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Major Grant from Wagner Foundation Enables Phase III Construction

Brodhead Airport is proud to announce the start of construction on its Phase III museum building project. Construction of "The Dick and Bobbie Wagner Atrium" is only possible due to a very generous financial commitment by The Wagner Foundation of Lyons, Wisconsin.

The Wagner's connection to the Brodhead Airport runs deep, as does their connection to Al and Lois Kelch, the original founders of the museum. Richard "Dick" and Bobbie Wagner were deeply involved in aviation, both in Wisconsin and

The Kelch Aviation Museum at internationally. Al and Lois Kelch were members of the Wisconsin vintage aviation scene from the very beginning, and the two couples formed a close friendship. Dick and Al worked on several airplane construction projects together, and the two couples spent many vintage fly-ins together at the historic Brodhead Airport.

> "The Kelch Aviation Museum epitomizes the era of light aircraft aviation in which Dick and I were involved during his lifetime," said Bobbie Wagner. "Located at Brodhead Airport, it provides an ambi

ance that is unavailable to other air museums. It brings back many wonderful memories to me, and I am so grateful to see the history of those special days being preserved for our upcoming generations."

Aviation was always a part of Dick Wagner's life; he got his pilot's license at age 16 and went on to a 24-year career as an airline pilot. Together Dick and Bobbie Wagner raised two daughters, Marcy and Julie, while running a successful family-owned aviation business at the same time. In 1995, the couple sold Wag-Aero and retired to form

School Board Brodhead School Board looking to develop long-range facility plans

Technical Director Kevin Buxton presented bids for a new district wide phone system. He recommended the bid of \$43,429.13 over three years from Log Meln. This includes a \$4,685.75 upfront fee and \$1,434.94 monthly. This company gives a teacher discount and nine months of free service, which explains why the bid was much lower than other companies. There will be extra costs for integrating the system with the current PA system.

The Building and Grounds Committee met with two companies that develop long-range facility plans. The District is considering developing a long-range plan that could be used to establish a Fund 46 that is a form of saving for future facility needs. Currently leftover funds at the end of a fiscal year must be spent. If they aren't spent and are put in fund balance, the amount of state aide the following year will be decreased. In Fund 46, the Dis-

trict is required to have a long-term facilities plan and the money put in the fund cannot be used for five years. After the five years, the money is available each year. The Board would like to meet with the company on Wednesday, April 13 at 6 p.m. before making a decision.



1. The Meeting of Our Lord

The 40th day after His birth, the All-holy Virgin brought her divine Son into the Temple of Jerusalem, in accordance with the Law, to dedicate Him to God and to purify herself (Leviticus 12:2-7, Exodus 12:2). Even though neither the one nor the other was necessary, the Lawgiver did not want in any way to transgress His own Law, which He had given through Moses, His servant and prophet. At that time, the high-priest Zacharias, the father of John the Forerunner, was serving in the Temple. Zacharias placed the Virgin, not in the temple area reserved for women, but rather in the area reserved for virgins. On this occasion two very special persons appeared in the Temple; the Elder Simeon and Anna, the daughter of Phanuel. The righteous Simeon took the Messiah in his arms and said: Lord, now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace, according to Thy word, for mine eyes have seen Thy salvation (Luke 2:29-30). Simeon also spoke the following words about the Christchild: Behold, this child is set for the fall and rising again of many in Israel (Luke 2:34). Then Anna, who from her youth had served God in the Temple by fasting and prayer, recognized the Messiah and glorified God. She then proclaimed to the inhabitants of Jerusalem the coming of the long-awaited One. But the Pharisees who were present in the Temple, having seen and heard all, became angry with Zacharias because he had placed the Virgin Mary in the area reserved for virgins, and they reported this to King Herod. Convinced that this was the new king spoken of by the Magi from the East, Herod immediately sent his soldiers to kill Jesus. In the meantime, the holy family had already left the city and set out for Egypt under the guidance of an angel of God. The Feast of the Meeting of our Lord in the Temple was celebrated from earliest times, but the solemn celebration of this day was established in the year 544, during the reign of Emperor Justinian.

HOMILY on the imminence of the coming of the Lord


Behold, I come quickly (Revelation 22:7) Unbelievers and those who are perishing in spirit will say "Nearly two thousand years ago He promised that He would come, and He has not come yet!" This is how they laugh-those who will lament in eternal torment. But we who are prepared for happiness in His Kingdom know that He will come in power and glory just as He promised.


