"After such a busy successful year, we want to celebrate with our home community," says Pat Weeden, Executive Director. "The museum isn't just about airplanes—it's about the local story, it's about creating a community space for everyone."

The free event, which will take place from 11 a.m. to 4 p.m. on Sunday, December 14th, at the museum's facilities at N2463 Airport Road in Brodhead. With so much on offer, there's something for every age and interest level:

In addition, a new exhibit about model airplanes and the Golden Age of Aviation was unveiled last week, featuring unique handmade models built by a Wisconsin native. The Open House is a great time to check out this addition to the Atrium displays!

That's just the beginning of some major updates: The museum's chief curator, Hannah Shickles, is currently designing two new exhibits in the Atrium, which will be unveiled in the spring. "We want there to be something new for people to discover, no matter how many times they visit," says Shickles, a Brodhead native who discovered her love for aviation right here at the Kelch Aviation Museum, five years

ago. "Aviation history is packed full of amazing stories, the hardest part is just narrowing down which ones to highlight!"

This year the museum welcomed over 9,000 visitors from all over the USA and more than a dozen other countries; hosted 10 free movie nights sponsored by local Brodhead businesses; and operated eight vintage automobiles and airplanes for demonstration. The museum also expanded educational programming in 2025: Thanks to donors and sponsors, the educational team reached hundreds of students in

multiple counties by visiting classrooms to share science activities, thanks in part to volunteer Mike Flory, a retired teacher. For grownup learners, volunteer historian Michael John Jaeger took historic presentations to a dozen counties in Wisconsin and Illinois, sharing local aviation history about airmail.

"It's been a banner year for us in so many ways, but that's thanks to our community," says Weeden, "I hope local people will come enjoy the museum this season, and think, 'Hey, this makes me proud to live in Brodhead!'"

## City of Brodhead invites Brodhead Area EMS to regular meeting

The City of Brodhead mayor and common council have invited the Brodhead Area EMS (BAEMS) executive board to their Monday, December 15th regular meeting to discuss the terms of a service contract to be effective in the new year. This is an open meeting beginning at 6 p.m. in City Hall, located at 1111 West 2nd Avenue, with public comment allowed.

For several months the City and BAEMS have exchanged documents, each representing specific interests, but have not been able to come to terms on a mutually acceptable agreement. The mayor and council are seeking an agreement that will provide accountability and assure residents of a continuing level of emergency services coverage is seamless on January 1, 2026. The City and the EMS entered into an initial yearlong agreement effective on January 1, 2022. The agreement allows for automatic renewal unless either party provides 60-day written notice to not renew the agreement and has functioned well since then until the recent communications breakdown.

## David A. (Albert) Elmer

David A. (Albert) Elmer, 83, of Brodhead, passed away unexpectedly on Wednesday, November 5th, 2025, at the William S. Middleton Memorial Veterans Hospital in Madison.

He was born on Wednesday, December 17th, 1941 (10 days after the attack on Pearl Harbor), at St. Clare Hospital in Monroe, Wisconsin. David was the only child born to the parents of Albert (Albrecht) and Phyllis Louise (Zimmerman) Elmer, Jr. In 1959, he graduated from Brodhead High School and continued to help his parents on the farm.

In January of 1960, he joined the Army National Guard of Wisconsin. His Active-Duty responsibility was serving during the Berlin Crisis. Then he returned to the family farming and custom harvesting operations

David was well-known for having a special interest in Pontiac GTOs. The GTO was often credited as one of the first muscle car manufactured. It was based on the Pontiac Tempest model and featured a powerful V8 engine option. 1964 was the first model manufactured and the car quickly gained popularity in performance and style. David actually purchased a 1964 sight unseen. His second GTO was a 1966.

Roller skating, dancing, sitting on the square in Monroe and checking out the vehicles as they went by, learning to play the electric guitar, playing with his big Lionel train set, playing euchre or other card games, reading books and collecting coins were on the top of his entertainment list. Recreational activities were both bow and rod fishing, bow and rifle deer hunting.

