Brodhead's first opera house


Because early settlers of Brodhead were mostly New Englanders, (many from prominent families), the community immediately became a center of cultural activity. Fred Gombar constructed Brodhead's first opera house in 1868 located on the Southside of Exchange Square and was initially known as Gombar Hall. For many years it was Green County's largest and finest opera house. The main hall was 46x58 feet and had a seating capacity of 400 to 500. Fred gave this building to his sons-inlaw, Charles and Sebastian Laube. C.&S. Laube, Propr's, successfully operated it for years and in the days of vaudeville had many professional entertainers. In the 1900s, the Pierce family owned and operated the building for many years as the hardware store on the ground floor. In recent years the building has housed a variety of restaurants. Currently, this beautiful historical building is empty and for sale.







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

Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library

Upcoming March Programs Submitted by Barbara Flores, President, Friends of the Durand Library

While cold weather is still with us, and before the 2025 gardening season begins, please join us in attending one or all of these great programs in March. The first program continues the story of how our country grew as multiple individual states were carved out of the Louisiana Purchase. Many eye opening factors, some good and some bad, were involved. The second tells of the meteoric rise of China and how its economic strength impacts us all. The third informs about nonnative, invasive plants, which are proliferating along roads and open areas. The talk will explain how to identify and control them, and the damage these invaders do to the environment.

Saturday, March 8 at 10 a.m.: "How the States Got Their Shapes—Part 3" This talk focuses on the Louisiana Purchase. Avid historian Brad Keyes brings history to life with little known facts and excellent maps detailing how each state was established. Last month we learned how the Midwest was shaped after the Revolutionary War was over. This month we will examine the single purchase of land, which more than doubled the size of our young country. In 1803 President Thomas Jefferson sent a delegation to France to negotiate the purchase of a small territory around New Orleans. When the delegation came back, they announced they were successful in buying New Orleans, as well as all of the territory north and west, which France once held. This ended up shaping 14 new states and creating a nightmare between those who wanted slave states and those who wanted free states. Join us March 8 as we explore how all this got sorted out as the United States grew, state by state.

Tuesday, March 18 at 7 p.m.: "Understanding China: Complicated but Essential." This program is presented by Dr. Norman Moline, Professor Emeritus of Augustana College, who has been a long time student of China and has traveled there 40 times from 1977 to 2024.

Dr. Moline notes, "China is, without question, the other major global power, and its economic and international power is likely to increase as the 21st century advances. China significantly impacts all Americans, including the people of Illinois.

Some of those impacts are well-known and covered both in news stories and in people's day-to-day lives. China produces products we need; it causes some of our manufacturing industries to close; its demands for food create markets for Illinois and Iowa soybeans and corn; it seeks to stretch its global interests, causing national security concerns for the U.S.; it and the U.S. are the two major contributors to global warming, but at the same time diligently seek innovative ways to obtain energy to reduce such warming; its policies against minorities, freedom of speech and religion, and open access to information on the internet counter American human rights values; its verbal threats about Taiwan exacerbate global tensions; it was the origin point for COVID-19 and works diligently to understand the disease; it is a cooperator with the U.S. on some key global issues and in research scholarship, but this is often not well known.

"One thing is certain," he emphasizes, "China will be an important factor in the lives of people and businesses in Illinois and world affairs for decades to come."

This event is co-presented by the Illinois Humanities Road Scholars Speakers Bureau. Road Scholar speakers travel throughout Illinois sharing free, dynamic presentations about literature, philosophy, theater, local history, film, music, politics, and more, at no cost to host organizations. The program enables local nonprofit organizations to present free-admission cultural programs to their communities.

Saturday, March 29 at 10 a.m.: "Identifying and Combating Invasive Nonnative Plants." This talk will be presented by Jay Solomon, Extension Educator for Natural Resources, Environment and Energy with the University of Illinois Extension Service. Don't miss this important program for all who love to garden and want to help our local environment. Jay will tell us how to "know the enemy:" the first step is learning to recognize the plants we want to keep from spreading and then learning best practices for controlling them. Nonnative plants crowd out the native vegetation, which is both beautiful and beneficial to wildlife. Invasive blight areas: think wild parsnip and teasel, garlic mustard and nonnative honeysuckle. Once entrenched these plants are extremely difficult to control, much less to eradicate. This is a real fight—come arm you with the right information!


Albrecht Elementary School 4K Enrollment



Team 2x4 makes it four in a row!

Waukesha North High School was the site of this years FIRST LEGO League Wisconsin State Championship. Team 2x4 arrived for the day well prepared, but down a team member due to Influenza A. They were excited to have proven themselves to be one of the top 28 teams (out of 400) in Wisconsin, but they had a bigger goal. "At the beginning of the season we set a goal to earn another trip to an international tournament, our fourth in a row, which no team has done before," shares Evan Schneider of Clinton. The competition in Wisconsin is strong, so everything from judging to the way the robot performs has to go well in order to finish at the top

All FIRST LEGO League teams are judged in a 30 minute judging session, which includes prepared presentations on the Innovation Project and the Robot Design. The team then answers a lot of questions from the judges. While the technical skills are important, FLL is also about developing confidence in young people. Halee Williams, Beloit, says, "I have overcome my fear of talking in front of judges."

