Council Heard Updates on Construction Projects

By Grace Kufahl

Chris Searls, BAEMS, asked that the city renew its contract with them for \$30 per capita. Regarding the request to have a non-voting member on their board, Searls explained they'd have to offer it to other townships and it could be disruptive to have six non-voting members at meetings. He also stated a new ambulance will arrive in a few weeks and they'll need to look into another one soon. Searls explained they pay a driver and two healthcare personnel to be scheduled at all times to meet the community's needs. The Council later voted to cancel the EMS contract. Alder Gritzmaker stated this won't affect the business model of the EMS who will be able to collect money from the citizen's insurance or Medicare.

The Council approved payments for two projects. MSA's Hunter Nix reported the Crosswinds Development project is due to be completed by year's end, with the exception of sidewalks to be completed in the spring. The West Third Avenue and 13th Street reconstruction should be half done by Thanksgiving with the remainder to be completed next year. As of now, 13th Street between West Third and Fourth and West

Third from 11th to 14th Street will be completed. All utilities are in the ground minus the storm sewer on 13th and the curb, gutter, sidewalks and driveways are to be done within the next two weeks.

Kyle Kabe from Accurate Appraisals summarized their Request for Proposal. He explained marketing communications to taxpayers is what sets them apart. Alder Sauer expressed concerns regarding their timeliness and accuracy. Musser Appraisal was unable to attend the meeting.

The Council approved Chief Raupp's request to reallocate \$4078 of Capital Improvement Project funds saved from scaling back the new unmarked car to replace Internet connection devices for three

In Other Business:

The Council passed Resolution 2025-028 requesting the PSC approve direct charge of the Fire Protection Fee to all landowners within the Fire Protection District including city landowners who don't have city utilities.

The Council approved Chief Raupp to make a conditional offer of full-time employment to Danielle Graham, pending exams and testing.



Green County Genealogical Society to meet

The Saturday, November 1 meeting of the Green County Genealogical Society is "New France in Illinois and Wisconsin" presented by Mark Peterson.

The presentation is at 10 a.m. in the Monroe Public Library community room on the second floor. The presentation is free and open to the public.

The presentation looks at the years 1524-1763 when the French explored and then settled in North America, including Wisconsin (Wis-kon-sa) and Illinois (Il-len-noh-wa). It examines the French relations with the Native Americans. It examines what happened to the French and Native Americans in their conflicts with the British. Today's French sites such as Portage, Wisconsin, and Fort De Chartres, Illinois, and others are reviewed.

Mark Peterson has been teaching history for Lifelong Learning at Highland Community College since 2017. A U.S. Navy veteran, he served six years aboard ships based in South Carolina and Greece. Mark earned his B.A. and M.A. in History from Southern Illinois University Carbondale before beginning a decades-long teaching career in HVAC controls, history, and adult education. From 2004 to 2018, he taught Historical Methods for Adult Learning at Concordia University in Beloit, Wisconsin. Having traveled to all 50 states and 19 countries, Mark brings global insight and enthusiasm for history to presentation.

Native Americans, Columbus, and Medicare Submitted by Barbara Flores, President

There have been three really great and enlightening programs at the library in recent weeks and there are many more to come. Watch for the three part series on "Jerks in Chicago" to begin November 15.

We began in early October with an eye opening talk by Native American filmmaker and student of media Ernest Whiteman III. It is easy to think that we know about a subject because we hear about it from time to time, but nothing beats having someone who has lived the experience of Native Americans (Ernest grew up on a reservation) speak from his heart. It was shocking to hear what authors we have admired such as Charles Dickens and Frank Baum had to say about Native

Americans. Ernest began by pointing out that Native Americans knew about the seasons and astronomy, how to build permanent structures (teepees were "mobile homes" for hunting expeditions. And they were practiced farmers to grow their own food e.g. the three sisters, corn, beans and squash. Sadly, he noted that nothing a Native American knew had any value to society until a white person endorsed it.