On August 17, 1968 David (age 27) married Barbara Marie Hauri at Luther Valley Lutheran Church (a countryside church in Newark Township, Beloit). This year they celebrated their 57th wedding anniversary.

While David and Barbara Marie continued to operate a dairy cow, hog, beef cattle farming operation and custom harvesting operation David also was employed off the farm at Blackhawk Technical College (BTC) Central Campus for a

few years as a third shift custodian. When it was discovered that David could also drive a larger truck, his winter duties were expanded to snow plowing the campus parking lot.

Dave's dad was well-known for being one of the first in the area to do custom harvesting: corn picking, silage chopping, corn shelling and drying. Running the UNI chopper and combine system was Albert's forte. David became a Gleaner Combine owner as he took over the custom harvesting business. Once David fulfilled his longtime dream to own his own semi-tractor (Freightliner) and step-deck trailer, he incorporated hay hauling into the scheme of things. People were amazed on how he could maneuver in and out of tight places no one else could. His CB Radio handle was Hayman.

In the quest to further his education he took welding courses and some woodworking classes at BTC. He also attended several AGC (Associated General Contractors) Construction Supervisory Training Program courses at BTC with a dear friend in the construction business.

October 20, 1985 David became a member of the United Methodist Church in Brodhead. He was also involved in various types of volunteer work

Very early on Saturday mornings, he would drive to Milwaukee to pick up produce for the Share Food Program to be distributed that Saturday morning. He also assisted with a number of Green County and Decatur 4-H events. The main one was helping decorate and driving a flatbed trailer every other year in the Cheese Days Parade. Because he resembled Abe Lincoln so much, one time he was Abe Lincoln in the Cheese Days Parade and children would come up to him, tug on his trench coat, and tell him that they go to his school (Lincoln School in Monroe). David would get quite a chuckle out of that.

As David eased back from actively running the farms, he spent his time transplanting trees, growing tulips, planting a quarter acre raspberry and vegetable garden, attracting birds other than sparrows to the property and watching others operate the cropland. He also took great pride in maintaining the lawn and roadside by regularly pulling and controlling the yellow rocket, weeds and picking up roadside trash. He mowed the lawn with a John Deere Garden tractor and removed the snow away from the buildings for easier access with his favorite toy the Bobcat Toolcat with both AC

In later years after a grandson (Max) was born, David enjoyed playing mini golf and different types of card games with him. He also enjoyed watching Harry Potter movies with his family, listening to country music on WJVL 99.9 radio station, and watching TV programs such as the Wheel of Fortune and many other game shows, Dancing with the Stars, Tracker and crime shows

such as Blue Bloods, FBI and NCIS. Most of all, recently he very much enjoyed attending and watching his grandson's figure skating performances and hockey events.

David had three special memorable family and friends travel events in the very recent last few years. One was a Fourth of July holiday trip to La Crosse, Wisconsin, for a stay and a houseboat ride up and down the Mississippi River looking for eagles with some special far away friends. Another was a few days stay at the Wisconsin Dells to have some quality time with family. And the third was a Lake Geneva, Wisconsin, mail boat ride, also a fun time experience with family.

David is survived by his spouse, Barbara Marie (Hauri) Elmer of Brodhead; his children: Brian David (Laura Kaye Jerney Franzen-Elmer) Elmer of Madison and DeAnn Marie Elmer of Cincinnati, Ohio. He is also survived by one grandson, Maxwell Brian Jerney Elmer and one granddaughter, Zoey Rose Jerney Franzen.

He was preceded in death by his mother (1995); father (2010); mother-in-law, Barbara Fyetta (Hoffman) Hauri (2011); and fatherin-law, Cecil Hauri (2014); other extended family members and many dear friends.

A special thank you to all the amazing VA and UW healthcare providers who cared for David over the past 10 years of facing multiple aggressive cancers back-to-back, giving him more time with those he loved and those who loved him.

#### 71-Day Canoe Trip Down the Mississippi

Students in Mr. Knuth's Adventure Education class were recently treated to an inspiring presentation from local adventurer Troy Knudson, who shared the story of his remarkable 71-day canoe trip down the Mississippi River. Troy began his journey at the river's headwaters in Minnesota and paddled all the way to "Ground Zero" in the Gulf of Mexico, where the great river empties into the sea.

