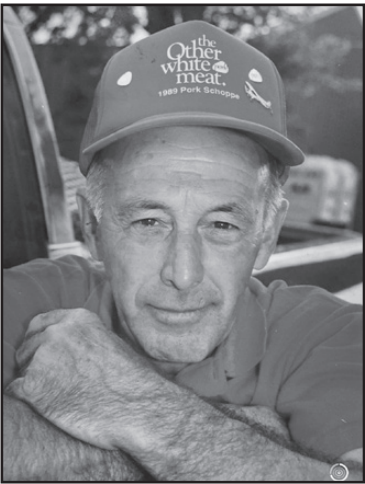

Raymond John Miller peacefully passed away on Saturday, January 20th, 2024, at the Veterans Administration Hospital in Middleton, Wisconsin. He was born on April 8, 1928, in Cary, Illinois to Albert and Anne Kern Miller. He attended Saints Peter and Paul Elementary School, in Cary and graduated from Crystal Lake High School, Crystal Lake, Illinois. Ray lived on Three Oaks Road, and farmed with his father Albert, near Cary until he started working for Cary Dairy delivering milk. He also served in the Illinois National Guard. He married Josephine Pavlak on November 6, 1948. Ray served as a Sergeant in the US Army during the Korean War. He and Josephine lived on army bases in Santa Barbara, California, and Seattle, Washington. After the war, he returned to working at Cary Dairy delivering milk until 1964, when he and Josephine, with their four children moved to a farm on Miller Road, near Janesville, Wisconsin. Ray raised beef cattle, hogs, and grain including corn, soybeans and hay with his

son, Daniel. He loved flying, kept a light plane at his farm and for many years, he enjoyed flying it. Ray was also very active at the Brodhead Airport, and the EAA Chapter 431 where he assisted with many activities held there, especially the fly-ins, cooking and serving his infamous pork chops. The special relationship he had with his ‘airport family’ was something Ray treasured. Avid square dancers, Ray and Josephine danced for many years with the Milton Village Squares. Ray loved horses. It was how he and Josephine met as they rode horses on their neighboring childhood farms where they lived. Later, Ray assisted his daughter, Mary, who trained and showed horses. He also loved being involved with his grandchildren, especially Deborah’s children who were his first and he, with Grandma Jo, became a part of their daily life as they grew up on the family farm. He spent many hours through the years helping all his grandchildren on their 4-H projects, whether it was an animal or model project or even the Magnolia 4-H float. Active in the Rock County Pork Producers, he had served as president and enjoyed working at the Rock County Porkfest. The Evansville FFA Alumni Club was another interest of Ray’s, and he served as an officer. Ray enjoyed living and working on the farm, playing with his model trains, building model airplanes, listening to Molly B polka music and playing with his beloved dog, Freddie.

Another highlight in Ray’s life was the Rock Energy Cooperative. His connection began 60 years ago when he and Jo bought the farm in Center Township and received electrical service. When Jo was elected as a director on the board, Ray enjoyed traveling with her to the many meetings over the 26 years she had served. He talked frequently of all

the “good people” that were all associated with the cooperative and looked forward to receiving in his mailbox the monthly magazine to see what “Mr. Shane” had to say.

In his later years he sought medical attention at the Veterans Administration Clinic and Hospital. He was always appreciative of the excellent care and concern each staff member had for him. His daughter, Barbara, who assisted him to appointments, saw the special relationship he had with his primary caregiver, Mr. Michael Dodd RN, MSN, APNP and his nurse Kathy. It was a social event to catch up with them as well as addressing his medical concerns. Thank you, to all the staff at the Veterans Hospital for the excellent care, especially the CLC Hospice Unit. Ray also received care to live in his home for many years with his dog, because of a special caregiver, Kristi Powers. The family is so appreciative to her in helping make Josephine’s last year so very comfortable and continued to assist Raymond for another five years.

