Back in the Day—1950s By Dolores Alsteen,

Brodhead Historical Society

High school clothing for girls included long, mid-calf dresses, poodle skirts, circle skirts with crinolines and wide cincher belts. Peter pan collared blouses or cropped twin set cardigan sweaters were usually worn with skirts. Saddle shoes, white Bucks or Penny loafers were worn with white socks. Wearing of jewelry (Pop-it bead necklaces were popular) and makeup was minimal. Boys had short haircuts or crew cuts. They wore pants or jeans, which were cuffed at the bottom, with button-down, collared colored shirts. Slip-on shoes, black oxfords and tennis shoes were popular. Motorcycle boots, leather jackets, jeans with white t-shirts and greased back hair were introduced by Marlon Brando and James Dean.

Major dances each year in high school were Homecoming, Sadie Hawkins Day—the girls asked the boys for a date to the dance and Junior Prom. The Junior Prom in April 1957 theme was "Some Day My Prince Will Come." Dance tickets were \$2.50 and spectators 85 cents.

The "fun" times in study hall were where students were watched over by a faculty member. An article in The Independent Register, written by Cora Conway Ball, a high school news reporter stated, "More changes have been taking place in the study hall lately! For example all desks are now facing west, they used to face the north, and the teachers desk has been set on a platform. Now, all you scalawags in the back seats will have to work." American Bandstand and Elvis Presley came up on the music scene in the 1950s. A high school newspaper reporter asked the students, "What do you think of Elvis Presley?" The girls out did the boys in "likes." One of the male teachers called the music generation "riff-raff."

Teenagers filled their family cars with friends and cruised around town. If you were lucky, a convertible was a prized ride. Popular cars of the 1950s were 55 Chevy Bel Air, 57 Ford Thunderbird, 59 Cadillac Coupe Deville, 53 Buick Skylark and 56 Chevy Corvette.




was not enough to overtake the Cardinals.



Green County 4-H Youth Participate in Communications Contest