Dave Dini a retired engineer and local resident gave us a wealth of information about Christopher Columbus inviting us to learn more about Columbus by concluding that there followed a sad episode at the end of his life. Dave's excellent talk was rich in beautiful images as he explained how life and the economy in Europe were changing and how these changes gave the impetus for the voyage Columbus made. Did Columbus know there was another continent in the way as he sought a route to China and the riches the fareast offered? Did he ever land in North America? Why do we measure speed at sea by "knots?" We

Southwest Wisconsin Land Judging Contest held The Southwest Wisconsin land-judging contest was held on September

24. This contest is hosted by the Grant, Lafayette, and Green County Land and Water Conservation Departments. Schools participating were Argyle, Black Hawk, Cassville, Cuba City, Dodgeville, Fennimore, Juda, Lancaster, Milton, Monroe, Monticello, Mt. Horeb, Pecatonica, Platteville, Potosi, Prairie du Chien, River Ridge, Seneca, and Shullsburg. There were a total of 170 students from 19 schools.

The students traveled to the John Abey farm in Brooklyn Township. Students reviewed four soil pits and determined the position in landscape, slope of the field, type and degree of erosion or if there was deposition, evaluated soil properties, such as texture, structure, and drainage, estimated slope, ranked land classes, observed soil limitations, checked for invasive species, and recommended conservation practices.

Green County Child Care Network offered Conscious Discipline Training

The Green County Child Care Network would like to than Only in Wisconsin Giving for the recent grant to ensure our child care educators can access trainings that would otherwise be cost prohibitive and ensure continuing education requirements are met for child care regulation. Abbi Kruse recently provided an all-day training, including lunch, for GCCCN members to help them improve their ability to meet children's social emotional needs using conscious discipline, a brain based program. Local school district employees and parents were also welcomed to attend. Overall, the program teaches the educator to understand their own emotions and the child's emotions to so we can help children better manage their own. It builds resilience. We can learn that it is okay to be disappointed or sad. And we learn how to manage our response to that. In turn, children can learn from us.

Conscious Discipline is a step in changing the culture to teach self-regulation among children. But really, it's all about connection. Because connection brings willingness, and helps a child feel safe so they can learn. There is a second, shorter virtual offering in February as well.

Other professional development that the network has accessed using this grant is partial scholarships for Masters degrees, meeting sensory needs of children, and CPR/First Aid. Several members have now completed the T-TAP train the trainers ensuring local childcare professionals can become mentors and trainers for other network members to meet the specific needs of the regulated child care programs in our county.

Juda School District Annual Meeting Summary

Voters at the annual meeting of the Juda School District approved a mill rate of \$9.81 which is a reduction from the prior year rate of \$10.31. The total tax levy for the year will be \$2,055,945, which is up from the prior year of \$1,916,485. The breakdown for the tax levy is \$1,490,576 for the General Fund, \$445,369 for Referendum Debt Service and \$80,000 for the Community Service Fund. During the past fiscal year, the district was able to increase the general fund balance by \$338.133. It is anticipated the district will not adding to the general fund balance in the current fiscal year.

In other action the voters:

•Approved the board salaries of \$100 for the President, \$100 for the Clerk, \$60 for the Vice President, regular meetings of \$35 per member, special meetings of \$25 per member and \$30 per member for the annual meeting.

•Approved the 2025/2026 school fees and breakfast/lunch fees.

•Designated the Bank of New Glarus-Juda as the official place of depository.

•Authorized the board to furnish textbooks at the fees the board designates.

•Authorized the board to furnish school lunches at the fees the board designates.

•Authorized the board to engage Boardman and Clark as legal counsel as needed.

•Approved the district to provide transportation services to students.

•Approved to authorize reimbursement for board member expenses.

•Set the date for the 2026 annual meeting to be held on October 21, 2026 at 7 p.m. in the Technology Lab

Following the annual meeting, the board held a special meeting to approve a mill rate of \$9.81, which is down from the prior year mill rate of \$10.31



Local artist pursues dream

"Don't let anyone say that you can't. You should do what you love," said Robert Lawrence, a Brodhead artist, who has spent his life doggedly pursuing his dream in spite of the stroke he had at birth.

In his 24 years, Robert has never let his perceived "disability" stop him from doing what he loves. The moment he first picked up a pencil to draw, he knew he'd found his passion.

"I was like seven or eight years old, and I just remember having got in trouble with my grandma so she'd grounded me." He smiled at the memory. "I asked her what I was to do since I was so bored. And she said, 'Why don't you try drawing?'"

