, especially anything installed in the last five years, to try to recoup the

Finance Manager Robin Bye reported the current year budget deficit is presently over \$600,000. She believes that as final budget numbers continue to come in, the district will get closer to the approximately \$364,000 projected budget deficit predicted last year. The deficit for 2025-2026 is conservatively projected to be about \$641,000. After much discussion, it was determined with staff changes and the finalization of the state budget, that number will likely end up closer to the approximately \$411,000 deficit projected earlier. The preliminary budget was approved.

Superintendent Novy reported the Wellness Clinic has been a success and SSM Health Representatives will attend July's meeting to discuss the program.



Sugar River Farmers Have New Cover Crop Incentive Program

Farmers of the Sugar River and Green County Land and Water Conservation Department received a grant for \$100,000 from the Sand County Foundation to be able to offer farmers money for planting cover crops this summer and fall. The grant greatly increases the funds available in the producer-led watershed and county to help farmers with the financial costs of adding a cover crop to their farming system.

Cover crops are plants that are usually grown after a commodity crop like wheat, corn and soybeans. Cover crops provide many benefits to the soil and environment such as:

•Improve soil structure allowing water and air to exchange in the profile.

 Prevent wind and water erosion by having a protective cover on the soil.

•Increase soil organic matter by

carbon in the soil.

•Provide a source of livestock feed- either grazed by the animals themselves or mechanically harvested forage.

•Build and keep nitrogen bound in the soil for the next year's crop.

•Break up compaction with roots that drill into the soil to create pathways for water, air, and biology to infiltrate.


•Create lasting residue on the soil surface that inhibits weed seeds to grow along with food for soil biol-

A tiered payment schedule, ranging from \$30-50 per acre, is set to encourage cover crops to be planted earlier in the season. Farm-

ers will need to apply for the incentive and be approved before planting the cover crop for the incentive payment. Land needs to be in the Middle and Lower Sugar River Watershed. Farmers with land that has received funding from NRCS (Natural Resources Conservation Service) in the past for cover crops are ineligible for these funds. 
Multicultural Day at BMS





Green County Leaders is an educational program where individuals practice leadership skills, deepen their understanding of community issues, and prepare for leadership roles, thereby creating a network of active and visionary individuals who leverage their experience and expertise to benefit their community and local community-based organizations. Green County Leaders participants attend a full-day program once a month, held in various locations, from September through May. This year participants met over 100 community leaders and toured 19 sites in the seven communities of New Glarus, Belleville, Brooklyn, Albany, Brodhead, Monroe, and Browntown.

Participants also take part in a team project and other activities to hone leadership skills and community impact. This year's class projects were instrumental in laying groundwork for future efforts and included:

•Green County Humane Society Pathway Happy Paws Walkway focuses on bridging the Green County Humane Society and Pleasant View Nursing Home with a quarter-mile pathway to increase the relationships and access between Pleasant View residents and animals at the Humane Society, who offer companionship and comfort.

•Green County Smiles is an extension of a 2023-2024 Green County Leaders project, with this year's efforts aimed to improve oral health throughout Green County by visiting first graders at Juda Elementary School to teach students proper tooth brushing techniques in partnership with Fowler Dental.

•Greener Monroe utilizes focused fundraising and awareness campaigns in partnership with the City of Monroe Parks to bring approximately 27 new durable recycling bins to Monroe's parks in the summer of 2025, helping to reduce litter, promote proper recycling, and foster environmental stewardship.

•Impact Green County was created to address the gap between local organizations needing volunteer support and community members eager to get involved by means of a new online platform to serve as a hub for Green County volunteer engagement, making creating and signing up for volunteer opportunities simple and accessible.

•New Glarus Dog Park project was launched in response to a community interest in the creation of a safe, accessible, and well-designed space for dogs and their owners. Research on the creation of comparable dog parks in southern Wisconsin and meetings with community stakeholders were completed, and recommendations were provided

to the Village of New Glarus to ensure a smooth transition of project responsibility to a local nonprofit.

•Temporary Animal Care Network was created to address the issue of individuals experiencing unexpected crises such as homelessness, illness, deployment, or abuse, and the resulting need for temporary animal care in such situations. Surveyed Green County residents expressed a willingness to act as volunteer animal care providers as a part of this assistance network.

The Green County Leaders program is made possible through generous support from and partnerships with a variety of local entities. They would like to thank the donors and sponsors for their assistance: Dairy Queen, Jack Link's, Kuhn North America, Precision Drive and Control, The Bank of New Glarus, and Colony Brands. Additionally, Green County Leaders works with and visits many communities, who they would like to thank for hosting our program: Grace Church - New Glarus, Tofflers Pub and Grill, Village Park-New Glarus, Monroe Arts Center, Belleville Public Library, Albany Lions Club, Brooklyn Community Building, Green County Justice Center, Monroe Clinic Hospital, Bullet's Restaurant, Green County Courthouse, Colony Brands, Badger State Ethanol, Monroe Truck Equipment, Kuhn North America, Williams Bedrock Bovines, and Hawk's Mill Winery. The program would not be possible without their contributions and investments in the future of Green County.

Overall, Green County Leaders has completed 23 program years, resulting in an alumni network of 494 people. There have been 95 community projects, and very conservatively \$661,762 skilled volunteer hours contributed to Green County communities. This does not include the amount of fundraising conducted to fund these projects.
