

The Newbery Medal is named after the eighteenth-century British bookseller John Newbery and is awarded to the author of the most distinguished American Literature for Children. Similar to this is the Caldecott Medal. Named after nineteenth-century English illustrator Randolph Caldecott, this medal is awarded to the artist (or illustrator) of the most distinguished picture book for children. Initially only awarded to authors, the Coretta Scott King award expanded to also recognize illustrators four years after its inception. This is awarded to those that demonstrate an appreciation of African American culture and universal human values. Founded in 2000, the Printz award recognizes the best book written for teens based on its literary merit. This award is comparable to the Newbery, just for a young adult audience.

This month we will be showcasing the winners of these awards since 2020 over in the Children's Section. These fantastic books will be available soon, and you can place a hold for them now. We hope to see you in soon to check out these new selections!



DEFY Domestic Abuse Beloit and County Leadership Development Academy Raising Funds for Children's Play Area

DEFY Domestic Abuse Beloit, along with Rock County's 2021-22 Leadership Development Academy (LDA), is seeking support to remodel DEFY's domestic violence shelter space. The remodel will create a room for early childhood development and another for an adult-only sitting room with office space to help shelter residents meet their self-sufficiency goals. DEFY has already received \$1,800 for the project through a grant from Stateline Community Foundation and a private donor. An additional \$8,000 is needed to complete the project.

DEFY and LDA have created Team Smashing Barriers, which consists of six volunteer team members from the public and private sectors. The team members have experience in construction, electrical, plumbing, design, project management, fundraising, and grant writing. Team Smashing Barriers will do all the demo and construction work, including painting, building, laying new flooring, electrical, and plumbing.

Team members are: Marcia Galvan, SWWDB; Jessica Schroeder, City of Janesville IT; Danny Silverthorn, ANGI Energy Systems; David Froeber, Rock County Facilities Superintendent; Matthew Huettl, Clinton School District; and Crystal Fox, Kandu Industries.

"We are grateful for the help our community members are providing for this project, which will have a positive impact on all homeless survivors of domestic violence residing at DEFY's emergency shelter," said Kelsey Hood Christenson, Director of Survivor Empowerment Services for DEFY. "We could not accomplish this renovation without the generous donations of time, expertise and financial assistance from our community. The project will provide a safe communal space for both child and adult residents of the shelter to gather and support one another."

Both financial and in-kind donations of specific items are needed, with many ways for people to give.

Healthful Hints

February Healthful Hint "Heart Healthy"

Did you know that heart disease is the most common chronic health condition in the United States? "Heart disease" is a catch-all phrase for a variety of conditions that affect the heart's structure and function. While it is a common health issue, there's a lot you can do to protect your heart.

About 11% of American adults have been diagnosed with heart disease. Several factors can make you a high risk for heart disease including high blood pressure, high blood cholesterol, and smoking. About half of people in the United States have at least one of these three risk factors. Prioritizing your heart is important to avoid serious illness. People with poor cardiovascular health are at increased risk of severe illness from COVID-19.

Here are some ways to help protect your heart:

•Move more. Be more active throughout your day. Build up to activity that gets your heart beating faster and leaves you a little breathless. If you're busy, try breaking your daily activity into 10-minute chunks.

•Eat a healthy diet. Increase your intake of fruits and vegetables, limit sugar and highly processed foods and consider following the Dietary Approaches to Stop Hypertension (DASH) eating plan, which is free and scientifically proven to lower high blood pressure and improve cholesterol levels.

•Quit smoking. Quitting can be beneficial to your overall health, even if you've smoked for years. Set a quit date and let those close to you know. Ask your family and friends for support or join a support group. Find resources and connect with a trained counselor at 1-800-QUIT-NOW or smokefree.gov.

•Sleep better. Sleeping seveneight hours each night helps improve heart health. Try going to bed and waking up at the same time each day. Getting a 30-minute daily dose of sunlight may also improve sleep. Resist that late afternoon nap. Turn off all screens at a set time nightly. Relax by listening to music, reading or taking a bath.

•Reduce stress. To help manage stress, try relaxation exercises and increase physical activity. Join a friend or family member in a relaxing activity like walking, or try meditation every day.

•Control your blood pressure. Do you know your numbers? Managing your blood pressure through lifestyle or medication is a very important way to reduce your risk for heart disease. Get regular checks, follow your doctor's recommendations and see cdc.gov/bloodpressure for more information.