During his visit, Troy brought the class into his world on the water, sharing stories of early mornings, long days of paddling, unpredictable weather, and unforgettable encounters. But what stood out most to students was the people he met along the way. Troy spoke warmly about a community known as Paddle Angels, a Facebook group made up of volunteers who help paddlers traveling the Mississippi. These individuals, many of whom he had never met before, offered him rides to gather supplies, provided meals and places to sleep, and shared local knowledge about the river's most challenging and rewarding stretches.

For students preparing for their own three-day backpacking trip, Troy's message was especially meaningful. He emphasized the importance of resilience, planning, and maintaining a positive mindset during difficult days. But above all, he reminded them that there are countless kind people in the world willing to help you on your journey, whether that journey is on the river, on a trail, or through everyday life.



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## Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library More Jerks in

Chicago—1900-1945

Please join us on Saturday, December 13 for part two of the story of Jerks in Chicago. The first part covered the 1800's when the city was a small settlement dealing with growing pains as it organized itself in the "wild west" mentality of the time. Eventually the city was incorporated in 1837. The second talk, More Jerks in Chicago, details the type of ills and kinds of characters the city continued to face.


Speaker Brad Keyes will tell us the stories of the scoundrels who were involved as the city moved into the first half of the 20th century. Chicago managed to prosper despite the criminals, corrupt leaders and mobsters. The Columbian Exposition of 1893 had given it a boost as well as worldwide attention. The city was well placed with access to the Great Lakes and the Mississippi River and soon became the rail hub for the nation. Population grew rapidly due to immigration from abroad and the South and industry grew accordingly. Soon the city was the center of meatpacking and steel and other manufacturing.

Along with this prosperity and groundbreaking advancements e.g. the use of iron, which led to the erection of skyscrapers, came the jerks about which we will learn. A certain mayor deserves the title of the most corrupt official in Chicago history while a certain man married and dispensed with multiple wives and at least one woman did the same with husbands.

It was quite a place—brothels galore, bootlegging, gangsters, and, of course, corruption. The talk begins at 10 a.m. and is 90 minutes long. Coffee and tasty little pastries will be offered so come by, get comfortable and enjoy the presentation.

Entry to the library is at the east end of the building. Just follow the signs along the wide paved walkway. Public library hours are 9 a.m.—noon Saturdays and 6-8 p.m. Tuesday evenings.

#### **Green County Development Emerging Entrepreneur Youth Business Plan Contest Awards**

Green County area high school students had the opportunity this month to work on their own business plan ideas and enter a competition to win startup funds to help turn those plans into reality. The awards night was held on Wednesday, December 3rd, at Monroe High School.

Green County Development Corporation (GCDC) hosted the contest for students in partnership with local school district business teachers and the Monroe School District LAUNCH program. The business startup funds were made possible through a Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC) Small Business Development Grant awarded to GCDC. The grant was intended to support and encourage the entrepreneurial spirit of youth in Green County.

Sixteen student business plans were submitted for the competition, with prize awards ranging from \$2,500 to \$250 per student to help them get their businesses off the ground. A total of \$20,200 was awarded this year.

A series of learning and planning events were held in the weeks leading up to the competition. The first event featured a presentation by the Wisconsin Small Business Development Center, offering guidance on understanding customers and writing a business plan. The second event included three local businesspeople serving as mentors, listening to student plans, providing feedback, and helping students fine-tune their final submissions. Those same mentors then acted as judges to determine the final awards.

"We had a great variety of submitted business plans in the contest, such as a mobile mechanic service, drone photography, and cattle genetics. This was a strong indication of the creativity, entrepreneurial mindset, and potential of the youth in Green County," said Olivia Otte, Executive Director

"At GCDC, we're passionate about supporting small businesses and encouraging entrepreneurs to chase their goals," said Otte. "With our Elevate Entrepreneurs program, we're excited to expand our support for both new and established businesses in more meaningful, long-term ways."