We know that He has already come countless times and showed Himself to His faithful ones. Did He not come to John the Divine, to whom He spoke these words: Behold, I come quickly (Revelation 3:11)? John saw Him in power and glory, felt His hand on him when he was frightened, and fell before His feet as dead: And He laid his right hand upon me (Revelation 1:17). Did He not come to Saul, when he breathed hatred against the Christians and when on the road to Damascus he fell on the ground, seeing the Lord and hearing His voice saying: Saul, Saul, why persecutest thou Me (Act 9:4)? And again, did He not enter into the heart of the Apostle Paul when he recognized that nevertheless I live; yet not I, but Christ liveth in me (Galatians 2:20)? Did He not come to the countless martyrs, both male and female, who suffered for His name, to encourage them, to heal them, and to have mercy on them? Did He not come to Anthony the Great, Theodore Stratelates, St. Charalampus, St. Marina, St. Sylvester and many, many more?

But what are we saying? Did He not return from the kingdom of death on the third day and appear before the apostle? Did He not come to the aid of the Church many, many times? And did He not resurrect her as from the dead whenever her enemies rejoiced, thinking that they had given His Church over to death forever? Did He not manifest His power in the Church in the time of Nero as well as in the time of Constantine, in the time of Julian, as well as in the time of Justinian; in the time of Arab tyranny, as well as in the name of Turkish and Mongolian oppression of Christians?

O my faithful brethren, do not submit to deception. He came countless times and comes even today. He comes to every soul that is accessible, regardless of impurity. However, we are all waiting for Him to come for the last time in power and glory. We know that His coming is certain. O Lord Most-gracious, before Thou comest, make us worthy to recognize Thy face and to be ashamed of our own faces, darkened by sin

To Thee be glory and praise forever. Amen

Childcare **Profile: Once Upon A Time** Schoolhouse

Once Upon A Time Schoolhouse (OUATS) is a relative newcomer to Belleville, opening in the fall of 2020. But its location in the former Belleville elementary school is likely familiar territory to many residents.

"Many of our parents attended school here," explained OUATS director Leslie Brugger. "Many of them have told us about each room and memories of the school that they have." She noted the center is only a few blocks from the current elementary school so school-age children attending OUATS are able to walk to and from the center with staff.

OUATS is the second childcare center owned by Ann Schmitz. She opened her first center, Once Upon A Time, in Verona in 2006. OUATS offers care for children ages 6 weeks to 14 years. The center's philosophy focuses on helping children master the art of social and emotional regulation as a lifelong journey. "We work with our students every day to help them find the tools and develop the skills necessary to regulate their emotions," Brugger said. "We work toward a healthy understanding of how to check in on your feelings and then what tools to use to get yourself back to a state of being

"Support is given through positive, supportive relationships; creating engaging environments; providing concrete teaching strategies; and if needed, creating individualized plans," Brugger explained.

OUATS has three expectations that children work toward each day: Be safe, be kind and be respectful. Brugger said children hear teachers use this language throughout the day as they interact with friends and teachers, and play with equipment. Parents can use this language, too, when talking with children in various scenarios at home.

Brugger said OUATS is a small center with many families that have more than one child enrolled. "This




Good morning! I hope you are keeping warm! Speaking of keeping warm, do any of you remember school being called off because of the cold? If the buses started, school was happening.


Albrecht Elementary completes reading motivational program in rock n roll style



State Treasurer meets with providers on the importance of childcare for economic security

in New Glarus and Deforest, State Treasurer Godlewski seeks to raise awareness on the importance of supporting these small businesses and increasing access to safe and affordable childcare for Wisconsin's families. State Treasurer Sarah Godlewski made stops Wednesday, January 19, in New Glarus and Deforest to speak directly with childcare providers on the challenges they face and how it impacts affordable and accessible childcare for Wisconsin families. The vast majority of childcare providers in Wisconsin are independently owned and operated. Over half of Wisconsinites live in child care deserts; and in rural parts of the state, this jumps to nearly 80 percent. State Treasurer Godlewski believes too often childcare is an afterthought. In meeting with these small business owners, the State

port the childcare industry, which is critical to the overall economic security of Wisconsin families.

"The cost of childcare is expensive in Wisconsin, and for too many families it is just flat-out unaffordable," said State Treasurer Godlewski. "Childcare providers are doing their best to provide access to safe and affordable care, but we need to do more to support this industry which is critical to Wisconsin's economy.

The latest information from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services states child care is affordable it if costs no more than seven percent of a family's income. By this standard, only 6.5% of Wisconsin families can afford infant care. State Treasurer Godlewski met with Corrine Hendrickson, owner of Corrine's Little Explorers in New Glarus and Macy Buhler, owner Deforest. Both members of Main Street Alliance which helped coordinate these visits. Hendrickson and Buhelr discussed the challenges they face as providers and the need for investment in childcare.

"Childcare is the foundation of our communities, we provide care and education during the most critical years of a child's life," said childcare providers Corrine Hendrickson. "We provide support to families as they navigate parenthood and all of its challenges, and we are a crucial lynchpin in the economy for today's working parents and tomorrow's workforce."

Wisconsin is experiencing record rates of women leaving the workforce as access to safe, affordable childcare is dwindling. State Treasurer Godlewski looks forward to continuing to work in this important topic that will impact future generations.



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
