

FEAST DAY OF ST. BASIL THE GREAT (+379 A.D.)

St. Basil was born in the year 330 A.D. in the city of Caesarea in Cappadocia, Asia Minor. He was one of six children who all became saints in our Church; his brothers and sisters became priests, bishops, and nuns. His parents were very devoted to the faith and gave their children a great spiritual heritage, which they cultivated in their lifetime. The family of St. Basil was the greatest Christian family of the 4th century. St. Basil studied in Constantinople and Athens. He studied with his best friend, St. Gregory, in the culture centers of the world. St. Basil was one of the greatest writers and speakers of the Christian Church. Although his fame was spread over the entire Christian world of his day, he returned to his own hometown and was ordained Bishop of Caesarea on June 14, 370 A.D. St. Basil was an authority on the monastic life. He formulated the rules and regulations for the monks of his day; and these rules still prevail in most of the Christian monasteries of the world. St. Basil prepared the Divine Liturgy, which we love and know so well. Although the Divine Liturgy of St. John Chrysostom is used 42 Sundays a year in our Church, it is based on the slightly longer Divine Liturgy of St. Basil; St. John merely shortened the lengthy prayers and made minor alterations in other prayers. The Liturgy of St. Basil is celebrated 10 times each year: during the Lenten period, Christmas Eve, and on January 1st, the anniversary of his death. St. Basil was indeed one of the greatest pillars of the Church. He loved children and he always assisted the sick and the homeless. He was the first bishop to establish orphanages and hospitals and homes for the elderly. He first directed the attention of the Church to these unfortunate victims of society. The Philoptochos Ladies Society of our Church has its beginning from the time of St. Basil who first organized this noble organization with its missions of aid, assistance, charity, mercy and compassion for the sick and the needy. Why was St. Basil given the name "Great"? Only a few people in the world were ever given the magnificent title, "Great"! Alexander the Great was so-called because he conquered the world, but St. Basil was called "Great" because he conquered the hearts and souls of men for Jesus Christ. His whole life was dedicated to Jesus and the message of Christianity. He had the humility of Moses, the zeal of Elijah, the faith of Peter, the eloquence of John the Theologian, and the dedication of Paul. He died in the Lord on January 1, 379 A.D.

VASILOPITA OBSERVANCE

One of the most beautiful and inspiring traditions of the Orthodox Christian Church is the observance of Vasilopita. This is a compound word, which in Green means the sweet bread of St. Basil (Vasilios). During the time St. Basil was the Bishop of Caesarea, the Emperor Julian was going to war passing through Caesarea. He asked St. Basil for bread. St. Basil sent him bread that was made from whole barley. The emperor was very angry and sent to St. Basil three bales of hay with this message: I will take care of you and your people when I return. St. Basil sent a message back to the emperor saying that they had sent to him that which they were eating. St. Basil called the people together and t old them what had happened. He asked them to bring whatever valuables they had and offer them to the emperor in exchange for their lives. After some time, a message arrived saying that the emperor would soon be passing through Caesarea on his way home. St. Basil called the Christians together, and they fled to a mountain top church that was dedicated to the Virgin Mary. There they would pray and fast for deliverance from the emperor's wrath. At night while everyone was praying, St. Basil had a vision. He saw the Virgin Mary seated upon a throne surrounded by angels. She asked the Archangel to bring St. Merkourious St. Basil saw St. Merkourios coming dressing for battle carrying his sword. The Most Holy Mother of God commanded him to kill the enemy of her Son. St. Basil and some priests left the mountain and went down into the city to the church of St. Merkourios. When St. Basil looked in the glass tomb, the body of St. Merkourios was gone. St. Basil asked the caretaker what had happened to the body; the caretaker replied that had seen nothing. Knowing that his vision was true, St. Basil returned to the mountain and told the faithful of his vision and how God had saved them from the hands of the emperor. They gave thanks to the Lord. St. Basil told the people to take back the things they had given to appease the emperor. However, the people refused, saying what they had been willing to give the emperor; they would now give to God. Upon returning to the village, the people learned of the emperor's death. With the money that had been given to God, St. Basil built a hospital, orphanage, guesthouse and home for the elderly. He did other philanthropic deeds, one of which was to make small loaves of bread and put a gold coin in each and distribute them to the poor. Today this tradition is carried on in the observance of Vasilopita on St. Basil's day, January 1st. When we bake the Vasilopita, a coin is added to the ingredients. The head of the house cuts the bread; the first slice is for Christ, the second for St. Basil, the third for the poor, and the remainder is shared among family and friends present. The person who gets the coin in his slice is considered blessed for the year. This tradition is celebrated in every Orthodox Church as well, with the priest acting as head and the congregation participating

Little Learners

Riley Johnson of Monticello dreamed of opening her own childcare center ever since she was in high school. She doubled down on her dream, and today operates two childcare centers in Green County.

As soon as Johnson started providing in-home childcare, she began looking for a location to start a center in Monticello. After eight years of planning, she was able to open Little Learners at 316 E. Coates Avenue. That was six years ago; three years ago she started a second location in Monroe.

She describes Little Learners as a small, community childcare center. "Most of the Little Learners teachers attended school in the district and also reside here with their families. It's a close-knit center and community," she explained.

That sense of closeness carries throughout the Little Learners atmosphere. Johnson said the most satisfying part of working with children and their families is "watching a child who started in your care at a young age grow up and transition through all the classrooms and continue on to kindergarten."

It can be challenging to provide affordable childcare for parents while paying a wage that will attract and retain good teachers to the field. "Trying to secure high quality staff is hard when childcare tuition has to cover the costs of their wages, education, and benefits on top of the mortgage, food, supplies, and utilities," Johnson said.

She sees a big payoff for everyone-children and adults-if childcare was prioritized more.

"I wish that early childhood was treated and funded more like public school districts. Early care and the development of young children starts at birth," she said. "If we invest more during their early years, we would potentially save more on later costs, like special education."
