City of Brodhead Water Quality **Trading Program Receives ACEC Wisconsin Best of State Award**

The American Council of Engineering Companies (ACEC) of Wisconsin announced its juried selection of 2022 Engineering Excellence Award winners. The City of Brodhead and MSA Professional Services, Inc. (MSA) were together chosen to receive a Best of State Award for the city's Water Quality Trading program, a designation given to projects demonstrating the highest degree of engineering achievement, skill and creativity in the state of Wisconsin.

Engineering Excellence Award recipients are selected by a diverse jury and project submissions are appraised on the achievement of five categories: original or innovative application of new or existing techniques; future value to the engineering profession and perception by the public; social, economic and sustainable design considerations; complexity; and exceeding owner needs.

The City of Brodhead Water Quality Trading (WOT) program is a multi-faceted solution to surpassing water quality based effluent limits (WQBELs) for phosphorus and protecting the local watershed from harmful nutrient runoff. The trading program successfully reduces the municipality's total phosphorus load by 1,090 pounds per year, generates approximately 390 annual pounds of WQT credits, revitalizes 1.2 miles of eroding streambanks along a phosphorus-contributing creek, and establishes long-term influential nutrient management practices at a local dairy farm. It also saves the City approximately \$3.8 million in lifecycle costs as compared to making significant investments in upgrades to an existing wastewater treatment facility.

MSA agricultural and water resources engineers worked in close concert with City leaders, local landowners and environmental conservation groups to deliver the most sustainable, high-impact solutions. Work along Searles Creek involved the mitigation of 62 actively eroding streambanks with techniques that included soil bioengineering, natural erosion control and the reintroduction of backwater refuges and habitat for aquatic wildlife. Project solutions at a local dairy farm included the construction of a new 2.2-million-gallon manure tank, installation of roof infrastructure to reduce runoff, the addition of waste reception tanks and transfer piping, and improvements to nutrient management practices of crop fieldsall to further reduce phosphorus from entering the local watershed.

"MSA and the City of Brodhead are honored to receive this recognition," remarked Jason Miller, PE, vice president of water services at MSA. "We extend our thanks to the award jury and congratulate all the other award recipients. All projects should be celebrated on their own merits and for the positive contributions they make within Wisconsin communities."







Good morning! It's time to grab your favorite beverage and read your favorite newspaper!

Last week in Casey's Corner I paid respect for my childhood buddy, Jimmie Meligan. I have lots of stories with Jimmie so I figured I would share one more with you.

Sometime in 1981, Jimmie and I were asked by the next-door neighbor if we knew how to drive a semi. He was sick but needed a load to go from Belvidere to Detroit and then a return load back to Belvidere. Jimmie said yes. The job paid \$200, which could pay two month's rent and utilities in the trailer. I had never driven a big rig before. Jimmie said don't worry, I will teach you how to drive the big rig and you can come and split the money. Sounded good to me.

We left for Belvidere. The first part was called "bobtailing." That meant the semi with no trailer. I thought I was going to get bounced right out the front window. Finally, we reached Belvidere where Jimmie hooked up the trailer. Jimmie jumped up into the sleeper part and told me it was my turn to drive. I had been driving a tractor since I was 11, so how hard could it be? Jimmie stayed awake long enough to get me started and then went to sleep.


Getting going was no problem, shifting wasn't too hard but how do you stop it? About two-three hours later, I was still trying to figure out how I was going to stop the truck. My lesson came as I read a sign, "Weigh station, all trucks must stop!" "Jimmie," I screamed, "What do I do now?" Jimmie woke up and told me to slow down and go slowly over the scales.

I did as I was told and by some miracle, they passed us right on through. This was just the start of the adventure. I could write for hours on the rest of the escapade, but then we wouldn't have room for any advertisers. The rest of the trip up until we reached Belvidere, I was in the driver's seat. As soon as we dropped the trailer, Jimmie took over the helm.

This is the first and last time I ever drove a semi. I have great respect for truckers and have great memories of my childhood buddy.



February is CTE Month (Career and Technical Education)

Brodhead School District helps prepare students for high-wage, high-demand careers. CTE covers many different fields, including health care, information technology, advanced manufacturing and agricultural areas. We encompass many different types of education, from classroom learning to certification programs to work-based learning opportunities outside the classroom.

Vet Science and Ag

We will be featuring several of our programs this month, today we will feature our Agricultural Area. Our students have access to several great agricultural classes in our District. In seventh grade all students take an exploratory class in agriculture and then in high school they have the opportunity to take other great classes. The District offers classes like Intro to Agriculture, Veterinary Science, Plant Science and others. Students also have the chance to earn Blackhawk Technical credit in a Large Animal Science class. Our students can also take an Agriculture Cooperative Class where they are able to go out and work during eighth hour. This year we had four students working on farms, one working at a cheese factory, and one working at Monroe Trucking/Farm. Some great opportunities for our students wanting to explore what Agricultural fields are available out there!

Healthcare

Today we feature our Healthcare classes. Our Medical Terminology and CNA class teamed up with Blackhawk Technical to offer class credit opportunities and certification for our seniors. Students can take the two classes their senior year and can be certified as a CNA when they get done in the spring by taking a state test. Great opportunity for our students!

In CNA class the students learn to perform/assist with activities of daily living such as bathing, shaving, brushing teeth/dentures, dressing, toileting, ambulating(walking), feeding, and moving/transferring/ positioning the patient in bed/ chair. They also learn the importance of safety, infection control and privacy. The fundamentals are covered in class. Such as the proper way to wash their hands, how to don and doff (put on and take off) PPE (gloves, gown, goggles, and mask), and HIPPA (confidential information) regulations. Lastly they learn the importance of treating every patient with the utmost respect, kindness, and empathy. I always tell my students to treat their patients like they are their parents, grandparents, or loved family members.

Seventy-five hours are required of class time. They must pass their CNA class and attend all of the minutes of class. Anytime missed they must make up and they are only allowed to miss six hours total. Then they must pass their state in-person skills test and written test. After that they are officially CNAs!

There is such a shortage right now so there are MANY jobs out there plus many of them have sign on bonuses. \$\$\$\$ Most of my students are going into some sort of health care profession. I feel being a
