School Board

Elementary School Construction Bid Package Approved

The board approved the Elementary School Construction Bid Package presented by Kyle Robers from Nexus Solutions. Because the bids came in under budget, they were able to add some alternate projects in such as replacing window trim boards, updating bathrooms and installing roller shades. Including the alternates, the elementary construction is still coming in around \$93,000 under budget. This doesn't completely offset the high school overage, but it gets close.

Superintendent David Novy reported sitting on a joint review board for a new Tax Incremental District near the new dollar store. The TID was approved by that board. It comprises 23 acres, a commercial unit, five houses by the end of this year, and an apartment building by the end of next year.

Novy and board members relayed the most frequent question they're being asked about the upcoming referendum is why can't the district use the \$17 million approved last year for operational needs. They are sharing the explanation at public meetings, through mailings and on social media.

In Other Business:

Fifteen eighth graders involved in the WEB (Where Everyone Belongs) program at the middle school spoke to the board about their work to welcome and support sixth graders.

Pupil Services Director Deanne Larson reported school counselors are reviewing the Social Emotional Learning curriculum.

Middle School Principal Adam Ferger reported three middle school students were selected to move to the state art show at East Towne Mall

Ferger gave a shout out to Stephanie Tresemer for taking 120 middle school students to perform in a recent forensics competition.

Board President Mike Krupke,

Clerk Michael Oellerich and Novy will be the canvassers for the upcoming election.

A new math curriculum was approved to be phased in over the next three years.

It was approved for High School Principal Jim Matthys to use his discretion to potentially admit another exchange student from Belleville to finish out the year here.

Policy 2264 Non-Discrimination on the Basis of Sex in Education was rescinded per the Trump Administration and will be replaced by the previous policy.

College and Technical School credit courses were approved for next year.







What Is the Tax Impact of the School District Referendum?



The School Board is very much aware of the tough economic conditions facing families in our community and has timed and structured the Tuesday, April 1, 2025 Referendum to limit the tax impact on our community. They have the unenviable challenge of maintaining a strong, balanced educational program for our children, while still being sensitive to the needs of the taxpayers. It is the Board's belief that the community would not like to see opportunities lost for our children, or the effects that negative changes would have on our community.


If voters approve, the April 2025 referendum would allow the District to maintain current programming, operations, and maintenance. While the District will still need to make budget reductions, these funds would prevent reductions that go beyond right-sizing to our current needs and ensure we can continue offering competitive instructional programming, salaries, and benefits. These are not "additional" funds that we are requesting, as in a Bond Referendum. Instead, the funds will bring revenue up to the level needed to meet rising expenses without an increase to your property tax rate.

The school mill (tax) rate in Brodhead is currently one the lowest among all school districts in our region, at \$7.25 per thousand dollars of property value, and is expected to drop slightly to \$7.24 and then stay at that same rate over the next three years. There will be no tax rate increase with the passage of this Referendum. The following chart compares rates for other Green County and Rock Valley Conference districts:



This Referendum has been timed to coincide with the 2022 Referendum ending. The 2022 Referendum was for \$1,750,000 per year for three years, 2022-2023, 2023-2024, and 2024-2025. The current question for operating purposes is again for \$1,750,000 and would cover the school years of 2025-2026, 2026-2027, and 2027-2028. It simply extends the same amount for another three years with no additional tax impact.

Community members attending our public Referendum meeting agreed that this made sense; however, the Board cannot do this without community approval through a Referendum.



Even with passage of the Referendum, Brodhead would still have one of the lowest school tax rates in the comparable area. These projections are presented using conservative assumptions of student counts and estimated property values.

Our goal is to provide a competitive education for our students while maintaining a level of consistent tax rates. This Referendum has been timed and structured to accomplish both of those goals. It is being presented because we feel other options will reduce the educational opportunities of our students.

We believe we are offering a great program for one of the lowest costs in the area. It comes down to a simple question to be answered by the community at the Tuesday, April 1 election: Does the community believe this is a reasonable cost to maintain the current level of programs for students and maintain our facilities?



Attorney Glazer will also provide one-on-one consultations with entrepreneurs to address legal questions specific to their businesses. The clinic will be bilingual in English and Spanish.

INVESTIGATION RESULTS IN ARREST FOR PUBLIC MISCONDUCT

In July 2024 the Green County Sheriff's Office began conducting an investigation into Misconduct in Public Office and Forgery. The investigation stemmed from fraudulent certificates being created and issued to the Village of Albany by a member of the Albany Fire Department. This investigation spanned seven months and a series of forged documents were identified during the course of the investigation. Through the investigation it was determined there was evidence to support arrests.

On Friday, March 7, 2025 deputies arrested Karl E. Schoenhard 24, of Albany. Schoenhard was transported and booked into the Green County Jail awaiting a court appearance. Schoenhard was subsequently charged with Forgery-Writings (Party to a Crime), Forgery-Uttering (Party to a Crime) and Misconduct in Office. Schoenhard appeared in Green County Circuit court where he received a \$5,000 bond and was released.

On Monday, March 10, 2025 deputies arrested Angela L. Welchel 52, of Albany. Welchel was transported and booked into the Green County Jail. Welchel was booked for Forgery and was held pending court.

The investigation is ongoing at this time.
