Limited ATV/UTV Traffic on **First Street and First Center Avenue Authorized**

After a complaint of inability to reach a First Center Avenue Business, Police Chief Police Brian Raupp asked and the Council approved amending the ATV/UTV ordinance to allow access to and from residences and businesses on First Street and First Center Avenue, otherwise known as State Highway 11. Drivers must only access the Highway using the closest cross street to their destination. ATV/UTV users must not travel the whole length of First Center Avenue due to safety concerns. Chief Raupp explained that the city cannot designate a state highway an ATV/UTV route, but they can authorize ATV/UTV traffic on it.

MSA's Joe DeYoung presented a revised proposal for a 2025 street and sewer project to be funded largely by a federal Community Development grant and state DNR loan forgiveness program. After surveying residents, 12th Street was removed since occupants don't meet the grant criteria. A shortened section of West Third Avenue plus areas to the east and west are now being proposed because those residents meet the criteria. Council approved MSA's costs to submit the survey and start the application process which has a May deadline.

The council approved Chief Raupp's revised Community Service Officer (CSO) job description. The requirement to be enrolled in college has been removed. Previously, students would fill these rolls for two years and move on. However, it's become difficult to recruit CSOs so the Chief would like to see community members fill these roles, allowing for more continuity. In Other Business:

Council decided to return to the Economic Development committee regarding disposition of Water and Light's \$1,000 donation after Treasurer Keri Miller clarified it does require Council approval.

Council approved Chief Raupp's proposed Police Corporal job description to appoint someone to oversee the night shift.

Approved seven-day notice for Cori Clark and Sabrina Meichtry to the library board and Carla Garrett to Personnel.

New clerk Kristin Covert and library director Stuart Bisbee were introduced.

A Class B Liquor license was approved for Firebolt Stone Oven Pizza and Coffee, Inc. and Class A Beer and Class C Wine licenses were approved for Family Dollar.

A two-year contract was approved for EMS after discussion in closed session.

Brodhead Community Economic Analysis Report Completed

The Brodhead Community Economic Analysis Report is completed in report format. Digital copies are available online; hard copies of the report are also available at the Brodhead City Hall, the Brodhead Memorial Public Library and Brodhead Free Press.

Brodhead is one of five rural Wisconsin communities that has been actively engaged in the Community Economic Analysis for Rural Wisconsin Communities pilot program sponsored by the University of Wisconsin-Madison Division of Extension (UW-Extension) and the Wisconsin Economic Development Corporation (WEDC). This program has been designed to enhance the resiliency and vibrancy of rural communities for current and future generations.

The Brodhead Community Economic Analysis program combines the knowledge and insights of local leaders and area residents with Brodheadspecific demographic and economic data delivered by a team of community economic development specialists from UW-Extension. Participants met over the course of 10 weeks to review Brodhead-specific data, comprehensively assess opportunities and challenges, and identify priorities for community and economic development. "The CEA program provided Brodhead community leaders, including myself, the chance to prioritize

economic initiatives. This, in turn, enables us to build upon past efforts and foster the growth of a more vibrant and dynamic community moving forward," said Olivia Otte, **Executive Director of Green County Development Corporation.**

The outcomes of this pilot program will serve as the foundation for a Community Economic Development Strategic Plan and will meet the unique needs of the Brodhead community. "I am very pleased to have been a part of the CEA project. I look forward to implementing what we have learned to move Brodhead towards the goals we have set during this project," said Casey Jones, Mayor of Brodhead.

The City of Brodhead was chosen to participate in this pilot program through a competitive process from among more than two dozen rural communities that submitted applications. The Brodhead CEA committee consists of representatives from local businesses. the City of Brodhead, Brodhead Chamber of Commerce, Brodhead School District, Blackhawk Technical College, Green County Development Corporation, and several community-members-at-large. The University of Wisconsin-Madison representatives are from the Division of Extension's Community Economic Development Program and the Department of Agricultural and Applied Economics.



He'll be giving his perspective on cover crops, soil health and water quality. After a delicious lunch, three local farmers in different kinds of operations will be on a panel talking about their reasons and goals for cover crops. The final presentation of the day will be from Michael Borucke of Black Box Soil Lab, explaining and showing the audience about the soil food web and life in our soil under a microscope projected on a screen so all can see.

The meeting is a great opportunity for farmers to network with others and ask questions. 



Watch for signs of self-harm and suicide in youth: Suicide Prevention Skills Training

Program to be offered in Monroe on Friday, January 26th

As students begin the spring semester, the Department of Health Services (DHS) encourages parents and caregivers to be aware of Wisconsin Emergency Department data from the National Syndromic Surveillance Program that shows young people experience large increases in self-harm injuries at certain times of the year, including when school resumes after the winter holidays.

Self-harming increased among youth by nearly 40% in September 2022 and January 2023 compared to each of the preceding months. While September 2023 showed a smaller spike in self-harming (14% increase from August 2023), it still represents a significant concern. Self-harm refers to intentional actions to hurt oneself. Examples include cutting, hitting, poisoning, or burning. Self-harm may be done to express or lessen emotional pain. While someone who self-harms may not have the intention of suicide, they may be at greater risk of a suicide attempt or dying by suicide if they do not receive help.

"The start and return of school can be stressful for young people and families," said Paula Tran, State Health Officer and administrator of the DHS Division of Public Health. 'Parents, guardians, teachers, mentors, and others can support the young people in their life by knowing the signs of self-harm, talking openly about the struggles youth are facing, and listening to what
