Board to Consider Shortening School Year Adding Minutes to School Day

A family in an adjacent school district wants to detach their property from that district and attach it to Brodhead. Hearings will be held in both districts, with Brodhead's to be held Wednesday, February 26th. The Board needs to answer a series of questions before voting whether or not to accept the property in question into the district.

Superintendent Novy raised the possibility of adding three minutes onto the beginning of the school day to eliminate one student day at the end of next year. He will draw up potential schedules for the board to consider at the next meeting on Wednesday, February 12th.

Subsequent to the board's decision to use the sign fund to pay for the JV girls' softball scoreboard, the Bank of Brodhead made a donation to pay for the whole thing. The board will vote at the next meeting on rescinding the initial funding decision and accepting the Bank's donation.

A resolution was passed estab-

lishing parameters for the sale of General Obligation Promissory Notes not to exceed \$3,235,000 for the referendum building project. This is similar to the resolution passed last year for the borrowing of \$14.25 million and allows Superintendent Novy and Board President Krupke flexibility to take advantage of the best rates.

The board set Open Enrollment Limits for next year. Enrollment will again be closed to students with IEP's. Eighty-seven students are enrolling in and 101 are leaving. Of those leaving, 12 will be attending 4k in other districts.

In Other Business:

Superintendent Novy reviewed the communication plan for the upcoming operations referendum including information on the website and public meetings to be held on Thursday, February 27th; Thursday, March 6th and Monday, March 10th.

The board approved WIAA Sports Co-op Renewals for hockey for 2025-26 and 2026-27.





and north of the Ohio River to the Confederation of States. This government had little national power and it faced a complex task of establishing governance of the area, establishing boundaries of the individual territories and stipulating requirements for statehood.

The Northwest Ordinance of 1787, issued the same year as the drafting of the Constitution, set out a process by which land was to be organized as dependent territories and then as states fully equal in status. The fledgling country needed money to pay debts incurred after the successful revolution against England. In order to offer land for sale and raise money, the entire area



The annual meeting of the Farmers of the Sugar River will be held on Wednesday, February 19, at the Albany Lions Club, 402 Cincinnati Street, Albany. The Farmers of the Sugar River is a farmer-led watershed group, covering the Middle and Lower Sugar River reaches, that aims to teach other farmers how to implement conservation practices that save time and money while improving water quality in the Sugar River. The meeting is a chance for farmers to learn from each other and network with others. The public is also invited to attend to learn what farmers are doing to be more resilient to weather extremes.

The agenda for the day is meant to cover a variety of topics so that everyone can learn and take home some information to use. Kicking things off at 10 a.m. will be Mike Miller, a Stream Ecologist with the WIDNR, to give a presentation on neonicotinoids—what they are, where they're found and their effect on a variety of critters in the environment. Following the background information on 'neonics', the group will hear from Nick Tinsley, a Technical Field Representative for Seed Treatment from BASF. He will share what industry is doing to find safer alternatives, how to handle treated seed and choices that farmers have on seed treatment. After lunch from the Albany Lions Club, a farmer panel on planting green will share their experiences and answer questions on this practice. Jake Kaderly will share details of his manure composting project. A presentation on why a watershed farmer farms the way he does will be given by Dan Truttmann. And to wrap up the day, Jordyn Sattler, UWEX Crops Educator, will share results on the Nitrogen Plots that several farmers participated in last year. The meeting is slated to conclude around 3:15 p.m.
