Kelch Aviation Museum received flight simulator

The Kelch Aviation Museum at Brodhead Airport has received the donation of a flight simulator from the Students in Aviation Foundation (SIA) in Baraboo, Wisconsin. The simulator is a Linux-based gaming computer running X-Plane, with a 56" monitor and full flight controls. It can be used for various levels of flight training from students to commercial pilots.

"Everyone who visits the museum is curious about actually piloting a plane," said Patrick Weeden, Executive Director. "Short of putting you in an actual airplane for a lesson, this is the best way to give people that real experience, on any experience level."

Education, and making seemingly out-of-reach aviation opportunities accessible to everyone, are core values in the Kelch Aviation Museum's mission. Open since July 2021, the nonprofit museum is entirely admission-free, and offers year-round activities including flyin events for pilots, family-oriented open houses, school tours, historic presentations, and an annual bigband "back in time" dance. The museum is entirely funded through charitable donations, and maintains an airworthy fleet of real 1930s airplanes, a research library, and an extensive artifact collection.

In the weeks the simulator has been installed in the Kelch Aviation Museum, both grade school students and commercial pilots have taken advantage of the training potential. Ten-year-olds at a recent holiday event learned basic flight controls, steering, and navigating while "flying" a small Cessna. The very next day, a professional pilot took the controls to brush up on the avionics system in the airliner he'll be flying next month.

"It's real flight training-and yes, of course it's fun too! I like flying it too," Weeden continues. "We're grateful to SIA for making access to such a high-quality simulator as easy as walking into the museum."

The SIA Foundation, Inc. is a volunteer run, Wisconsin based 501(c) (3) charity founded in 2016 by Joe Canepa, a commercial, instrument, and multi-engine flight instructor. SIA supports aviation education in hands-on ways, by providing a free online ground school for K-12 schools and students, offering full flight training scholarships for students who qualify, and providsimulators—"SIAsims"—to schools and organizations. The first SIASim donated to any K-12 district is always free of charge; should a school wish to expand flight training resources, SIA will arrange for additional simulators below cost.

As of October 2024, over 45 simulators have been donated to K-12 schools across the country, \$30,000 in scholarships provided, and over 100 students trained with SIA's ground schools, all at no cost to the students. Canepa's company, «Lynx Transportation Software» aka Ryte Byte, Inc., donates 95% of the foundation's annual funding; charitable donations make up the rest of the budget. www.StudentBusing.com

X-Plane software was first released in 1995, and remains the top realistic flight simulator commercially available enjoyed by pilots, gamers, and aviation enthusiasts around the globe. Extremely realistic, everything in X-Plane operates from real world physics, while the software's aircraft handling, adjustable wind and weather conditions, and realistic avionics systems mimic real-world flight. The software includes all worldwide airports, so you can "fly" anywhere with accurate airport layouts; the museum's simulator is specially equipped with detailed Wisconsin scenery for fun local flying. You can also select different aircraft, from airliners to small airplanes, allowing for specific, realistic training.

Come try out the simulator yourself! The museum is open 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Wednesday through Sunday.

James Martin Kjelland, age 76, of Madison, Wisconsin, passed away peacefully on Sunday, December 29, 2024 at Agrace Hospice, Madison. Jim was born in Monroe, Wisconsin, to George and Lois (Kratz) Kjelland on September 26, 1948.

Jim attended schools in Genoa, Illinois and Brodhead, graduating in 1966 from Brodhead High School. His younger years were spent golfing, which became a lifelong passion. Jim grew to love fishing, especially at Gibbs Lake where his dad taught him and his brothers to fish as young children.

Jim was surrounded with a variety of music at home. Once he picked up the trumpet and after joining the school band, he was set on a path that would shape his lifelong career. After graduating High School, Jim went on to receive his bachelor's degree in music education from UW Madison.

During his service in the National Guard, Jim and his trumpet com-

In 1984 he became director of orchestras and coordinator of strings at California's Colburn School of Performing Arts. In 1991 he became associate professor of music education, University of North Texas in Denton, Texas. Jim later accepted a teaching position at Northwestern University, Evanston, Illinois, and he was happy to be closer to family.

Jim served as guest conductor at Allstate and Regional Honors orchestras across the country and as a summer string workshop instructor at University of WI, Ohio State University, and University of California, Los Angeles. He gained national acclaim for his in-service clinics and workshops in string pedagogy and orchestra development. He was an editorial board member for the council for research in music education and the American String Teachers Association.

Jim wrote and published Orchestral Bowing, Style and Function. He also co-authored many other books, including: Strictly Strings (the comprehensive string class method books), Teaching Stringed Instruments (a course of study), and the three volume Teaching Music Through Performance in Orchestra.

Jim will be deeply missed by his sisters: Kristin (Kjelland) Klemme (Chuck) of Plymouth Wisconsin and Janet Kjelland of Madison. He was pre-deceased by his parents and his brothers: David Kjelland and George Kjelland Jr.





Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library

The First Thirteen States—Like a Jigsaw Puzzle Submitted by Barbara Flores, President, Friends of the Durand Library

Please join us at the Durand Library January 11 for the first part of a fascinating four part-series on How the States Got Their Shapes. The subject this month will be the original thirteen states. On a map, the first states appear like a long, slender jigsaw puzzle with very irregular pieces of greatly varying size, which fit neatly together.

During the presentation, Brad Keyes, an avid student of history, will talk about the many factors at play as the colonies struggled towards independence from England and finally achieved their unique shapes. It is an eye-opener to learn how politics, wars, geological features, faulty surveys, battles between territories, and petty grievances played into how the borders of our states were established.

Of course, all of the land, which was settled by European immigrants, had once been occupied by Native Americans. Some were forced out in armed conflicts or others simply were pushed out by the endless stream of English and others who came to the New World.

The original thirteen states began as English colonies under the rule of many different British monarchs. How did anyone get a right to any land? And what were the boundaries of those lands given by kings to their favorites. Not all the newcomers populating the colonies were English as the Dutch, Swedes and Germans also came and settled in their own areas.

There were no aerial views of the territory during the time that the colonies were gradually taking shape. The first maps of the New World relied on reports by others about the physical features. Colonial boundaries were fluid as some original colonies split up while others grabbed a bit more land from others. There was a lot going on.

It is a fascinating story! Please join us on Saturday, January 11 at 10 a.m. for this 90-minute presentation to learn more about this dramatic time in our country's birth.

Part two will cover the Midwestern States and be presented Saturday, February 8; Part three will cover the Louisiana Purchase and be presented March 8; and Part 4 will cover the Pacific Coastal states and be presented Saturday, April 12.