Raymond is survived by his four children: Mary (Dennis) Haakenson, Deborah Thornton, Barbara Miller (Leon) Maerz, and Daniei (Lori) Miller. 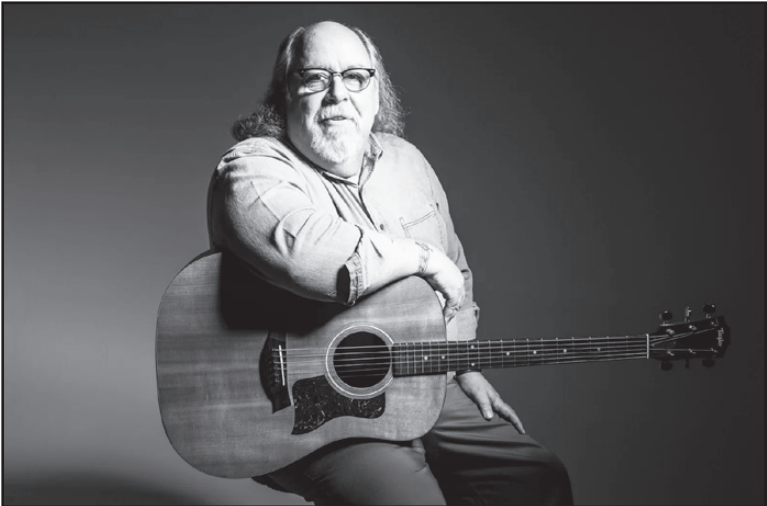
around her. She held multiple positions in different hospitals over the years.

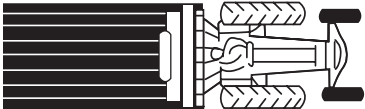

2023 Tax Assistance Appointments

Appointments are now avail-able for free income tax preparation services for low to moderate in-come, elderly and disabled persons through the AARP Foundation/Tax-Aide program. Assistance provided includes the preparation of federal and state (including homestead) income taxes. Appointments are available in Monroe on Mondays and Wednesdays beginning Feb-ruary 5th through April 10th. Ap-pointments start at 8:30 a.m. with the last appointment at 11:30 a.m. at the Green County Government Services Building, N3152 State Rd 81, Monroe. Please call the ADRC at 608-328-9499 to schedule an ap-pointment. Enter at the ADRC en-trance at the lower level parking lot.

This year taxes will be prepared in person and only one appoint-ment is required. However, taxpay-ers will be required to obtain a pack-et of information from the ADRC prior to the appointment and must complete the forms in the packet before your appointment. The packet also includes a list of items to bring with you to your appoint-ment. The ADRC can also email you the contents of the packet for you to print out and prepare at home if that’s more convenient.

“Prehistoric” Brodhead—Prior to 1856

Southern Wisconsin including the Brodhead area was inhabited prior to European arrival by Native Americans of various tribes at vari-ous times.

Paleolithic Period: 11,000-9,000BC—Small bands of hunters arrived in the Lower Sugar River Valley and hunted megafauna such as the mammoth and mastodon using stone tools. Archaic Period: 9,000-1,000BC and Woodland Pe-riod: 1,000BC–1,000AD—marked by increased population and set-ting into more localized areas, use of bow and arrow, ground axes, mound building, plant cultiva-tion and first ceramics Mississip-pian Period and Oneota Period: 1000-1400 AD—Some evidence of Native American activity in South-ern Wisconsin but not much after mid- 1400s. To this day arrowheads, other tools of various ages, and per-haps some remaining mounds are still found in the fields surrounding Brodhead.

After arrival of Europeans there noted to be several Ho-Chunk (pre-viously named Winnebago) com-munities in southern Wisconsin, especially in the lead rich mining areas. Lead mining rights initially and then settlers were points of ongoing friction. Although co-exis-tence did exist in areas. In 1831 for example Jules Louis de Munn be-gan a trading post across the Sugar River, known as Sweet Water in Ho-Chunk, from White Breast’s village near present day Brodhead. One source stated the village, named Sturgeon’s Spawn, contained 9 lodges and 167 people. Unfortu-nately, the post was abandoned in 1832 due to the Black Hawk War. Black Hawk was thought to have traveled along the Sugar River and passed near present day Brodhead as did US troops. The diary of Henry Gratiot stated Col. Dodge’s unit at some point was joined by White Breast and 31 Winnebago (named

Ho-Chunk now) to act as scouts. In the same area as the village existed a Native American council house, which lasted until destroyed by fire in1847. The areas around present-day Brodhead, old Decatur and old Clarence were also a hunting and trapping area for the Native Ameri-cans. Pine Bluff and what is now called Decatur Parks/Decatur dam were favored camping grounds.

Gradually Native Americans in Wisconsin including near the Brod-head area were relocated as more settlers moved in. Documented oral history indicates small bands of Na-tive Americans passed through the Brodhead area as late as 1861 when they camped by the Sugar River where it ran through the Charles Warner property. This property is also the location of the Half Way Tree, the Native American half way point between the Mississippi River and Lake Michigan. It is still there.

There is so much more to be told but space is limited. Hope this very brief outline sparked your interest to continue further reading/explor-ing about Native American Indians.

Consider visiting the Depot Mu-seum in Brodhead to see the mam-moth tooth, arrowhead collection, Native American maul (hammer), map of local Indian trails and other documents on exhibit there.