Team 2x4 took on the problem of retrieving ghost nets from the ocean for their Innovation Project. They did a lot of research and met with many experts throughout the year. "Meeting with Katie McWilliams of GhostNetUSA.org was a great moment," shares Mason Williams of Beloit. The team is currently improving their Ghost Grappler prototype with the help of the GhostNet divers, with the hope that it could be useful to divers in the future. Contacting experts and preparing the presentation for judging takes a lot of work. Isaac Bently of Loves Park commented "I'm really proud of my emails, my work on the scripts, and the animation I did to show judges how the Ghost Grappler works."

In Robot Design judging the team explained all the physics and forces they used to design an effective robot that could autonomously solve 12 LEGO missions in two minutes and 30 seconds. Team 2x4 developed a quick change attachment system that allows them to spend less than two seconds changing attachment, allowing their robot more time to solve missions on the board. Their coach, Kent Walton, challenged the team to step up their programming by learning a new language between sectionals and state. Tim Walton says, "I've learned

how to code in Python which is good for me to learn, now because it will open up more job opportunities in the real world." The judges were impressed that the entire team started learning a new coding language mid-season.

The robot had an up and down day on the competition mat. The best score they had was 315, just short of their season high 320, placing 11th in that portion of the competition. The team also competed in a fun alliance style match, pairing with the Webster Wolverines. As the alliance matches ended everyone took their places for the awards cer-

The team was thrilled during the awards ceremony when their coach, Heather Schneider, was awarded one of two Coach of the Year trophies. Team 2x4 and her family surprised her with LEGO flowers to celebrate her seven years of coaching. The team was even more excited a few minutes later when they won first place Core Values Award. This award is given to a team that does everything in the program to a high level, and does so well expressing the FIRST Core Values such as teamwork, innovation, impact, and fun.

When advancement rankings were announced Team 2x4 was hopeful they would be on the list and they were not disappointed! They finished tied for fourth. They are now going to be Wisconsin's first team to ever attend the Florida Sunshine Invitational in Daytona Beach, Florida, in late June. This tournament will feature 96 teams from 24 different countries and 44 states. Bethany Walton, of Durand, Illinois, says, "I'm excited to go to Florida to meet new friends from around the world."

Team 2x4 has commenced fundraising for their trip to FSI in Florida. The team is looking to raise \$9,000 to cover expenses including registration, event costs, transportation, and lodging during the five day tournament. 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

Are you looking for parents of an ancestor? Deed records are crucial in genealogy research and often overlooked. They are particularly helpful when researching the 1700s and early 1800s, basically determining ancestors pre-1850 when censuses began indicating family relationships by naming all individuals in a household. Deeds are written documents filed with the court transferring ownership of property from one person to another but deed books sometimes include other types of legal records such as a power of attorney, marriage bonds, guardianship, part of a probate and mortgages. Deeds help you discover family relationships, family locations and previous residences and break through brick walls.

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Library Learnings

Want to encourage and motivate reading? Explore how goals, rewards, and recognition can enhance reading motivation. The Albertson Memorial Library offers free access to Beanstack, a platform designed to help individuals understand and cultivate their reading habits. Best of all, it's easy to use! Simply download and launch Beanstack on your device. Set up either an individual or family account. Enroll in any available reading challenges* you'd like to participate in. And start logging the books and times you've read to progress toward your goal.

To open Beanstack on a laptop or desktop computer, go to the Albertson Memorial Library website at: https://www.albertsonlibrary.org/. (Don't have a computer or Wi-Fi? No problem, use the library's!) Click on "Beanstack," which you can find on our homepage under the section titled "Library Links." On Apple iPhones and iPads download "Beanstack Tracker" from the App Store. On phones and tablets with Google Play download "Beanstack Tracker" from Google Play.

Once you've downloaded and opened the app select 'Register an Individual or Family' under the 'Create an Account' section. Respond to a few simple questions. Questions like—'Have you ever used Beanstack to take part in a reading challenge' and 'Who would you like to register'? Complete the required information and click 'Next' when finished. If you are creating an account or logging in via a smartphone, the app will prompt you to 'Find your Library'. Type in Albertson Memorial Library and hit 'Search'. When Albertson Memorial Library (WI) appears, click on it.

To add additional adults or children to your account, click on the name listed in the upper right side of the screen. Choose 'Add a Reader'. Complete the required information. You will then be prompted to decide if you would like to add another adult or child. Complete as appro-

To log reading on a laptop or desktop, click on 'Log Reading' located at the top left corner of the screen. Choose the type of data you wish to log: books, minutes, or pages. Input the relevant information. Click on 'Log Reading' to save your entries. On a smartphone, tap the + icon at the bottom center of the screen. Select 'Reading', highlight the reader's name, and then press 'Choose Reader'. To track time read, number of pages read, or titles read choose 'Log Without a Title'. Fill in the appropriate requested data and then click 'Done'. To track the title read, click on the QR scan button at the top right side of the screen. When using the QR scan button, scan the ISBN number; typically found on the back of the book. (The Albertson barcode will not work.) This feature will provide the option to track your progress through the title. Simply log the first page and last page number read that day. If the entire book was read, toggle the 'Track Progress' button to the off position.

*Using Beanstack is a fun and easy way to track books read to complete reading challenges and collect prizes. One of the library's most popular reading challenges, '1000 Books Before Kindergarten', is open to any child who has not yet started kindergarten. For every 100 books read, kids earn a free book.