By the time he was ten, he picked up a paint brush and people took notice. A newspaper article reported his newfound talent when he was still

"I would say I've always had the gift." He shrugged. "Ever since I was little, people said my artwork looked like someone older had done it."

Through the years, he honed his craft little by little. Originally, he wanted to be a graphic designer, but now he is what he describes as a manga artist. Manga is a Japanese comic art style. So far, he has helped create 100 coloring books, written and illustrated 15 manga comic books of his own, written a stage play, designed over 50 different greeting card and notebook covers, and drawn and painted a variety of portraits, still-lifes, and landscapes.

"I think drawing faces is my strength. The overall human form is hard though," he said.

At the moment, he has stopped painting to focus more on his drawings, particularly with colored pencils, as he prefers impressionist styles. He enjoys drawing landscapes "at a glance" and creating artwork from memory, fixating less on details and more on the emotions and feelings invoked by the piece. He loves pencil sketching because he can make it look either like a painting or a photo, depending on his purpose, and it allows him more control over lines and placement. "It's less messy than paint."

Robert shook his head when asked about themes and emotions. "I want people to be able to look at my work and smile."

He doesn't create his art to portray any particular themes or emotions, but rather he wants people to see the beauty of the work at face value.

Of all his creations, he said he enjoys creating his comics best as he has been an avid collector, reader, and writer of them for years. Naruto, a manga that follows a teenage ninja, is one of his favorites. His own comics are teen dramas set in a contemporary high school following the lives of various teens

"I use Ohuhu markers for the front covers of my comic books. It makes them streaky."

His eyes lit up as he explained how he draws his comics in the manga style using pencil on copy paper for the original sketches and then fills them in with a dipping pen using black India Ink. He uses black sharpie for the

People react with disbelief when he shares his work. "People's eyes go wide and their mouth drops open. Every. Time. You don't normally see people who've experienced a stroke having artistic abilities."

In his own sphere, he hasn't seen many artists with strokes and that has led him to feel a bit alone in the field, but he says he has never met anyone who has treated him or his art poorly. The only misconceptions are how many people seem to believe that because of his stroke he can't or shouldn't be able to create art. "Every artist should get noticed," Robert said. "Everyone should have a chance."


His advice for aspiring artists with disabilities: "Don't let anything hold you back from pursuing your art."

None of his family are artists, but he says his grandmother has always supported and encouraged him. Currently, he works with the Brodhead Register Print Center to print his work.

"It's been a lot of fun. It also helps my art get to more people." He loves sharing his work.

Green County Kicks Off Local WealthBuilding Effort with Inspiring Community Breakfast Event

More than 150 community members gathered at Turner Hall in Monroe Friday, October 10 for a dynamic and energizing breakfast event that marked the beginning of an ambitious new chapter for Green County.

Hosted by the Green County Development Corporation (GCDC), the Community Foundation of Southern Wisconsin (CFSW), and UW Extension—Green County, the event served as the local launchpad for exploring the creation of a Community Investment Fund—a sustainable, locally-driven fund designed to support projects in housing, entrepreneurship, childcare, and more. The goal: to keep local dollars circulating locally and empower residents to shape their own economic future.

The event featured keynote remarks from Jeff Yost, President and CEO of the Nebraska Community Foundation, whose compelling presentation spotlighted Nebraska's statewide success in community wealth-building and grassroots endowment development. Attendees were challenged to imagine what's possible when a community comes together to invest in itself.

Yost was joined by co-authors of the book Pulling Together: A handbook for Community Change, Tom Mosgaller and Mike Breininger. The three are currently traveling the state as part of a tour focused on the book and creating timely conversation around ownership, belonging, and the power of place-based solutions

"This breakfast isn't just an event," said Olivia Otte, GCDC Executive Director. "It's the beginning of something bigger. We're exploring how Green County can build a fund by us, for us—one that supports real needs and real ideas, right here at home."

Throughout the morning, there were lively discussions and moments of reflection, as community members responded to the call to action. Following the breakfast, a smaller roundtable session was held in the Turner Hall Ratskeller, where participants dug deeper into next steps, shared personal inspiration, and began mapping out how Green County could model successful strategies from across the Midwest.

Next steps will include continued community conversations, strategic planning, and stakeholder engagement around the formation of the Community Investment Fund.
