Dear School District of Brodhead Residents:

By David Novy, District Administrator, School District of Brodhead

We are grateful to announce that the Operational Referendum question that was on the ballot on Tuesday, April 1 has passed, allowing us to avoid substantial cuts to programs, services, and staffing across our schools. The three-year non-recurring Operational Referendum passed by a vote of 1,223 yes to 1,197 no. The District appreciates the continued support of the high-quality educational programming Brodhead has put into place.

Thank you for supporting this Referendum! The successful passage of the Referendum is a testament to the strong community spirit and commitment to our students. As we stated in our Referendum listening sessions, even with the passage of this Referendum, the District's mill rate is anticipated to stay at the same \$7.24 level. This will be a \$0 tax rate increase from the previous year, and is expected to stay at that approximate rate through the three-year duration of this Referendum.

With the Referendum's approval, the School Board will be authorized to exceed the District's State-imposed revenue limit by up to \$1.75 million annually for the next three years. While you do not directly see the impact of an Operational Referendum as you did with the improvements made with the support of the 2024 Capital Referendum, this additional funding will ensure that we can continue to provide the high-quality education our students deserve.

We sincerely appreciate the engagement we have seen from our community throughout this process. We had three public listening sessions, two "Coffee with the Superintendent" dates, and several presentations to civic organizations about the future of our schools and will continue these conversations as we move forward with our budgeting process. It is important to note that due to the State funding formula in Wisconsin, community support through Referendums continues to be necessary to maintain the quality of education our students receive. Your ongoing support is extremely important as we strive for excellence in education.

Thank you once again for your support of the School District of Brodhead and for helping us empower the futures of the students we serve!

Brodhead Community Gardens meeting Wednesday, April 23

Interested in growing your own food? Do you have limited space for a garden where you live? Then you are a candidate to join the Brodhead Community Gardens. There is an acre of land available behind Gasser True Value for community residents to have their own garden plot to grow what they wish. The spaces are approximately 20x25 or roughly 500 square feet, you can keep your plot year after year. Participants are asked to use limited fertilizer, insecticides, and herbicides, and to have your plot cleaned up by November 1. All vegetables are the property of the grower and gardens will be open from 6 a.m. to 9 p.m., during the summer months for planting, weeding and harvesting. There will be water available on site. They ask that you try limiting the weed growth in your plot. Experienced gardeners are always available to answer any questions.

They will hold an in-person meeting on Wednesday, April 23, at 5 p.m. at the Brodhead Public Library. You can also sign up on Saturday morning, April 26, at 10 a.m. at the Community Garden site. Both meetings are open to existing Community Garden members and those wishing to get a garden plot for the first time. The cost of each plot is \$20, they will be receiving payments and assigning plots at this time.

Tilling is based on temperature and ground conditions but is usually done by the first weekend in May. Please do not plant anything until the tilling is done. 
