### **Brodhead** referendum

The Brodhead City Council will ask residents if taxes should increase to help departments meet growing cost concerns. Council has proposed an increase to the levy of \$200,000 for five years. The increase would start in 2023. For a home valued at \$100,000, Green County residents would see an increase of \$120. Rock County residents would see an increase of \$117.

By raising the tax levy, City departments will be able to maintain current levels of service. Most department budget requests have been cut in the last two years. The proposed increase would help prevent future cuts that will greatly affect the quality-of-service City departments can provide. More information on how cuts might affect services will be published next week.

City Council asks you to vote on this question. The referendum question is available to review at City Hall, Brodhead Memorial Public Library, and on the City's website. Residents can vote in-person on Tuesday, February 15 from 7 a.m.-8 p.m. at City Hall, 1111 2nd Avenue. Absentee and early voting options are also available. Contact City Hall at 608-897-4018.






### **Basketball** contest

#### Brodhead Brothers, Sister Are Wed in Triple Rites

Nashua, Iowa—Two Brodhead (Wisconsin) brothers and their sister married their sweethearts Saturday in a triple wedding at the Little Brown Church in the Vale, made famous by a Wisconsin Hymn writer.

The three couples made the arrangements to exchange vows before the Rev. Glenn L. Utterback, pastor of the Congregational church near here, by telephone Friday night.

They arrived here about 10:30 a.m. Saturday and left for home about noon, according to Rev. Utterback. The minister said that the couples were wed in order of the bridegrooms' ages—oldest to youngest.

#### Walter, Judy first

Walter Hegi, 24, Brodhead, and his bride, Miss Judy Ann Hopper, 18, Orfordville, were pronounced man and wife first.

Ernest Hegi, 22, and Miss Glenda Ann Lewis, 19, of Monroe, Wisconsin, then were married.

Finally, Joe Henry William, 21, of Brodhead, married Miss Frances Virginia Hegi, 18, the sister of the other bridegrooms.

Rev. Utterback said that in 25 years in the ministry, he had performed more than 35,000 marriages but this was only his second triple wedding. The first was before he came here about six years ago.

He said that the couples decided to come here because a friend of the Hegis, Duane Bliss, also of Brodhead, was married here in September of 1957. **All Act as Witnesses** 

What prompted the triple ceremony, he said, was the fact that Ernest was ordered by his draft board to report for a physical examination Tuesday.

The six newly married witnessed each other's marriage papers. The only persons in the church were out of state visitors. Rev. Utterback said that some 150,000 persons visit the church each year.

The song, "The Little Brown Church in the Vale," which has spread the name of the church around the world, was written 101 years ago, Rev. Utterback said, by William Savage Pitts, a country schoolteacher of Union (Rock County), Wisconsin.

Bliss, reached at Brodhead, said he understood that the couples, who were traveling in one car, would arrive home Sunday.







### What is January good for?

Ice fishing, ice skating, and if you lived in the 1800s and early 1900s, ice cutting/harvesting.

Ice harvesting was an important industry providing a way to preserve food for the average household as well as being used commercially. Railroads used ice for shipping fruit, vegetables, and meats. Ice was needed by businesses such as butcher shops, creameries, breweries, and other stores to keep their products from spoiling. When electrical refrigerators were invented, the demand for ice began to lessen. But many farmers continued to harvest ice and use icehouses for a longer period until electricity reached the rural areas.

January and February were the months individuals and icehouses stocked up on ice for the year. Specialized tools were made to harvest the 12" to 20" thick ice blocks. Some examples are ice scrapers, ice plows, large ice saws, ice splitting bars, long ice picks, large ice hook or tongs. Once harvested the ice was taken to ice houses for storage. In the icehouses the ice was placed on a 12" layer of sawdust or straw in the middle and with more sawdust filling the 15" to 20" space between the ice and the four walls. Over the top another 12" of sawdust was placed. Then with adequate ventilation and drainage, the ice could last through the summer and fall. In Brodhead, ice blocks were harvested from the Race and stored in a large building called "The Cold Storage". It was located across the street to the west from the current Police Station. In the warm months in Brodhead, the iceman would make his rounds and if the sign in your window was green side out it meant you needed ice and if the sign was red side out it meant you did not need ice that day. Come see an actual large ice saw and a large ice tong on exhibit at the Brodhead Depot Museum as well as an old household icebox that stored your family food.




