On Thursday, February 8 at approximately 5:30 p.m. the Green County Sheriff's Office—Communication Center received several 911 calls reporting damage from the storm in the Town of Decatur. Albany Fire Department was in the area for storm watch and observed a funnel cloud and possible tornado touch down approximately one and one-half miles south of the Village of Albany.





This year taxes will be prepared in person and only one appointment is required. However, taxpayers will be required to obtain a packet of information from the ADRC prior to the appointment and must complete the forms in the packet before your appointment. The packet also includes a list of items to bring with you to your appointment. The ADRC can also email you the contents of the packet for you to print out and prepare at home if that's more convenient.



Saturday Mornings at the Durand Library

All About Honeybees

The Durand Library is pleased to have local beekeeper Phil Raines of Raines Honey Farm tell us about the business of beekeeping Saturday, February 17. Phil has been keeping bees for nearly three decades at his place on Best Road in Laona Township just a short distance south of the Illinois-Wisconsin State Line.

His hives have been placed in both Northwest Illinois and Southwest Wisconsin in places where the bees have a healthy variety of flowers from which to draw nectar and pollen. They also take the long trek to California's almond orchards at this time of year.

Honeybees are not native to North America but were brought here by European settlers in the 17th century. There are many species of native bees which are important pollinators but they do not make honey. Nearly all species of native bees are solitary, live in wood or underground tunnels and collect nectar for themselves and pollen to feed their young. In contrast, the European honeybee is social and lives in hives with other bees. They collaborate in protecting and supporting the hive and young and they make honey to sustain themselves through the winter.

Phil will discuss the health benefits of honey as well as discuss the delicate nature of honeybees and how they should be cared for. The talk will begin at 10 a.m. and everyone is cordially invited to attend and learn about these interesting
