All of us, at all ages, occasionally experience fear, worry, sorrow, or pain. In most cases, these symptoms are brief and do not affect our ability to function. Unfortunately, at other times, symptoms can cause serious complications with daily functioning and affect our relationships with others.

There is a lot that we must do as a community to support the mental health of children and youth, strengthen the resilience of young people, support one another's families, and mitigate the pandemic's mental health impacts. Here is how you can help engage with children and youth on mental health topics according to the U.S. Surgeon General's Advisory:

•Be the best role model you can be for young people by taking care of your own mental and physical health.

•Help children and youth develop strong, safe, and stable relationships with you and other supportive adults.

•Encourage children and youth to build healthy social relationships with peers.

•Do your best to provide children and youth with a supportive, stable, and predictable home and neighborhood environment.

•Try to minimize negative influences and behaviors in young people's lives.

•Ensure children and youth have regular check-ups with a pediatrician, family doctor, or other health care professional.

 Look out for warning signs of distress, and seek help when needed.

•Minimize children's access to means of self-harm, including firearms and prescription medication.

•Be a voice for mental health in your community.



Rep. Mark Spreitzer Introduces Healthcare Heroes Act

On Wednesday, January 12, State Representative Mark Spreitzer (D-Beloit) joined frontline healthcare workers and Rep. Robyn Vining (D-Wauwatosa), Rep. Daniel Riemer (D-Milwaukee), Sen. Jon Erpenbach (D-West Point), and Sen. Melissa Agard (D-Madison) to introduce the Healthcare Heroes Act.

This bill would provide direct support to frontline healthcare workers in Wisconsin that are caring

for patients during the COVID-19 pandemic by providing hazard pay, paid medical leave, state-funded COVID-19 testing and treatment for uninsured healthcare workers, and insurance coverage for COVID-19 testing and treatment. The bill is funded by bringing federal tax dollars back to Wisconsin to expand BadgerCare (Medicaid), which would result in saving \$1.3 billion over the 2021-2023 biennium. The Healthcare Heroes Act is fully funded by using a portion of the savings from BadgerCare expansion.

"When the COVID-19 pandemic began, we all feared what might happen," said Rep. Spreitzer. "It's been nearly two years since COV-ID-19 was first identified in Wisconsin, and we continue to learn how devastating this pandemic can be. Healthcare Heroes work every day to protect us. We must do our part to protect them.

"We first introduced this bill in 2020 when our healthcare system was fighting COVID-19 for the first time. If the legislature had done its job then and passed this proposal, we would be in a very different place now. As we reintroduce the bill this year, we know that frontline health-

care workers are tired, stressed, and sick—but still doing all they can for us. The best time to pass this bill was in 2020. The second best time is right now."

The Healthcare Heroes Act is being circulated for co-sponsorship to the members of the State Legislature. Legislators have until January 19th to add their name as a coauthor of the proposed legislation.


