





Local teen wins Junior Achievement of Wisconsin's Youth **Entrepreneur Live Competition** and will participate in the State **Competition in February**

Clayton Elliott—a senior at Brodhead High School and founder of CE Property Services—was crowned this year's winner of the Junior Achievement's Young Entrepreneur Live Competition: Northeast Region.

The event, which was held at the end of January at the Community First Career Exploration and Financial Literacy Center in Appleton, gave student entrepreneurs throughout Northeast Wisconsin the opportunity to showcase their businesses to a panel of "celebrity judges."

Joining Elliott as a finalist were Daniel Schoeller (Wisco W's) and the entrepreneurial team of Evelyn Zarate, Lucy Schumacher and Kimberly Diaz (Puretect).

"The night is all about celebrating entrepreneurship and experiencing a business-minded spirit within the room," Mary Beth Tomsyck, development coordinator for Junior Achievement (JA) of Northeast Wisconsin, said. "Board members, mentors, JA staff, family and friends gather together to watch the live competition. It's inspiring, electric and high energy."

From a multi-purpose and safe insect repellent, to a curated collection of vintage clothing, to lawn care services—the budding entrepreneurs each took a moment in the spotlight in front of judges as they vied for the \$2,500 grand prize and an invitation to the state competition.

Elliott was named both the grand prize winner (\$2,500) and the audience choice winner (\$500).

"The winner also received an aumatic bid to the state competition held in Milwaukee on February 21st and a chance to win a \$5,000 scholarship," Tomsyck said.

"Each participant had to have owned their own business for at least one year," she said.

Now in its fourth year, Tomsyck said the regional pitch competition is right in line with JA's pillars for student success.

"One of those (pillars) is financial literacy," she said. "Another is work readiness. And the third pillar of success is entrepreneurship. We know all three of those things are important life skills for young people to know. So, it aligns perfectly with what our mission is."

"Other parameters were given to help (participants) feel prepared and successful coming into the competition," she said. "We try to set them up for success and help them gain confidence in all aspects of this process."

Tomsyck said the finalists were selected for the pitch contest using a variety of different criteria, including charisma and hustle, business success and financials, growth potential and social involvement.

"The winner is based on those factors," she said. "It is a group effort by the judging panel. They pull their scores together and award the top place winner."

Elliott, an 18-year-old senior at Brodhead High School and brains behind CE Property Services, said the entrepreneurial spirit runs in the family.

"I have a sister who is 27 years old, who is also an entrepreneur and business owner," he said.

"I have grown my business to more than 20 residential clients and a handful of commercial clients," he said. "My business is also fully insured."

As he looks to the future—graduating in just a few months—Elliott said he very much plans to continue being an entrepreneur.

"I am going to Madison College and double majoring in business entrepreneurship and finance," he said. "I plan to grow my business over the years to a point where it is sellable after I graduate college, to start another business or grow this business to the next level."

Listening Session Summary

Over the past few weeks, I hosted six listening sessions across the 17th Senate District - one in each county I represent. The sessions took place in Barneveld, Belleville, Belmont, Brodhead, Fennimore, and Prairie du Chien. I heard from more than 100 people who shared a wide variety of opinions, ideas, and concerns.

Attendees at each session discussed a wide range of topics. Many of the topics were specific to regional concerns. In Barneveld, Belmont, and Fennimore, I heard a lot about industrial wind turbines and solar farms. In Belleville and Brodhead, we talked about funding of K-12 education and an increase in referendums across Wisconsin. At all six sessions I heard many ideas for the state budget.

I appreciate hearing from everyone who attended and spoke at each session. Investing your time to come to an hour-long listening session during the week is a commitment. I am grateful you came and shared your input with me. We may not all see eye to eye but I want to hear from as many of you as I can. I value the opportunity to hear your comments, criticisms, and questions. They help inform me as a legislator as I consider policy and spending decisions that impact our state.

I wanted to share a brief recap of some of the topics discussed at our series of listening sessions.

Wind and Solar Farms: Attendees were overwhelmingly frustrated by the continued spread of industrial wind and solar farms as well as current wind siting regulations. Speakers were concerned about property values, aesthetics, adverse health effects, and possible environmental impact of wind turbines and solar farms. I received a lot of helpful feedback on Senate Bill (SB) 3, my legislation that would give local officials a voice in the process of approving large wind and solar projects.

Funding for Schools: Attendees asked us to send more funding to school districts. Many people were concerned about referendums in their communities. I share their concerns and remain a strong supporter of our rural school districts. I will continue to work with my colleagues in the legislature to find innovative ways to help our schools.

Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program: Attendees spoke in support of the Knowles-Nelson Stewardship Program, an environmental program that allows the Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to purchase land to conserve. The program's future is uncertain after a Supreme Court decision removed the legislature's oversight role in this program. I am supportive of the program and hope to see it continue, but many of my colleagues in the legislature have reservations.

Tax Burden: Attendees, particularly those living on fixed income, expressed concerns about significant increases in their property tax bill over the past year. I also heard from many who wanted to see the state's budget surplus returned to taxpayers. I remain committed to passing a tax cut and lowering the tax burden for all Wisconsinites.

Housing: Attendees shared concerns about a lack of availability and affordability of homes on the market. I heard many creative ideas for increasing home building and I believe this is an topic to address as our state faces population stagnation in the coming years.

I am sincerely thankful for the time and effort of everyone who joined me at a listening session. Child sexual abuse material investigation results in arrest

On Wednesday, February 5, the Green County Sheriff's Office Detective Division assisted by deputies and agents of the WI Department of Justice-Division of Criminal Investigation executed a residential search warrant in the N2800 block of County Highway GG, in the Town of Spring Grove. The search warrant stemmed from an investigation of Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC).

The investigation started with a cyber tip through the National Center for Missing and Exploited Children (NCMEC). Investigation into the cyber tip identified additional reports of child sexual abuse material, commonly referred to as child pornography. As a result of the investigation Garrett L. McKnight, 25, of Brodhead, was arrested at his place of employment in Janesville with the assistance of DCI Agents. Further investigation by Detectives resulted in a second residential search warrant being executed in the 1100 block of 17th Street, City of Brodhead.

On Monday, February 10, McKnight was formally charge in Green County Circuit court with two counts of possession of child pornography, a Class D felony. He was held on a \$20,0000 cash bond. Additionally McKnight had charges filed in Rock County Circuit Court stemming from the investigation of two counts of child sexual exploitation, a Class C felony. At the time of this release McKnight remains in custody at the Green County Jail.

The Green County Sheriff's Office remains aggressive in its effort to investigate and arrest individuals that are involved in these activities. These are serious crimes that deeply impact victims, families and our community.

Deputies subsequently arrested Joseph W. Carow, 34, of rural Albany, for a warrant issued by WI Department of Corrections for a probation violation. Carow was transported to the Green County Jail where he was held.

At 12:40 a.m., Friday, deputies responded to the W3400 block of County Hwy KS, Town of Jefferson, for a disturbance. The investigation resulted in Kelsey T.E. Vavra, 30, of Juda, being arrested for disorderly conduct. Vavra was transported to the Green County Jail where she was held pending court or cash bond.
