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City Council

Council Moving Forward with Search for City Administrator

The council approved a contract with Public Administration Associates Contract so they can move forward with the search for a city administrator. Recruiting for the city administrator position will begin Friday, June 20th.

Representatives from Baker Tilly were present virtually to present the city's 2024 Audit. They reported that

the fund balance had a jump from 2023 and revenue had a positive variance. The city's debt and debt capacity are at about 20% of the legal limit. At 10%, the city's noncapital expenditures are healthy. In the Wastewater Fund, revenues have been in line with expenditures. When questioned about the breakdown of Wastewater expenses, Leah Gaffney from Baker Tilley replied

that most are salaries, maintenance and phosphorous testing. Mayor Simpson asked about a comparison with other municipalities noting that increasing salaries are hindering maintenance. Gaffney replied that comparisons are difficult and stated that it has been 10 years since the last rate study.

Resolution 2025-015 was approved providing that the top bidder for TID 9 Crosswinds Infrastructure, RT Fox, is recommended, accepted, and assigned to the developer. Parties will follow the developer's agreement and the city can accept the improvements when completed.

The council approved Resolution 2025–011 declaring the official intent to reimburse EIF Expenditures.

Jillian Malkow and Brian Kammerer Congratulated on Honors Received

High School Principal Jim Matthys congratulated Ag Teacher Jillian Malkow who was selected for the Kohl's Fellowship. A \$6,000 grant to the Ag Department accompanied the award.

During the Public Comment Period, Physical Education teacher Nicole Miller made a case for additional overload pay of 1/6 of her salary. Later in the meeting, as part of Employee Handbook changes recommended by Superintendent Novy, the board approved overload pay of 7.25% based on comparisons to other area schools. Last year's overload pay was \$1,000 per semes-

All open enrollments were approved for 2025-26. The number of students enrolling out remained steady at 113. The number of students enrolling in increased by five

to 93. Of those enrolling out, 17 were for 4k and 13 were for 5k.

Some of the other Employee Handbook changes approved were adding a third day of bereavement pay for loss of immediate family, adding a 2% penalty to the cost of insurance if physical exams aren't completed by the required date, and increasing the cost for breach of contract to recoup as much money deposited to Health Savings Accounts as possible.

In Other Business:

Mr. Matthys reported \$80,000 in scholarships were given away on Class Night.

Mr. Novy reported he's soliciting suggestions for the Wisconsin Association of School Boards' Business Honor Roll.

Novy congratulated Brian Kammerer for being named Athletic Di-



BRODHEAD ORDINANCE 272-6 B.

Public nuisance declared. The Common Council finds that lawns, grasses and noxious weeds on lots or parcels of land within the City of Brodhead which exceed eight inches in length adversely affect the public health and safety of the public in that they tend to emit pollen and other discomforting bits of plants, constitute a fire hazard and a safety hazard in that debris can be hidden in the grass, interfere with the public convenience and adversely affect property values of other land within the City. For that reason, grass or weeds on a lot or other parcel of land which exceed eight inches in length is hereby declared to be a public nuisance, except for property located in a designated floodplain area and/or wetland area or where the lawn, grass or weed is part of a native landscape as defined in § **272.5A**. This section does not apply to crops grown in conformity with the provisions of Chapter **480**, Zoning, of the Code of the City of Brodhead.






Golf RVC Conference Meet Results





CHILD SEXUAL ASSAULT INVESTIGATION RESULTS IN ARREST OF CONVICTED SEX OFFENDER

On Sunday, May 4, the Green County Sheriff's Office received information regarding incidents of Child Sexual Assault reported to have taken place in the Village of Albany and in rural Green County in the Town of Exeter.

Due to the nature of the alleged crimes, the Green County Sheriff's Office Detective Division was assigned to conduct further investigation. The Green County Sheriff's Office collaborated with the Village of Albany Police Department and Rock County Human Services to conduct a joint investigation, which included utilizing the Child Advocacy Center in Rock County to assist in forensic interviews.

As the investigation continued, Green County Law Enforcement developed probable cause to support the arrest of DERRICK PRESCOTT NIPPLE, 36, of rural Belleville, WI for the following child sex crimes:

•First Degree Sexual Assault of a Child (Victim under 13) ~ WI SS 948.02(1)(e)

•Exposing Genitals (to a child) ~ WI SS 948.10(1)

•Exposing a Child to Harmful Materials ~ WI SS 948.11

With the assistance of Law Enforcement in neighboring Lafayette County, WI-specifically by the City of Darlington Police Department and the Lafayette County Sheriff's Office, NIPPLE was taken into custody in the 800 block of Galena St, in the City of Darlington, WI on the afternoon of Tuesday, May 20, 2025. Following his arrest, NIP-PLE was transferred to the Green County Jail in Monroe, WI where he is being held without bond pending an initial appearance in Green County Circuit Court. Additional sex crime charges are being referred to the Green County District Attorney's Office for review. This investigation remains active and no additional information will be released at this time.

NIPPLE has previous sex crime convictions in the State of Wisconsin. NIPPLE was convicted of Second Degree Sexual Assault of a Child under Green County CCAP case 2010CF52 where he plead No Contest to the charge in Green County Circuit Court in August 2010. NIPPLE was also previously convicted of a Sex Offender Registry Violation under Green County CCAP case 2013CF86 where he plead Guilty in Green County Circuit Court in September 2013. Due to previous criminal convictions, DERRICK NIPPLE is a Lifetime Sex Offender Registrant.






Albany Elementary students visit Albertson Memorial Library

GCDC Tech Connect Program off to great start

In March of this year, GCDC announced a partnership program with Green County IT that provides refurbished computers to individuals that are low income, veterans, students, or seniors, and to small businesses and non-profit organizations.

While the program began with a slow start, in the past 30 days, 10 laptops and tablets have been distributed to individuals, small businesses, and nonprofits, including the Albany Fire Department.
